Dr. Marshall opened the session and started the discussion by citing several cut systems used by different American colleges. It was noted that many schools of East Carolina's size leave the problem of excusing absences to the individual professors. An excess number of cuts would be recorted to the dean and filed with the student's permanent record. One of the good points about this system is that it would eliminate complicated mechanics such as the long excused absentee lists. Several committee members, however, thought that this system would be too variable, depending upon the professor. Dr. Marshall favored a system used by Clemson University which is based on scholastic average and seniority. For instance, a student with a four average would be allowed one cut . allowed optional attendance for a grade average of one for entire college work. Dr. Marshall pointed out that he liked this system because "it would induce higher scholastic averages and because he had found that cutting centered maily around sophomores and freshmen." Dean White expressed her views

about the present system by saying that she thought it would be fine if it were handled in the right way. In connection with Dr. Marshall's Clemson Proposal, she agreed that seniors might be allowed more liberal cutting.
