Although nearly two months have passed since v the SGA Spring election, the office of Student Government President has yet to be filled, according to Libby Lefler.

Lefler, one of three candidates for the office in the May 28 election, was awarded the presidency in an appeal decision by the SGA Review Board April 9.

Lefler's opponent Brett Melvin immediately appealed the Board's decision to ECU Chancellor Dr. Thomas Brewer.

Brewer, after nearly two weeks of deliberation, found in favor of Lefler by upholding the Review Board's ruling. Libby Lefler was named SGA president for the second time on April 20.

But Melvin blocked Lefler's appointment by appealing Brewer's decision to the ECU Board of Transvers. Although a preliminary committee of the

Activities will include volleyball, basketball, badminton, horseshoes, and swimming. Couples with young children are encouraged to attend, and



Women's funds to include travel expenses?

TRAVEL MONEY. High school boys who are college varsity recruits get it. Girl athletes don't. Women's rules still stop schools from paying for campus trips for potential varsity players.

Recruiting high school women may not have become a 'never-ending process,' but three or four contacts with one student and high telephone bills are becoming more common, according to Gloria Ray, women's athletic director at the University of Tennessee at Knoxville.

College coaches can have travel paid when they go on 'talent assessment trips,' but are forbidden by women's athletic organization rules to speak to either athletes or parents while on the trips.

Because little scouting is done, videotapes are a mum source of finding talent for women's programs. Women who attend high schools with no videotape equipment, or whose families can't afford to pay for a videotape, can only hope college coaches will come to see them in action.
