In this case, John A. Richardson, the  
Solicitor, prosecuting for the State, maketh oath:-  
That he is informed and believes that it would be  
difficult for the State to have a fair trial thereof in  
the County of Robeson, for that there exists in the  
County of Robeson a band of outlaws, known as  
the "Bowerie Outlaws," whose head-quarters are  
in the region of Robeson County known as "Scuffletown",  
where the deceased, Stephen Locklier, lived, and  
with whom, it is the common impression, the deceased  
was in sympathy:- That in consequence of said  
common sympathy, and the many grievous wrongs  
which the citizens of Robeson County have sustained  
at the hands of the aforesaid Outlaws, public  
sympathy is so strong with the said Thomas  
Brady, that the act of killing the said Stephen  
Locklier, with which he is charged, is looked  
upon, and by very many persons in said County  
is considered, to have been a good deed.

Wherefore, and for that the State desires that  
a fair and unprejudiced jury may be the  
more easily and certainly had to try this cause,  
affiant asks that the Judge presiding cause  
the same to be removed to some other County of
