Katsias Answers Top Questions

In a question and answer interview with an East Carolinian reporter Monday night, SGA president Mike Katsias made comments on various topics of interest to the student body. He commented generally on such topics as an honor system, sororities, and a change in the freshman orientation program.

The president was first asked if and when he thought a two party political system would function on the campus.

Katsias commented, "I do not believe a two party system will spring up in the next year or in the near future."

How do you feel concerning the literary magazine, "The Rebel?"

"I am in favor of continued support."

What is your comment on Bobby Hall's proposal for the magazine at the SGA meeting?

"I believe it is a sound resolution which has been gone into with vision. With its passage it will serve as a real reflection that the SGA in the coming year will seek thorough answers to any questions regarding campus publications."

I am for further cooperation between all publications and the SGA."

Will you support East Carolinian editor Kathryn Johnson's policy to greatly increase the number of newspapers issued to the day students?

"I am wholeheartedly in favor of any sound action taken by Kathryn Johnson to provide more papers to the day students."

What action do you plan to take on later hours for coeds?

"I was sincere in my campaign proposal to look into this problem. During this past week I met with the Women's Judiciary to get their backing on this recommendation. This question may be decided on this week."

Would you support national sororities on campus?

"I will support national sororities when enough girls express interest and desire for their establishment."

There has been talk of your intention to initiate and work on the re-vamping of the freshman orientation program. What are your plans?

"During the summer months I plan to make trips to the college and work with Dean Jenkins in seeing that more student interest is indoctrinated in the course. One falacy in the orientation classes is the factor that the hand book is not stressed. We at East Carolina have an unusual opportunity with our orientation program which lasts an entire quarter instead of the usual one week most colleges provide. This time should be used to stress student government and other activities on campus."

What do you intend to do about an honor system?

"Concerning an honor system, we have an honor code which many students are not aware of. The code is stated in the hand book and the only falacy connected with it is that it has not been enforced."

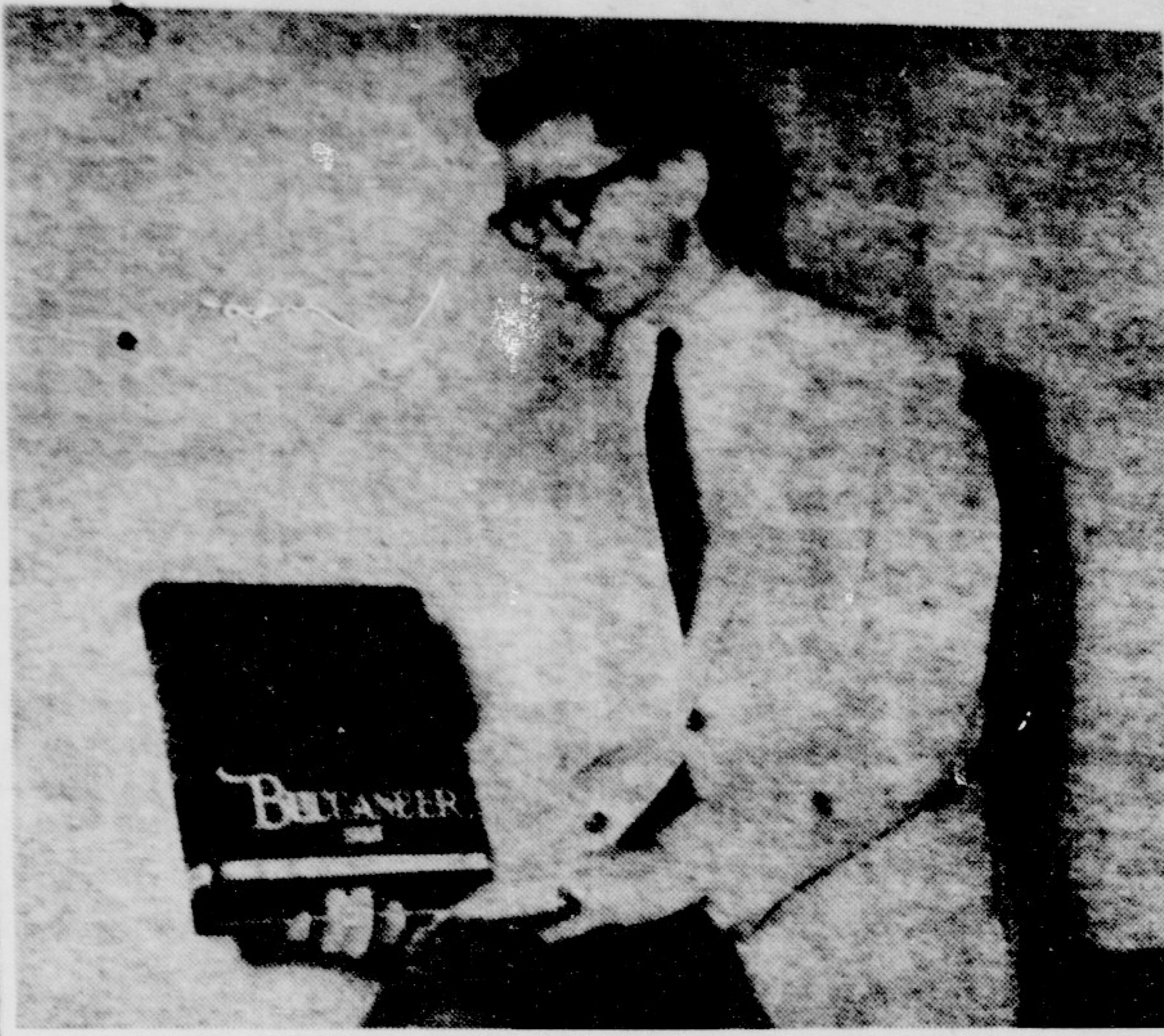
Do you intend to do anything about a new system?

