"Will the tax payers of our city express themselves upon this subject by directing personai communications to the clerk of the board of audit and finance with a view of giving an expression, to continue or adjust the debt, in keeping to our ability and in justice to those who will be here when we are gone? owners or those representing bonds against our city, or to be answered by bondholders in paying for printer's ink.
