

## S. G. A. Holds Elections Tuesday

### Greene States 15 Point Program

Eddie Greene, present vice president of the Student Government Association, is one of two candidates seeking next year's presidency.

Greene establishes his campaign on the following fifteen point plan: 1. A Student Complaint Committee to which students may voice their views. 2. A student evaluation of the faculty. 3. Campus political parties involving a party system which will arouse student interest. 4. Delivery of East Carolinians to every room. 5. Revamping of S.G.A. standing committees. 6. An executive council reform. 7. Permanent rooms for judiciary, honor councils, the legislature and committees. 8. A secretary for campus publications. 9. More positive steps toward better entertainment. 10. A campus Barber Shop. 11. A better parking situation. 12. Betterment of campus telephone system. 13. Better relations with other schools. 14. Continuous work on cut system. 15. Expansion of freshman orientation.

Greene stated that his fifteen point plan was developed through experience with the S.G.A. and from ideas given him by fellow students.

He also said the following in reference to the student body: "I have enjoyed the opportunity of representing you as Vice President and would appreciate the opportunity to serve you in the coming year. If you see fit to elect me as your president I will at all times be happy to have you make suggestions to the S.G.A. The Student Government is for you but cannot function without you. The coming year will be a challenge—let's work together and meet the challenge."

Vice President Greene has numerous qualifications and has served in the following three areas: 1. Student Government Association, 2. Inter Dormitory Council, and 3. Fraternity Affairs. Examples of qualifications consist of S.G.A. Vice President, Elections Chairman, Chairman of Appeals Board, Entertainment Chairman, IDC Vice President, IDC Most Outstanding Member, Chairman of IDC Judicial Committee, Parliamentarian IDC, Vice President Fraternity Bowling League, President of Phi Kappa Tau.

Greene is also Chairman of the Student Cuts System. Working with Dean Mallory, he states "We are going to arrive at a compromise between the students and faculty. Though the Faculty Senate has not yet voted on the cut system, most people who are involved and have commented feel that it will be passed. The compromise consists of 2 cuts for 4-5 hour classes, 2 cuts for 3-hour classes, 1 cut for 2-1 hour classes, and unlimited cuts for Junior-Senior courses."

#### CLASSES DISMISSED

Classes will be dismissed on Monday, March 22, from 10:00 a.m. until 11:00 a.m. for a meeting in Old Austin Auditorium. All of the candidates for the spring elections will be present to express their platforms to the students. The student body is urged to attend and support their candidates.

Spring elections will be held Tuesday, March 23, from 9:00 a.m. until 5:00 p.m. on the East Carolina campus as students vie for Student Government offices and the respective class positions.

Precincts will be situated at strategic campus locations for the benefit of the students. Voting booths will be maintained in all dorms except Woman's Hall for the use of dorm residents. Students may also cast their vote in the College Union or Wright Lobby. During the breakfast and lunch hours, booths will be open at the main cafeteria.

The powerful office of the SGA President is sought by two candidates, Eddie Greene and Bill Hunt seek the position now held by Jim Mahan. The SGA Presidency is the most powerful office attainable by a student.

Other SGA offices at stake include Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Historian. All of these offices play a vital role in voicing student opinion at East Carolina.

Candidates for SGA Vice President are Mark Meltzer, Keith Scott, and Steve Sniteman. The ever-present possibility of a vacancy in the Presidency makes this office very important.

Two coeds are seeking the Secretary's post in the SGA, Ronda Biesecker and Lisa Green.

Treasurer candidates are Garland Askew, Paul Hersh, and Jim Kinsey.

The office of Historian of the SGA will be filled by one of these three candidates: Betty Gail Caviness, Pam Dalton, or Steve Tolley.

These thirteen candidates are seeking their respective offices for the benefit of East Carolina College. They deserve your support at the polls Tuesday.

### Meltzer Gives 2 Proposals To Improve & Aid Students

My name is Mark Meltzer, and I am a junior History-Political Science major. In my past three years at East Carolina I have served on the Dean's Advisory Council for two years and the Foreign Film Committee for one year. As a Brother of Alpha Epsilon Pi Social Fraternity, I have served my chapter as President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer. I am now serving my second term as President. For the past two and one-half years I have served on the Interfraternity Council on the social and judiciary committees.