"Attempts were made last spring and they did not materialize. It is my hope that a thorough study will be made and a definite conclusion reached."

You have stated previously that you will insist on a strict interpretation of the constitution. Clarify your statement.

"I believe that good or bad as the contents of the constitution may be, if it has been approved by the students, then it is the official law of

Other changes made are the separation of the faculty and staff members, a preview of each football game in the sports section, and a preview of the contents to follow given by the division pages.

The resolution for extension of the literary magazine, "The Rebel," was passed by the SGA last Monday night. The magazine will exist for the coming year under a temporary basis, printing a minimum of one issue per quarter with 1500 copies per issue. At the end of one year the student body will vote during SGA elections whether or not to continue the magazine on a permanent basis with all the privileges and responsibilities of the present publications. The magazine, with Bryan Harrison as its editor, will have a staff of five for its working organization.

The deadline for material for the handbook from all organizations and fraternities is May 12. The forms for this information may be secured at the SGA office or from Ann McKay, handbook chairman. Organizations and fraternities are reminded that in order for their group to be represented in the handbook, this information must be submitted by this deadline.

Katsias stated that he plans to set up a special committee next fall to name the streets on campus. He related that the college will send four delegates to the National Student Congress in Ohio this summer. During the next academic year campus delegates will be sent to various seminars and conferences.

World Statesman Allen To Speak At Commencement

North Carolinian and present United States ambassador to Greece, George Venable Allen, will address 778 graduating seniors during the forty-ninth annual commencement Sunday, May 18, in Christenbury Memorial Gymnasium.

The ambassador is a Durham native and graduated from Duke University and Harvard. Beginning his career as a school principal and later as a newspaperman in Asheville, he entered the U. S. foreign service in 1930 and experienced various positions in the far East and Europe.

After serving a number of years with the Department of State, he became ambassador to Yugoslavia in 1950 and in '53 he was appointed ambassador to India and Nepal. An author, lecturer and award winner, the Phi Beta Kappa has received the Robert Wiods Bliss foreign service essay award and the Sumner prize in International Relations.

