

identified in a lawsuit only as "Rosie J." is challenging the Legislature's decision making it difficult to receive money from the state abortion fund for the procedure.

Lawmakers approved a bill this year that cut funding for the fund - designed for low-income women - from \$1.2 million to \$50,000. Money now is only available for those ineligible for Medicaid and only in cases of rape or incest or when the life of a mother is in dan-

ger.





Senior Writer Recently Joyner library celebrated another year of support from its sponsors at the annual Friends of the Library banquet where staff took the occasion to present the newest addition




"We thought the banquet was a great opportunity to present the print," said Joyner's North Carolina librarian, Maury York, adding that the university is fortunate to have the print. According to York, very few complete sets of the Audubon prints remain intact today, and this newest addition is the only print of its kind in the li-

brary. "The 'Great Carolina Wren' print was purchased as an individual, one of 435 published," York said. "Audubon did a series of bird paintings and later did prints of them. The set was broken up at some point, and this one was purchased separately." "Great Carolina Wren," which shows two wrens perched on a dwarf horse chestnut and is framed with a hand-col-





