THE 1968 OUTLOOK

This is Coach Tom Quinn's third year in a reconstruction program for basketball at East Carolina and it appears that the biggest stride yet has been taken.

Quinn, who actually had no time to recruit before his first campaign, has depended heavily upon the junior college ranks to bolster the program, but this year figures to have a team which also will feature players who he recruited as freshmen.

One of them, Jim Gregory, is looked upon as a potential great. Although only a sophomore, he looms as a pre-season choice for a starting job and certainly will see plenty of action if he does not nail down one of the corner spots.

Gregory, the leading scorer on the freshman team, is a former all-state football player and basketball player from Elbert, W. Va. "He is a natural, who has a sixth sense about being where the ball is," Quinn says. "He could make us a very tough team with a hasty transition to varsity competition."

Gregory hits from outside the rim or more inside and has the quickness and size to be tough under the basket. "I feel he's one of the top young sophomores in the East," Quinn says.

The veteran nucleus includes three starters from last year plus Richard Keir, a co-captain who was the sixth man last season. Leading scorer in the returnees is Earl Thompson, one of Quinn's junior college transfers, who is one of the most exciting players ever with the Pirates.

Thompson, who has above average speed and elusive moves, can drive the basket well, but is most dangerous from 25 to 35 feet with a one-handed jumper. He set a school record of 41 points in a single game last year and had 13 straight free throws on the spree.

Jim Modlin, a junior and one of Quinn's recruits as a freshman, appears to have continued the improvement that marked his play at the end of last season. Big and strong, Modlin has added weight and lost none of his mobility, and his shooting touch is better than ever. He's big enough at 6-7, 220, to pick up the three-point play with frequency and pressure doesn't bother him, as was evidenced by his play in the conference tournament last year.

"Modlin had his best game of the year against West Virginia, despite the fact he was a sophomore and might have shown his inexperience in that pressure situation," Quinn said.

The other starter returning is Tom Miller, an outstanding freshman scorer, who was forced to assume the role of playmaker early last year when Capt. Jim Cox broke an arm in the first game. The added responsibility hurt Miller's shooting, but he is expected to regain his form this year.

Keir, who possesses an unorthodox style, was frequently a valuable contributor to the cause last year as a sixth man and infrequent starter. He was voted the most improved player on the squad by his teammates and is expected to be in the thick of things for a starting job.

Another veteran on the squad is Bob Lindfelt, a 6-5 reserve, who at times last year showed potential.

Three junior college transfers are expected to help considerably. They are Rich Collins, at 6-9, Aubrey Williams at 6-4, and Jim Kiernan, a 6-0 backcourt man.

"They can be a big help and fortunately they appear to be working right into the system," Quinn says. "We certainly anticipate getting off to a better start this year than we did last year, although our first game is with a very tough foe, W. Va.





Kirk Stewart begins his second session as assistant basketball coach along with his freshmen coaching duties for East Carolina.


Stewart was named to the All-Metropolitan team his senior year in high school at Northwood High School in Silver Spring, Md., where he averaged 24.5, second in the state.



TERRY WILLS Trainer





No. 22 [33], 6-2, 170, Backcourt, Senior, Greenville, N.C.






JIM GREGORY




MICHAEL DUNN






Although not a regular on last year's freshman team, he proved steady in spot situations. A hard worker, he shows improvement and should see action as a reserve.



He is the son of Mrs. Essie Williams and is a political science major.




JIM KIERNAN




RICH COLLINS



He is married to the former Barbara Sullivan of Greenville and they have three sons, Jim, Gary, and Danny.



CLARENCE STASAVICH ATHLETIC DIRECTOR



Clarence Stasavich is now in the midst of his seventh year as head of the East Carolina University athletic program. Stas came to Greenville to take over the post, along with the reins of head football coach, in July, 1962.

During his career which stretches over 22 years, he has become known as one of the nation's finest single-wing football coaches, and ranks in the top 10 in the nation among winners. He has only had one losing season at East Carolina, a 4-5-1 mark last year.

Born in the "Land of Lincoln" Stas is a native of Georgetown, III. He was honored by a group of citizens from there in 1966. The group presented him with a plaque just prior to the Pirates' meeting with Southern Illinois University.

Stasavich received his Batchelor's degree from Lenoir Rhyne College, Hickory, N.C., in 1935, and his Master's from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill in 1947.

While attending Lenoir Rhyne, he was an outstanding athlete in all sports with his greatest skills displayed on the gridiron. In 1933 and 1934, he was named to the Charlotte Observer's "Flaming Five," which honored the top five athletes in North and South Carolina.

He took his first coaching job at Campbell College in 1935 then returned to his Alma Mater, Lenoir Rhyne, in 1938.

In 1942, he was called to active duty with the Navy where he served as a com-

manding officer of a LST in both theaters of war. Following his discharge, in 1946, he returned to coach the Lenoir Rhyne Bears, and remained there until joining the Pirate crew in 1962.

While at Lenoir Rhyne, his football team won nine conference championships, and took the NAIA National title in 1960.

