Robinson Wins SGA Presidency In Run-Off

Play Cast Complete For 'Tom Sawyer'; Series Of Six Showings On Schedule

Estimated 3,000 View
First Play In Series
Of Children's Dramas

Cast of "The Adventures of Tom Sawyer" to be presented in a series of six performances by the Teachers playhouse of East Carolina college April 2-8, has been completed, and work on the production is in full swing according to an announcement by Bobbie Caldwell of Wadeville, student director.

Audience of approximately 3,000 school children in Greenville and other localities in Pitt county will see the dramatization of Mark Twain's classic of American boyhood, according to present estimates. The production is one of a series of annual plays for children presented each evening by the Teachers playhouse and sponsored by the Greenville chapter of the American Association of University Women.

Dr. Charles H. Carter, director of drama and faculty member of the college English department, is supervising the production of "Tom Sawyer." Mrs. C. A. Bowen of Greenville is chairman of the AAUW committee which is cooperating with the Teachers playhouse on the production.

Lloyd Whitfield of Kinston, president of the Teachers playhouse, has the title role of Tom Sawyer. Others who play parts which have become favorites among thousands of readers are Janet Waters, Greenville, as Aunt Polly; Wade Jordan, Elizabethton, as Huck Finn; and Peggy Barnes, Greenville, as Becky Thatcher.

Matinees are scheduled in the College theatre Wednesday and Thursday, April 2 and 3, at 3 p. m., for pupils in the Greenville city schools, and on Monday and Tuesday, April 7 and 8, at 2 p. m., for children in Pitt county schools. Adults may see the production Monday evening, April 7, at 8 o'clock. A special performance for Negro children will take place at the Eppes high school auditorium Wednesday, April 9, at 2 p. m.

Women Lead Men In Honor Release From Registrar

Figures released this week by Registrar Orval L. Phillips revealed a total of 317 students making the Honor roll and Dean's list for the Winter term. This is an increase of six over last quarter's total of 311.

Again the women outnumbered the men on both lists placing 67 on the Dean's list and 144 on the Honor roll. Thirty men made the Dean's list, while 76 made the Honor roll. Recommendations for the Honor roll and the Dean's list are made up at the close of each quarter of the regular college year. All courses on which grades are given must be considered. To make the Honor roll a student must obtain at least two quality points per credit hour on all work taken with no grade below three. The Dean's list is composed of those students who make at least two and a half quality points per credit hour on all work taken with no grade below three.

Student Profs Begin Teaching In Area Schools

Ninety-two East Carolina seniors are now gaining experience as student teachers in 14 public schools of eastern North Carolina. Dr. J. I. Oppelt, director of student teaching and placement at the college, has issued a report outlining the student teaching program for this spring.

Work is being done by student teachers in all the elementary grades and in various departments of instruction in secondary schools. The fields in which the most students are placed this quarter are: home economics, social studies, commerce and physical education. All teaching is supervised by college faculty members and supervising teachers in the public schools.

Among the 14 schools participating in the program this fall, the Training school on the campus takes the lead with 32 student teachers. Greenville high school follows closely with a total of 24 student teachers. In addition, there are five students teaching in the West Greenville school.

Out of town centers and the number of students assigned to each are: Tarboro, six; Bethel, four; Ayden, four; Farmville, three; Grainey, two; Kinston, two; Chicod, two; Winterville, two; and Belvoir, one.

Among the 92 seniors engaged in teaching this quarter, Dr. Oppelt's report reveals, the women outnumber the men 62 to 30. There are 37 students teaching in the elementary grades, only one of whom is a man student.

Four EC Students Receive Awards

Four students with excellent scholastic records at East Carolina college have received awards made by Sigma Pi Alpha, national honorary foreign languages fraternity. The awards, given annually, are based on high scholastic averages and participation in linguistic and other extracurricular activities.

Jordan has participated actively this year in the work of the Jarvis Forensic club at East Carolina.
