### Science Club Mobile Program Continues Demonstrations

#### Program Begun At EC Last Year As Science Club Promotion Plan

Student members of the Science club began the spring tour of their annual Mobile Program with visits to the Charles L. Coon High school in Wilson and to Atlantic Christian college on Tuesday, February 14. On Tuesday night, February 28 the club presented the Mobile Program to the Faculty Wives club in Flanagan auditorium. A tour was made to Washington High school on Wednesday afternoon, March 1. Plans are being made to visit other high schools in eastern counties of North Carolina.

Begun last year as a project to exchange scientific ideas with high school students and to stimulate interest in science in the public schools, the Mobile Program is one of the many worthwhile projects carried out by the Science club of East Carolina.

**"Energy" Discussed Last Year**  
Last spring the topic of "Energy" formed the basis of a series of demonstrations, experiments, and talks. This year the program presents practical aspects of science. Demonstrations are given to point out the importance of plants, to show that plants are the ultimate source of energy for all living things and that coal was formed from plants or their products. The relationship between plants and animals is also demonstrated. Dangers which result in the home when one fails to apply scientific principles were also demonstrated.

The program has been designed to present to science classes in high schools or to small groups of students in high school who have had enough science to grasp the significance of the demonstrations and experiments.

summer school was held from May 2 to July 30, 1910. The first graduated from the two-year normal curriculum heard Josephus Daniels as commencement speaker on June 6, 1911. On November 20, 1920, the school was authorized to offer a four-year curriculum and grant the Bachelor of Arts degree. In 1921 at an extra session of the legislature the name of the school was changed from East Carolina Teachers Training School to East Carolina Teachers college. In August, 1922, the first degree was conferred. The college was authorized to grant the degree of Master of Arts August 22, 1929, and in 1933 the first M. A. degree was given. Eight years later, on May 29, 1941, the college was granted the right to give the Bachelor of Science degree.

Last Sunday, March 5, was Founders' Day. In these 43 years each step of progress has been marked. "Time is with materials filled;" and though research has been made by charter members of the faculty, the complete history of the early days is not yet ready for publication.