As a candidate for the office of Vice-President of the Student Government Association, I sincerely feel that I have the vital experience and qualifications to handle the job well. My plans in total are to give efficiency and dignity to this high-ranking office. Yet even more importantly the office of Vice-President of the S.G.A. is responsible to you, the Student Body, and your satisfaction with active, dynamic leadership and foresight. I feel that I can contribute these qualities to our S.G.A. Its inability and faults in the past have been mainly due to this lack of leadership and creativity. I plan to instill it into the system to insure a better, more responsible organization.

However, these generalities must be backed by specifics to have meaning. I have two such proposals. One, I shall organize a committee from the S.G.A. to look into the possibility of setting up a school-sponsored organization whose purpose it will be to place E.C.C. students in summer jobs related with their major fields. This could be a significant step in the betterment of the entire student body at E.C.C. Other colleges possess a job-finding system set up on this basis. Under my heading of this committee, a new dimension of Student Government

Activity can be initiated. Secondly I propose that active participation by all E.C.C. students be encouraged in various campus activities. Although this might be tacitly understood now, it will be of greater benefit to the student body if the various organizations were advertised and diversified to encourage greater participation. ### Hunt Gives Views On SGA Faults

SGA Presidential candidate Bill Hunt is dissatisfied with the past actions of the student government organization and believes East Carolina must revamp its student governing body.

Hunt bases his campaign on five assertions "which must be made in behalf of the students". These include: (1). The SGA has not represented the students in the past; instead, the candidates have worked for individual advancement. (2). The SGA has wasted much money and time on idealistic programs of the future when the present student body deserved attention. (3). There is now a generally apathetic attitude on the part of the students toward the SGA due to lack of information. (4). The student body has no "spirit of unity" due to the failure of the SGA. (5). The SGA in the past has been composed of 100 people instead of the 6000 people who really form the student government.

Candidate Hunt says that "The SGA has used slogans, sermons, and anything else that would bring in votes." Particularly disturbed by lack of immediate action on the part of the SGA, he cites the traffic problem on Tenth Street as well as the much-discussed cut system as examples.

Hunt seeks a more practical approach to the ordinary problems of the student body by quick and decisive action by the representatives. "I do not believe in this policy when there are so many problems confronting the students at this time."

"I take the stand that we are offered two choices: (1). We continue on the same lines that we have been for the last two or more years, or (2). We can now instigate changes that will inflate some of the deflated areas that are now in question."

### Sniteman Praises SGA, Urges Students Interest

You have much to be proud. You are the best qualified students in the history of East Carolina College, and you show it. You are the stu-

dents that have given ECC its reputation, and it shows it. You are the students that fill the classrooms, support the athletic teams, and acquire the individual awards, and they show it. Yes, you as students have much to be proud and your accomplishments are great indeed.