The speaker will be introduced by President Messick at the 10:30 ceremony in the gym. Guests will be admitted in the gym by bids only. Each graduate can receive his three allotted bids at the Alumni House. The gym will seat approximately 3,200 guests. After the procession enters the remaining seats will be offered to standees.

A special stage will be built at the north end of the gym. The graduates, special guests, trustees and members of the state legislature will be seated on the basketball court. The college choir and orchestra will be positioned in front just below the stage.

East Carolina College orchestra, conducted by Kenneth N. Cuthbert, will begin the exercises by playing an orchestral prelude followed by the processional, "Pomp and Circumstance" (Elgar).

The college choir under the direction of Carl Hjortsvang will sing "O, Most Blessed Jesu" (Banks) and "Praise to the Lord" (Christiansen). Seniors Barbara Harris, soprano, and Stephen Farish, baritone, will sing "I Waited for the Lord" (Mendelssohn).

As each senior's name is called by Mr. Wendell Smiley, he will proceed across the stage and receive an empty tube. The actual diploma will be given later by his department head. After the conferring of degrees, the graduates, as tradition demands, will sing the "Alma Mater" (McDougle). The recessional will be "March of the Peers" from Iolanthe (Sullivan).

Rehearsal Saturday morning, May 17 at 8:30 in the gym, is compulsory for all who plan to graduate. This year women may wear dark dresses and dark shoes. Men will wear dark trousers, white shirts, dark tie, and black shoes. Men wearing Master's robes are requested to wear a coat.

