

Nov. 23-1918.

My dear Pa -
We are still remaining at the old front and its beginning to get quite lonely and tiresome up ^{there} for the Germans have been gone a week and now most of the French and other American Regiments have departed. In fact we now see very few troops except those of our Brigade. We have not been able to find out what we are going to do but we now understand that probably we will join our Division in some back area of France and eventually be sent home from there and not be sent into Germany. We are

now going back to our old
schedules of drills etc that
we had before we got to
the front and these naturally
are pretty tame and uninteresting
after having gone thru the
real thing but the men have
gone at it remarkably cheerfully
and having something to do
makes the time pass so much
quicker than just waiting
around for moving orders.

I hope you are
feeling as well as usual. I have
not gotten a letter from
home for some time now and
miss them terribly. I did get
a letter from Bessie this
week dated Oct 20.

There's nothing interesting
to write right now but hope
my next letter will be written
from a more lively place.