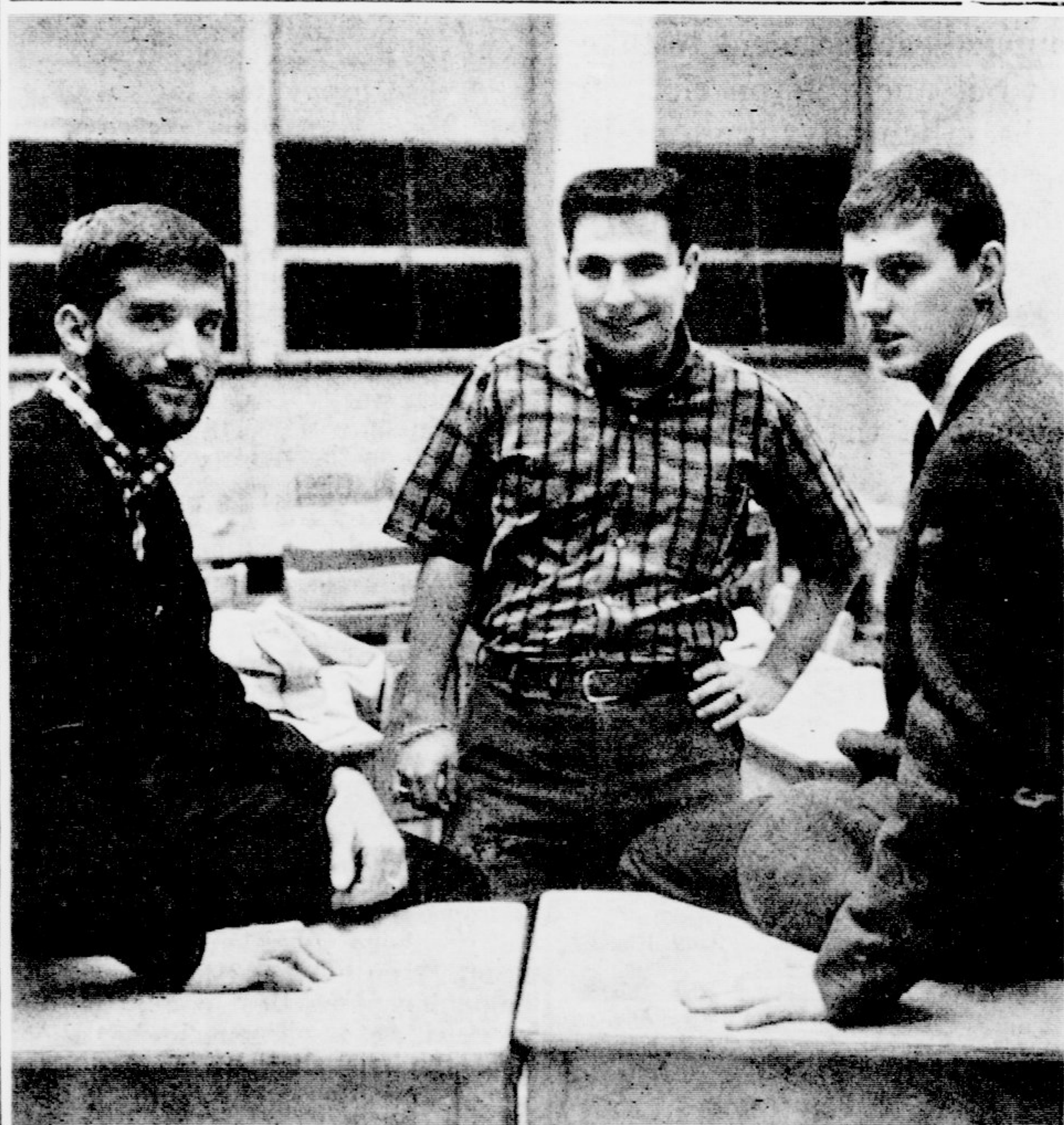

To The Editor:

The students of East Carolina, often accused of being apathetic and indifferent to the world around them, have an opportunity on next Tuesday to refute this view. Those who espouse this view are often only those who seek a platform on which to degrade the school or elevate their own interests. I for one believe that when confronted with the really important issues that confront us, those who live and work and give up four years of their lives in order to attend EC will render an opinion on all issues that is worthy of the school and their own interests.

That opportunity on next Tuesday is the annual SGA elections. That opinion is the election of Eddie Greene for SGA president. In this election we are confronted not with a real choice, but with a challenge. Will EC move forward in the coming year in matters of student government? The real issue here is experience. ## Kimsey Offers Experience, Recognizes Responsibility

To whom will you entrust the spending of \$165,000.00 of your money? When you vote for your S.G.A. treasurer next Tuesday, you must make your decision of who is going to be the guardian or the spend-thrift of this sum. Perhaps the idea of \$165,000.00 seems enormous, but this is the amount that the treasurer must administer among the some 35 organizations which draw from the student fund. It is a big job. If a strong experienced hand is not in the position, the student fund could be quickly and easily depleted.

Experience and awareness of the functions of the S.G.A. has led me into varied situations which I feel make me qualified for the job. This year as President of the Junior class, I have learned the responsibility of working with a large number of people while remembering that it is the individual student that is important.

