### Messick Advises New Student Body To Uncover Talent

Freshmen and other new students at East Carolina received a welcome last Tuesday morning as a general assembly in the Wright auditorium officially opened the Twenty-Sixth. Annual Orientation Program and marked the beginning of the fall quarter of the 1954-1955 term.

President John D. Messick of the college extended greetings to approximately a thousand men and women who are beginning their college work this week. He described East Carolina as an institution which is rapidly expanding and stated that its record for growth places it as a leader among Southern colleges.

More than 4,000 students registered for work offered by the college during the 1953-1954 term, he said. The size of both student body and faculty has increased rapidly, especially during the past eight years, he stated. The college curriculum has on expanded and improved during is period, he added; and standrds of instruction have been raised. "Have a dream of what you wish to accomplish during your college years and of what you wish to become

in the future," Dr. Messick advised the newcomers, "and try to make this dream come true." "Conquer the curriculum," he urged as he discussed academic work. He also encouraged new students not to

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

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
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
