

The Party System? . . .

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Statistical willing

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A few weeks ago there existed a vague question as to whether or not a two party political system had come into its own at East Carolina.

Today, there is adequate and convincing evidence that political parties are probably with us to stay and oddly enough in a very balanced fashion.

To date, the executive slate of officers shows up with two UP members and two SP members. The party that will hold the majority power in the SGA next year depends solely on whether Layton Getsinger (UP) or John K. Meares (SP) captures the office of Treasurer.

The party system is not terribly strong as indicated by the recent election. In the beginning, it appeared that the two parties had the confidence of the students as no independent candidates appeared on the final ballot for executive positions. Fortunately or unfortunately . . . the students of East Carolina did not truly support the two party system. Once again students voted for the person and not the party. Apparently the candidate for office still holds priority with the people. It will be interesting to see how well a split-executive branch can work together. Steve Moore (SP), SGA President and David Lloyd (UP), Vice President, have before them a task which will require a united team in order to represent the students. These two executive officers apparently have the ability to do the job before them if they do not allow individual party goals to rule their thinking while in office. Steve Moore has frequently stated that his ultimate goal is to serve the students of East Carolina through the SGA, putting all other ties behind him. We hope the same will be true of all the newly elected executive officers. It may be difficult to begin with a split-up among the two parties, but in the end the SGA will only function effectively if the party bind is thrown off by all officers. A balance of power in the SGA looks basically safe, fair and challenging to every one involved. The Student Government Association should be the heart, soul and spirit of our student body. The SGA officers elected to serve the student body have the potential to bring the students into the inner workings of the SGA. Since our SGA is based primarily on a 3-7 democratic constitution, it is only right and fitting that it should be the students' voice.