As a member of the student legislature, perception has been gained of the needs and operation of the different S.G.A. sponsored groups. My administrative knowledge has been broadened through work with the S.G.A. executive committee. While working with such groups as the Athletic Capital Improvement Committee, Cut System Committee, and the College Ring Committee, I feel that I have gained insight as to the needs and wishes of the student body.

I would strive to be just to the organizations when approving a budget. It is the duty of the treasurer to see that organizations get the money they need to function properly; however, I do not feel that budgets should be highly over-estimated. Over allocations leaving amounts in excess of \$5,000.00 should be considered more thoroughly.

I would like to see a closer and more detailed check on organizations who spend money without proper authorization.

As the system now stands, each

organization furnishes its own receipt book. I advocate closer check on incoming funds by the use of pre-numbered receipt books which would be issued by the treasurer.

Although the treasurer is not a ruling officer, his administrative ability will often be put to the test. If he should not do his job efficiently, your money might be mishandled. Consider my familiarity with student government procedure before voting. I am willing to take the responsibility of working for you.

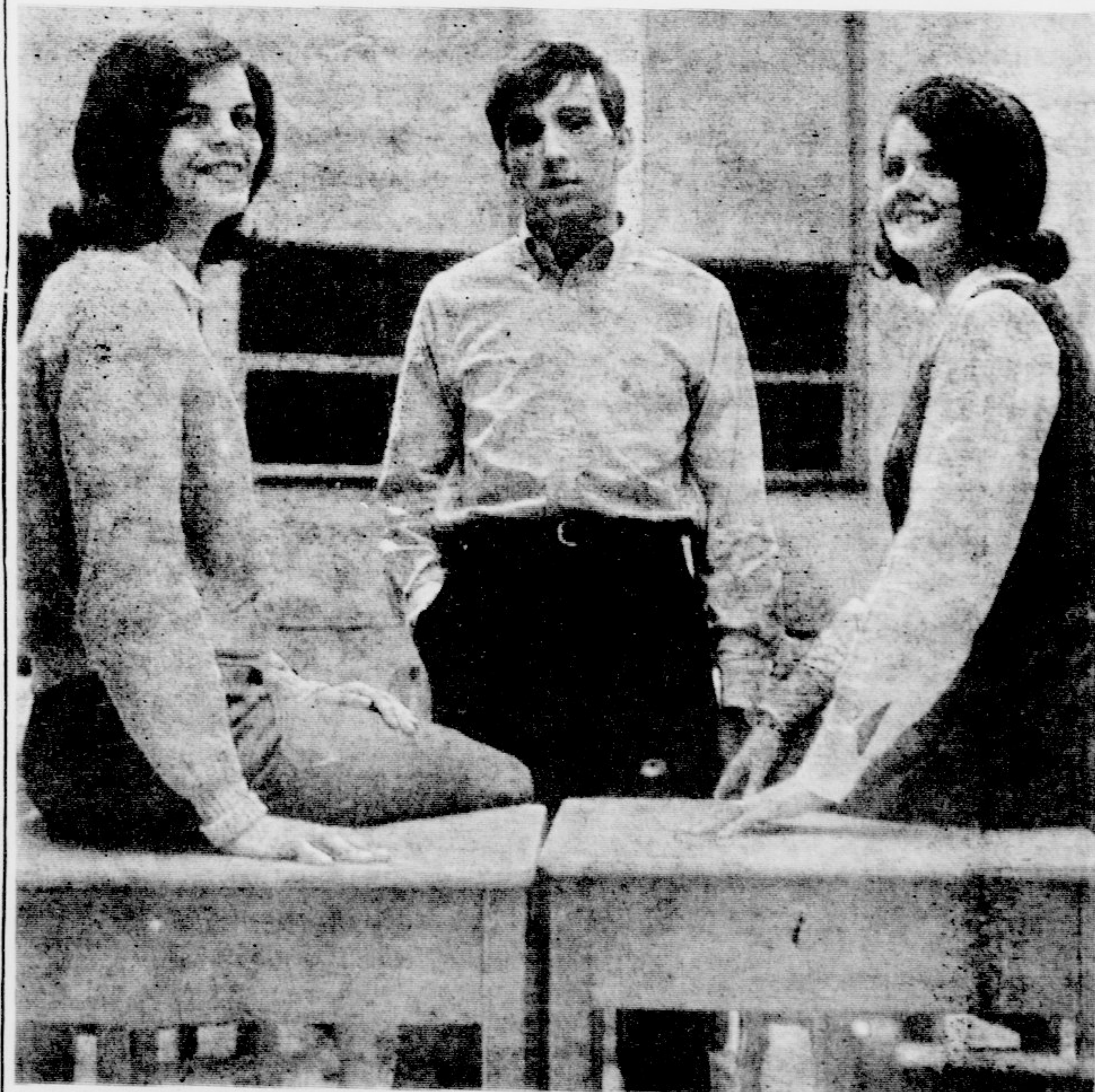
I, Roland Tolley, am running for the position of SGA Historian not for the sake of my own personal advancement, but for the very simple and, I think, important reason that I can do competent job.