Honors have been heaped upon Stasavich during his coaching tenure. Among these are American Football Association's College Coach of the Year 1964; NAIA Coach of the Year 1959; District Coach of the Year in 1960, 1961, 1963, 1964 and 1965. He was elected to the Helms Hall of Fame in 1960.

He has appeared as lecturer at many National Coaching Clinics and has authored many articles on the Single Wing attack.

At East Carolina, he teams have won three bowl games, two Eastern NCAA Small College championships and a share of the Southern Conference title.

He is an Elder and Sunday School teacher in the First Presbyterian Church in Greenville. He is a member of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Cerebral Palsy Hospital, and of the Board of Directors of the North Carolina Sports Hall of Fame. He is listed in Who's Who in the Southeast, and was 1966-67 chairman of the Christmas Seal campaign of the Tuberculois Association.

He is married to the former Helen Warlick of Hickory, and they have three children, Rebecca, Mary Helen, Walter.

Minges Coliseum, the home of East Carolina University's basketball team, is a show place in itself, but it is only part of an ever-expanding complex of facilities that is generally recognized as the finest overall in the Southern Conference.

The basketball arena seats 6,500. An addition to Ficklen Stadium, which is just adjacent to the Coliseum, has brought the football seating capacity to 20,000.

Also in the immediate area are one of the finest 440-yard tracks in the Southeast, with bleachers, and two baseball diamonds, one of which has a grandstand.

The coliseum also houses an eight-lane swimming pool which was used for the AAU short course championships last year and a wrestling room and gymnastic equipment. Elsewhere on campus there are tennis courts, and a soccer field and a fine five-mile cross country course. The golf team competes at Brook Valley Country Club, which has a demanding championship course.


The projection for Ficklen Stadium is a horseshoe arrangement that will eventually seat in excess of 40,000 people and the area between the stadium and Coliseum is being landscaped to provide a beautiful walkway between the two facilities.

In all, East Carolina competes on an intercollegiate level in 10 sports and four others, lacrosse and crew, gymnastics and karate are contested on a club basis.


Considered one of the most important additions recently to the growing facilities, is a field house that includes modern training room equipment and a laundry which is operated by the athletic department.

SWIMMING PREVIEWS

Despite the loss of four All-Americans, the East Carolina University swimming team will be shooting for its fourth straight Southern Conference championship. Gone from last year's championship team are backstroker Mike Tomberlin, breast-stroker Owen Paris along with divers Dick Tobin and Les Gerber.

The Pirate swimmers will be under coach Ray Scharf, his first season as head coach, although he assisted Coach Ray Martinez for the past two years. However, the road to the championship will not be an easy one. The Pirates will have the toughest schedule ever with such powerhouses as South Carolina, N.C. State, North Carolina, Florida, Florida State, Maryland and the University of South Florida. The East Carolina swimmers will also compete in the Eastern Seaboard Championships at Yale University this March.

Nevertheless three All-Americans remain at East Carolina. John Sultan will be defending his Southern Conference championships in the 400 yard individual medley, while All-America breaststrokers Steve Weissman and Larry Alman will battle it out for top honors at 100 and 200 yards. Also returning is co-captain Robert Moynihan, who holds the Southern Conference championship in the 200 yard freestyle. Moynihan will also see action in the 100 and 500 yard freestyle events. Sultan, the other co-captain, will attempt to fill in the gap left by Owen Paris, Sultan is called the best all-around swimmer on the team by his coach. The butterfly event will be one of the fastest events for the East Carolina swimmers. Leading the way will be high school All-America Doug Hartman and Bill Lafferty, while Ken Hungate and Greg Hanes will add strength. Jim Manchester and Steve Howard, both fine distance swimmers, will return and adding strength will be freshman Tom Kruzel, Gary Frederick and Kevin Tracy. Frederick is a versatile swimmer and can be tough in any event from the 50 to the 1650. The leading sprinters, Eric Orrell, Ed Mills, Jim Griffin and David Brunson should give the Pirates the depth they were lacking in the sprints last season. Bob Baird is the only returning diver and will have a tough job trying to replace Tobin and Gerber.


INDOOR TRACK



FIRST CLASSIC HAS TOP FIELD

The latest addition to the expanding sports picture at East Carolina University is the Eastern Carolina Classic, which will be played in Minges Coliseum, Dec. 26-28.

The Tournament idea was conceived by Dr. Leo W. Jenkins, president of East Carolina, in early November of last year. In less than three weeks, local business firms had underwritten the venture to the tune of \$50,000 and Coach Tom Quinn was in the process of lining up a field.

Although getting started at a relatively late date, Quinn lined up an outstanding field and the tournament is already being mentioned in the same light as the old Dixie Classic that became one of the nation's top events before it was disbanded.

In the field are the Air Force Academy, Baylor, Cornell, Delaware, William and Mary, Virginia and Virginia Tech. Host team East Carolina drew Cornell of the lvy League in the opening round, while top-seeded VPI faces Delaware. Other opening round games pit William and Mary against Baylor and Virginia against Air Force.

The three-day tournament will feature two sessions of two games each day.
