INFORMATION

All departments of the college will be in operation during the summer sessions.

The same procedures are followed and the same regulations apply during the summer sessions as during the regular school year.

Certificates may be renewed in a six weeks term; credits may be earned toward a higher certificate, and toward graduation.

The Commercial Department will offer courses this summer for the first time. This work leads toward a teacher's certificate in Commerce.

Instruction in Piano is offered as usual during the summer sessions by the Music Department.

The summer school at East Carolina Teachers College offers abundant opportunities for wholesome recreation to its students. Four tennis courts recently resurfaced; a new municipal swimming pool; a new baseball field; a good volley ball court; the weekly motion picture show in the college auditorium; an attractive entertainment course; and the regular social hour in the Robert H. Wright Building each evening, are some of the attractions available.

A series of attractive entertainments will be offered during each term of the summer school, in addition to the usual picnics, barbecue lunches, watermelon cuttings, etc., which are provided for summer school students.

The tuition fee of \$10.00 per term is included in the charges given above.

Credits earned during the summer sessions are sent to the State Department of Certification at Raleigh promptly at the close of the session, provided record cards furnished for this purpose have been filled out carefully by the student and then left with the Registrar of the college.

Students desiring transcripts checked or college credits evaluated before making up their summer term schedules should submit transcripts and request the check at least one month before the session opens.

No credit will be given for a course in which a student misses more than six class recitations. Students may register not later than one week after the opening of either summer session.

The two-year curricula at East Carolina Teachers College will be discontinued at the close of the summer session 1937, in conformity with an order of the State Board of Education. After the above date it will require three years of college work to secure the Primary or the Grammar Grade "B" Certificate.

After 1938 the State Department of Certification will not issue the Primary "A" certificate and the Grammar Grade "A" certificate merely on the earning of 120 semester hours, but will require the completion of college graduation requirements.

Students working for advanced certification should take notice of the two changes in Certification requirements mentioned above. Rooms in the men's dormitory will be available during the summer sessions.

At least two educational field trips will be offered during the summer 1936; one through the New England States and Canada, carrying 9 quarter hours credit; and one to the Southwest including the Texas Exposition and probably Mexico, carrying 12 quarter hours credit.

Credit earned on an Education field trip may be used as elective hours on any four year curriculum in the college, and they may be used to raise or renew teachers certificate.