A pathetically small crowd of 500, composed of townspeople and faculty with a handful of students, attended the Civil Rights Debate at Memorial Gymnasium on Monday.

Mr. David Witchard, editor of the Greenville Daily Reflector was the moderator. Mr. James Jackson Kilpatrick, editor of the Richmond News Leader, supported the conservative view, and thus represented the negative side. Mr. Mark Ethridge, Editor of News Day and former publisher of the Louisville Courier Journal, supported the liberal point of view, and in turn, the affirmative side. After introduction of the two guests, Witchard stated that each side would have twenty-five minutes speaking time and then five minutes for rebuttal. After that, the audience would have a chance to ask questions. Mr. Kilpatrick spoke first.

To introduce his remarks, Mr. Kilpatrick stated that the Negro revolution is genuine it is not Communist inspired—although the Communists are exploiting it. Mr. Kilpatrick outlined his speech which would concern five areas: Voting rights, freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, public facilities, and fair trial.

He believed that the President's speech to the Congress asking for more voting rights for the Negro would not help and more regulations would subvert the constitution. "None of the legislation on civil rights has helped," he stated. No Negro Virginian is being held back from voting. However, only seven counties in Virginia have more than 50 percent of Negroes who vote. Voting rights cannot be given while destroying states' rights. When this is done, it is "equalization going mad." Right of speech can not be suppressed, however, it is not an absolute right, he stated.

Segregation in public facilities should not be condoned. However, integration has no place in privately owned property. Mr. Kilpatrick does not believe the sociologists' conception that the reason Negroes have high crime rates and high illegitimacy is because of their environment. His remark on this was, "Bash, it is the Negroes fault."

Mr. Kilpatrick ended his speech

by stating that the Negro problem will be solved in the south before the problem is solved in the North since the South has lived side by side with the Negro for 300 years. However, the Negro must develop an attitude of taking care of himself as others do.

Mr. Ethridge claimed that Mr. Kilpatrick's screams of states' rights are, and have always been used to cloak the segregationist's fight against civil rights. The doctrines of states rights have never worked and never will because it conflicts with the conscience of the nation and the world. Editors, professors, and ministers who have a great deal to contribute to the South, have left the South because they can't give any contribution because they have to fight segregation. Besides chasing good contributions away, segregation has ruined many public school systems. The Prince Edward County case, which Mr. Kilpatrick has condoned, is a prime example. Mr. Kilpatrick claimed that no Negro Virginian has been held back to vote, but Mr. Ethridge cited white primaries, literacy tests, grandfather clause, and the poll tax as deterrents.

The problem has become so extreme, according to Mr. Ethridge, that segregationists have tried to prevent Negroes and whites from looking through the same window in a factory, along with separate water fountains.

There has never been equality for the Negro. Even when it became apparent that the Supreme Court would outrule segregation and the

whites made a wild dash for the schools for Negroes. Students received \$166 and \$115. Mr. Ethridge's statement was a question: "If you've got to stay in the South, you've got to stay in the South."