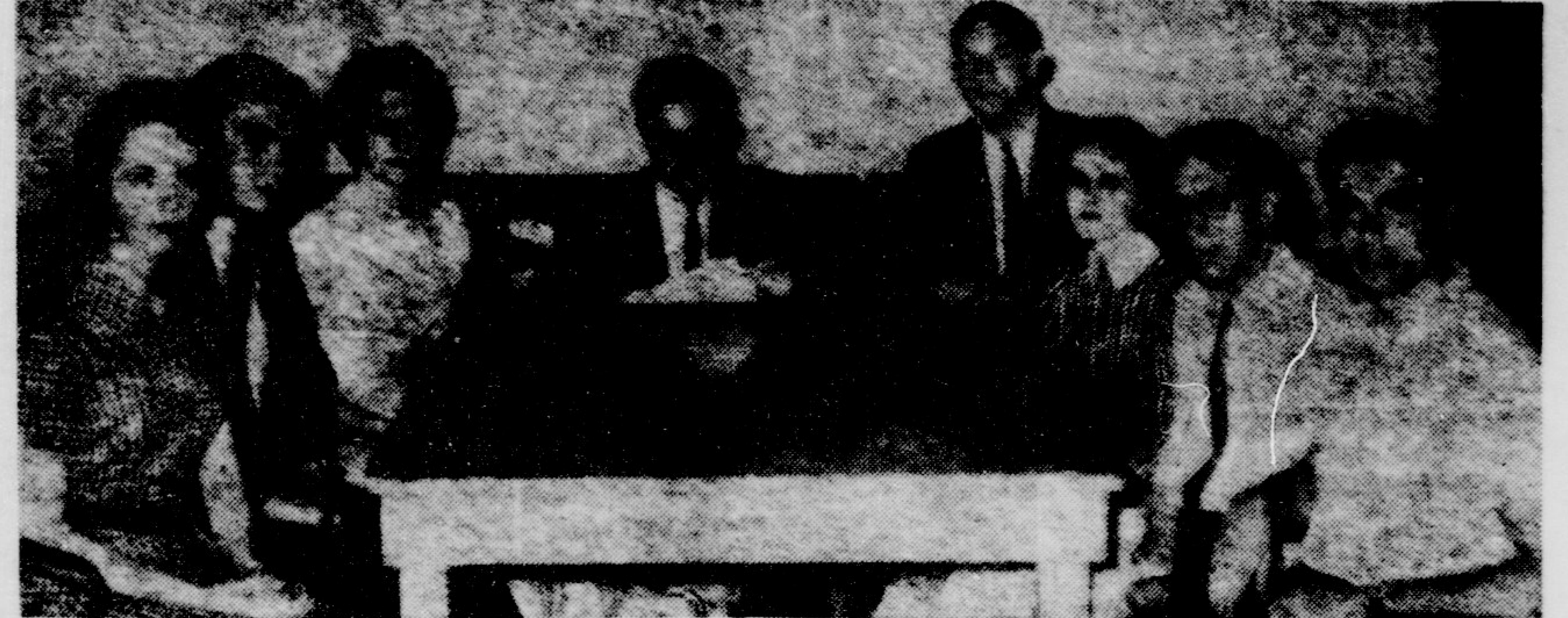

Katsias Leads Motion To Reject Constitution For New Senate Plan

In a surprise move, SGA President Mike Katsias relinquished the chair Monday night to personally present a motion to reject the proposed constitution which had been revised to include the senate plan.

The Student Legislature passed the motion, which stated: "I move (1) to reject the constitution, due to shortage of time; (2) to advise the legislature and administration to take action and vote on a constitution to be taken to the students and voted upon no later than the coming fall quarter."

Commenting upon his motion, President Katsias said, "It was not my intention of rejecting the work of the constitutional committee of the previous administration, but to remove the errors in the constitution before bringing it to the legislature for final approval. If there had been passage of the constitution as it now stands, a score of amendments would certainly have followed."

Earlier in the meeting, upon receiving and studying the proposed constitution, several members questioned various points. Upon the motion of Bobby Hall, the SGA acted as a committee of the whole to discuss the proposed constitution and any other proposed constitutions or plans of student government. During this committee discussion, Hall presented a plan which would include a house of representatives as well as a senate.

Hall explained that the senate plan would cut out the clubs, fraternities, and other organizations from participating in the Student Govern-

ment Association, and that the SGA should not limit to approximately thirty-eight voting members participation in the student legislature.

In his suggested plan, the senate would be composed of the first vice-president, who would serve as president of the senate, chairmen of the men's and women's judiciaries, eleven senators-at-large, four day students senators, the treasurer, and the seven standing committee chairmen. The house of representatives would be composed of the second vice-president, who would preside over the body, clubs, fraternities, and dormitory presidents, and the assistant treasurer.

The executive council would be composed of the president of the SGA, the first and second vice-presidents, the executive secretary, historian, treasurer, assistant treasurer, and chairmen of the men's and women's judiciaries.

Monroe Defends Proposal
After this committee discussion Bucky Monroe, a member of the old legislature who had worked on the constitutional committee, defended the proposed constitution, explaining

Announces Budget Policies

The treasurer of the SGA has announced that the following standing rules of the budget committee will be enforced this year:

All organizations desiring to request appropriations for the coming year must put in their request by May 10. An itemized list of what the appropriation will be used for is necessary and should be turned in along with the request.

Organizations receiving money will be expected to stay within the amount appropriated. Any organization that goes over their appropriated amount will be declared responsible and they will have to pay their remaining bills, etc., in any way they see satisfactory.

All theatrical organizations such as the East Carolina Playhouse and the Production Committee that use the Student Government appropriations to put on plays, etc., will return the money made on the plays to the SGA treasurer and the money will be placed in the SGA Regular Term Fund. that they had been aware of a few loopholes, but that a change was needed, and the proposed constitution would be a working beginning.

It was at this point that President Katsias relinquished his chair to Vice-president Bubba Driver, and after questioning the adequacy of the constitution, presented his motion of rejection.

Discussion following brought out the point that the senate plan had been approved by the student body, but has not yet been approved by the Advisory Board, which will have to pass on it.

At the end of the discussion on the motion, Hall called for a vote and the motion made by Katsias was carried.

President Mike Katsias stated, "The past administration should be complimented for bringing about moves to change the present legislature—his motion to reject had nothing against the organization of the new constitution, but as I've stated before, we need time to work out any and all conflicts before passage of a constitution which will affect the entire student body."