After the rebuttal, Mr. Ethridge asked both men to step forward in searching the audience. One man in the audience criticized both men and turned made him look foolish.

Mr. Kilpatrick has stated that the Negro states helped the Negro.

Through the Boards of Mental Hospitals, and other institutions.

Mr. Kilpatrick asked, "If you were refused service in a restaurant?"

I would be outraged, he said, not the question, the question is, "If you were refused service in a restaurant?"

Mr. Ethridge said, "If you have moved North?"

The only time my father went North is when my mother went up to Appomattox. We were not too hospitable. Haven't been back since."

Mr. Ethridge asked, "How do you yourself a Southerner?"

My father was born in Mississippi. I was born in Mississippi. I went to Ole Miss."

To end the debate, Mr. Ethridge offered to talk about the situation later over a glass of bourbon. Mr. Ethridge accepted the invitation with the stipulation that the bourbon be Kentucky than Virginia bourbon.

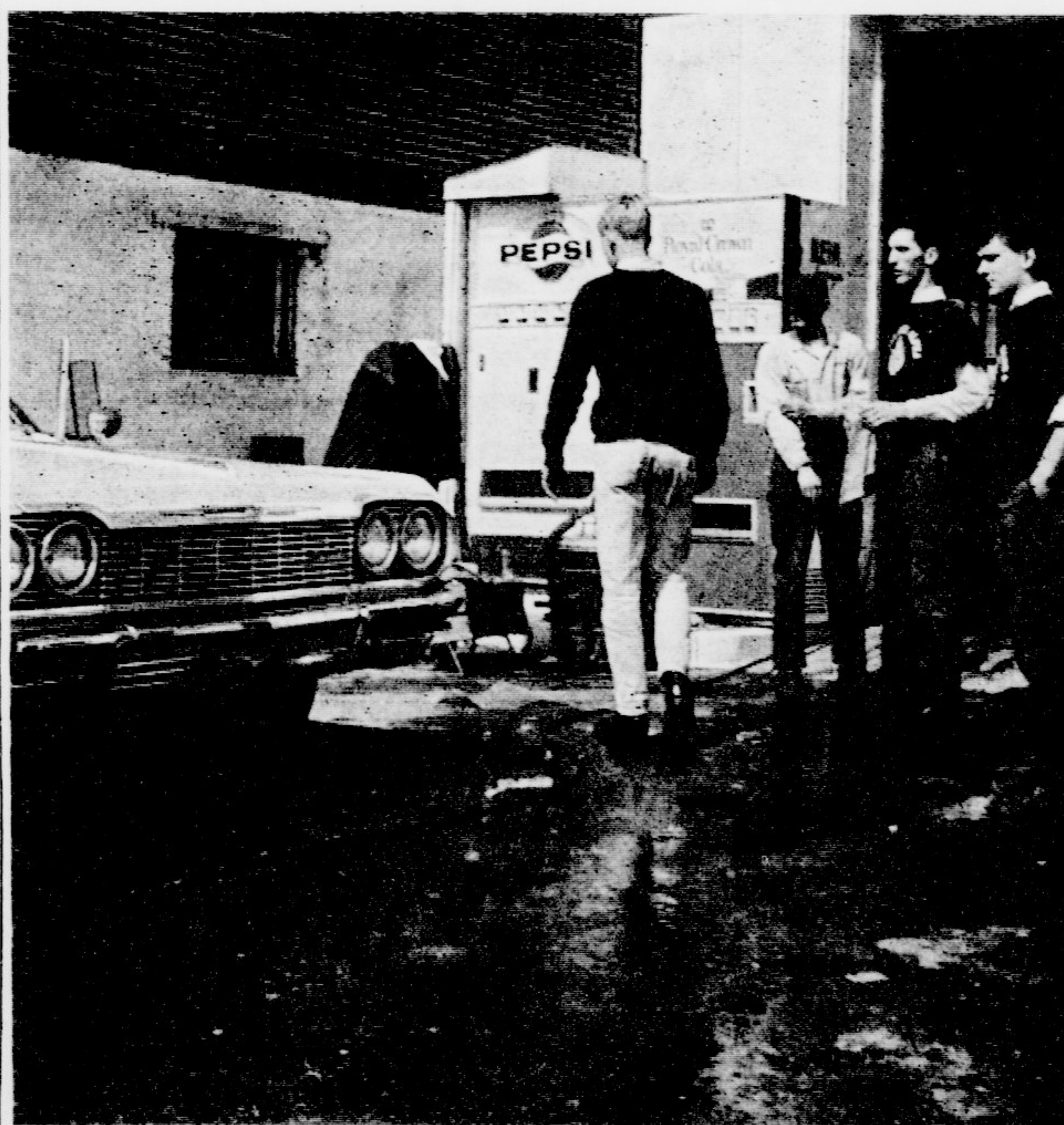

# Shaw Leads Soph. Laden Tennis Squad As Captain

Bane Shaw, a senior, will lead a sophomore-laden tennis squad as captain this year. Although the squad is relatively young it doesn't lack experience as four freshmen earned letters last year. Although the record last year was 10-8 it is rather misleading. Because of the inexperience of last year's team, the Pirates had a disastrous first half season. As they reached the midway point the team matured and the squad finished the season on a winning skein of 9 matches, to finish the second half of the season undefeated. Now with much of last year's squad returning and with the benefit of another year of competition behind them, the prospects for the tennis team are the best in many years.

Of the lettermen Bane Shaw is the only senior and his three years of varsity competition should help him provide a stabilizing influence

on the squad as captain and number one man. Shaw was also the top man last year and went into the finals in the N.C.A.A. regional tennis championships in the doubles match, and into the semi-finals in the singles. Among his other achievements are the Carolina's Conference Singles Championship and the number 4 ranking among tennis players in the city of Charlotte.

Frank Cook will be in the number two spot this year. As a freshman last year, he held down the third position on the squad and did a fine job. Cook is a South Carolina boy who, like Shaw, is ranked fourth in his home city of Charleston. A lot is expected from this rising sophomore this season.

Moving into the third spot will be Ron Hignite, a local Greenville boy who is moving up a notch from last year when he occupied the fourth position as a freshman. Ron won

the singles championship in the Greenville tournament in 1964 and is looking forward to a bigger year in 1965.

Wayne Amick rounds out the returning lettermen. Another sophomore, Amick held down the number six post last season, but is expected to move up to the number four spot. In competition in 1964 Wayne distinguished himself by winning the Burlington City championships in the doubles and mixed doubles divisions.

A senior who spent some time in the number six position, Kelly Wills, will be back again this year to battle for one of the top spots. On the squad who add the needed depth this year are: Mike Star, a senior and Billy Turner and Ron Simmons, sophomores. With these men pressing the starters the team should hold a sharp edge all year long.

For the first time in East Carolina's history there will be a freshman tennis team since we are entering the Southern Conference and the Conference rules require separation of varsity and freshmen. Thus this year the freshman will be playing their own schedule of freshman games. Some of the promising freshman prospects this year will be: Chuck Taylor and Bob Marshall, who ranked one and two respectively on the Rocky Mount High School squad last year, Joe Spencer, who was number one man at Ashboro High School, and Charles Van Middlesworth, who was top man at his high school in New Jersey.

The tennis team is now in its third week of practice and will be ready to open on March 29 against Rider College here at East Carolina. As things stand now the tennis team should have a high successful season.

## Track Team Lacks Depth

As track begins again at East Carolina, coach Baxter Berryhill is faced with the familiar problem of lack of depth on this year's squad. Although he has some outstanding performers, most prominent of whom is Whitty Bass, he has few men to back them up. There are only 26 men on this year's squad and that is a small squad by any comparison. But Coach Berryhill expects some fine performances from some

of the members this year. Probably the best track man to compete at East Carolina, Whitty Bass will be expected to carry a heavy load this year. Whitty will run the 441 and the 881 yard runs this season. During the winter track season this year, Whitty turned in a 1:55.3 seconds time for the 880, which is a tremendous performance, and rather amazing when you consider that it was the first time he had ever run on a wooden track indoors. Coach Berryhill feels that Whitty will easily be one of the best 880 men in the nation and will be aiming for the national championships.