The money for the overdue bills will not be taken from this organizations appropriation but will be taken care of in any other way this organization finds satisfactory.

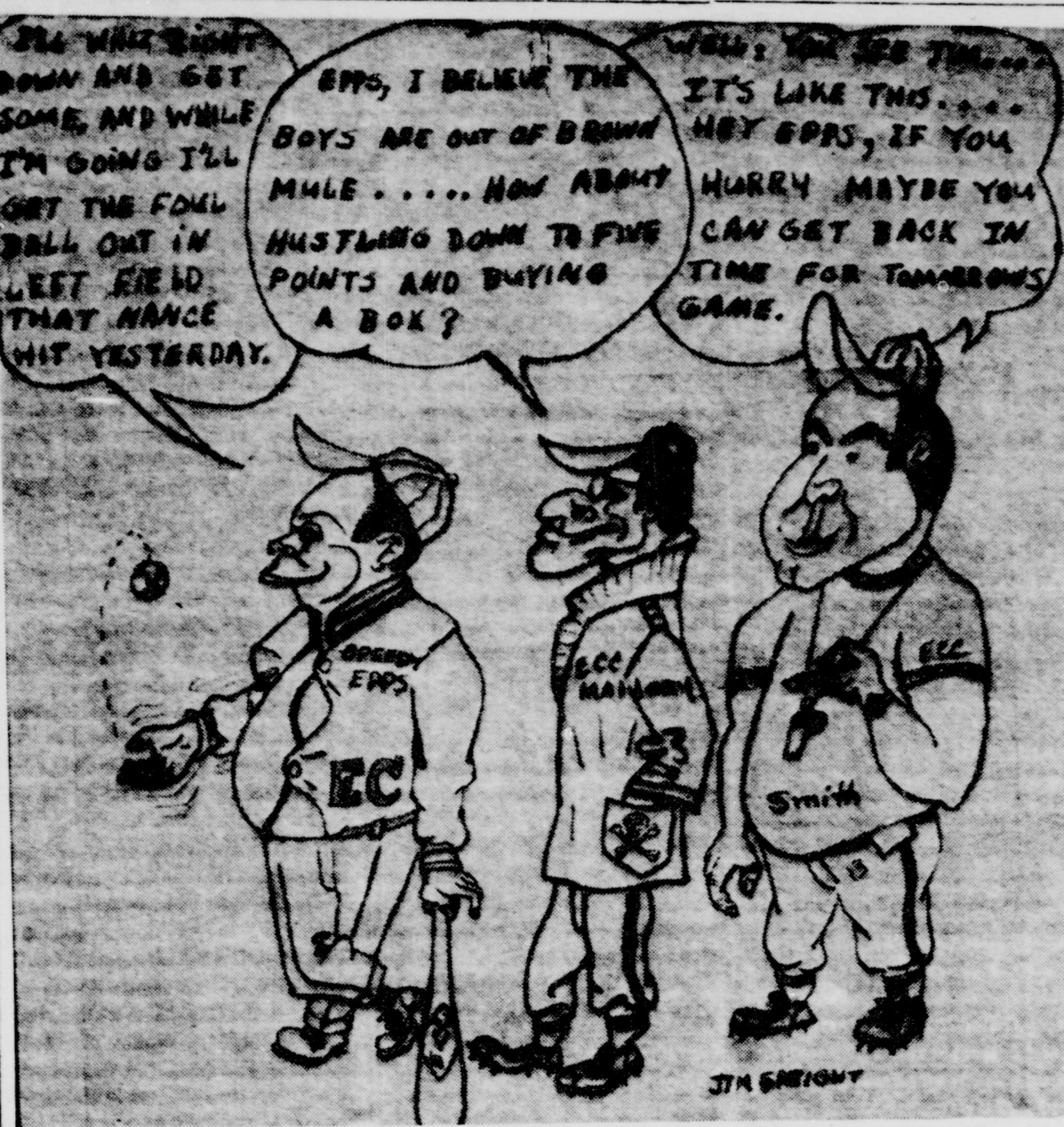

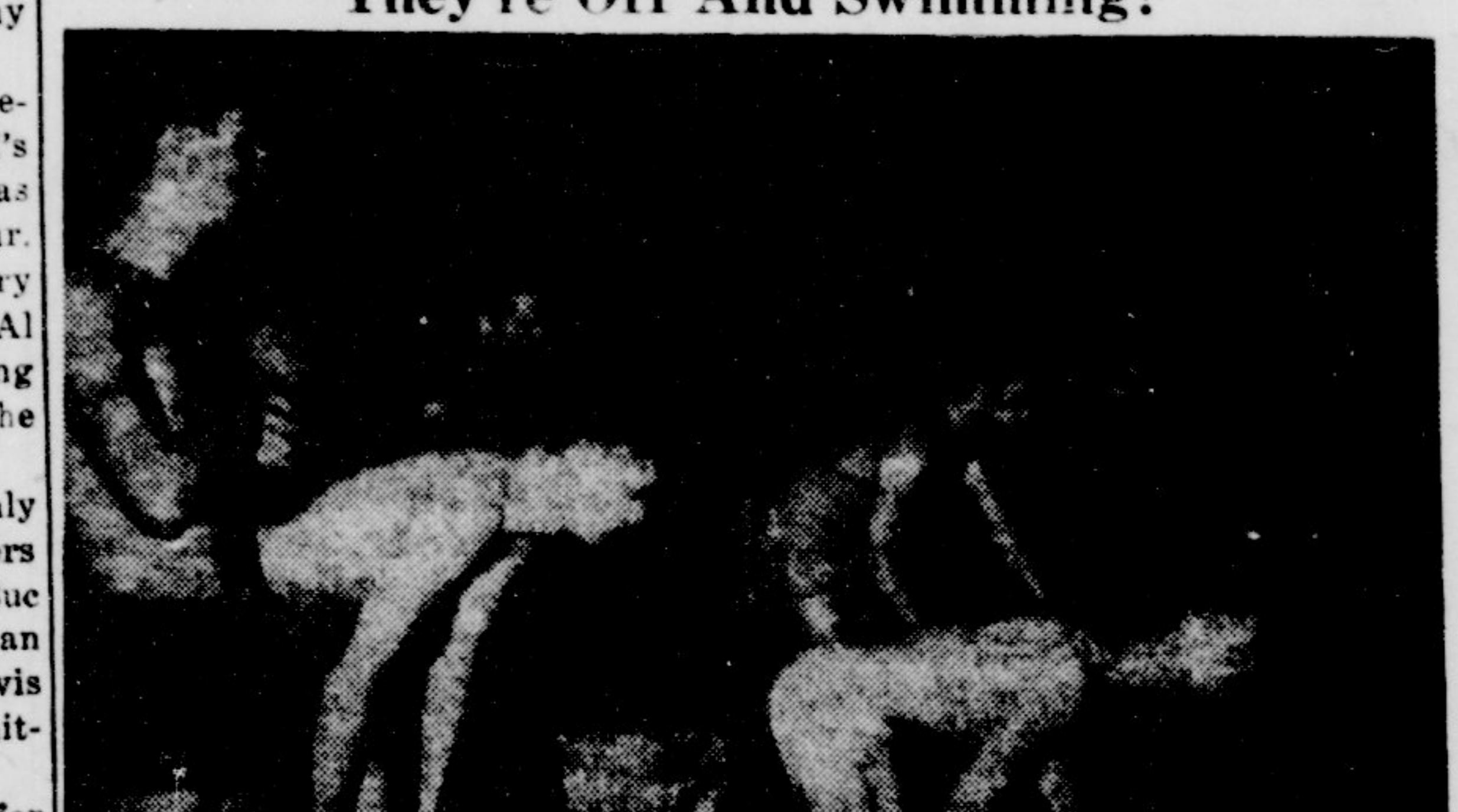
Kappa Sigma Nu Takes First Spot In Relays At Annual Watershow