Lee Brinson will back Bass in the 440 and 880 and greatly help to add depth in these two events.

In the distance runs the squad has been greatly hurt by the loss of the number one distance man, Al Bishop, due to illness. Bob Lecour has stepped in as the big man in the distances but there is a great lack of depth in this area. Lecour has come a long way this year and he is expected to improve even more. Charles Hidson is a promising prospect but is still only a freshman.

In the sprints, senior Mike Handy leads a group of young and some what inexperienced sprinters but this will be a problem area this season.

Terry Willis, a 31 year old father, will carry the load in the hurdles. Coach Berryhill rates Willis one of the best 330 yard hurdle men in the Southern Conference but here again there is no one to back him in this event. Willis, father of a 6 year old boy, should have a good season, regardless of the depth here.

Buddy Price will lead East Carolina in the pole vault. In indoor competition this year Price cleared 13 feet 6 inches and should do even better when he moves outdoors this season. In the high jump, Jerry Allen is the varsity jumper. He is backed by two outstanding freshmen candidates in Mike Tomberlin and Henry Stevens.

The field events are a particularly weak area. Erwin Roberts is the only varsity man in the area and will have to carry the load in the areas of shot put, discus and javelin. There are several freshman prospects with potential but only the season will tell exactly how this area will shape up.

The 1965 outlook depends mostly on the few big men on the squad but depth will hurt the squad over the season. There are enough boys on campus to give East Carolina a full and competent squad but unfortunately there just hasn't been the turnout for this important sport. It's really a tragedy because East Carolina could field a fine team if it had a little depth. But with determination and desire the Pirates should manage a successful season.

## Council Offers New Study Abroad Program

This summer the Council on Student Travel will offer a new kind of intensive orientation designed to prepare students for academic study abroad. Special nine-day orientation programs conducted on board three late summer sailings of the Council's chartered student ship, M/S AURELIA, are being planned specifically for the American students who will be going abroad in record numbers this year to study for a semester or year at a foreign university.

By the fall of 1965, more than 20,000 undergraduates and graduates will be enrolled in over 320 foreign study programs sponsored by U. S. colleges at universities and study centers in Europe, Asia, Africa and Latin America. As the numbers increase, so does the importance of preparation and planning on the part of program administrators and students. The Council's 143 member organizations and universities which sponsor overseas programs for students held an international conference in Cannes, France during January, 1965 at which educators expressed deep concern over the lack of adequate preparations among American students for the experience of living and studying in a foreign university community.

The new program is planned to help students make the transition to a different culture and academic situation. A team of educators and specialists will coordinate orientation activities on eastbound sailings of the AURELIA leaving New York on July 29, August 19 and September 9. Forums and discussions on national and international political and cultural issues will be complemented by a series of art lectures, daily language classes and foreign films. Practical information and advice will be provided on study and travel in various countries, a ship's newspaper will be printed daily to keep passengers informed of world events and the shipboard schedule, and a variety of recreational activities will be offered including deck sports, dancing to the ship's orchestra, chess and bridge tournaments.

A student en route to the Sorbonne might begin a day at sea by practicing his French and then attend a forum on "French-U. S. Diplomatic Relations." Later he might go to a slide lecture on "Current

Trends in French Art" and participate in a panel on the Revolution in America. The day's schedule might include a forum on the "Philosophy of Education" or a lecture on "Social Issues in France." Recordings of Debussy or Bizet perhaps join a group on deck to French folk songs or learn traditional folk dances. An information on travel, sightseeing and student accommodations would answer questions about spending vacation in the Chateau de Brittany.

This extensive program presents the most recent expansion of the Council's operations to a transatlantic transnational orientation for students and is a feature of its services. There are a total of ten east and westbound voyages of the AURELIA during the summer on which the Council will shipboard activities adapted to specific needs of the students on board and at no extra cost. Space is still available on most sailings, but should be as soon as possible as wait forms for passage, as well as information on all aspects of travel, may be obtained on request.
