Dr. Dionna Manning, Director of the Education Community Scholars and Education Living and Learning Community, facilitated and accompanied her students on the trip.

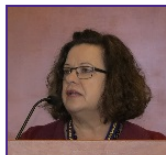

Legislative Session Law requires a shift from Lateral Entry to Residency licenses by June 30, 2019. Some new hires are already being hired on Residency licenses, and we want to assure our partners that ECU stands ready to work with you to serve these new teacher hires. At ECU, we have designed our Residency Model and are moving forward with curricula approvals this fall. We will continue to offer our successful NCTEACH Lateral Entry Model simultaneously with our new Residency Model until all the

ECU affiliated lateral entry teachers' three-year licenses sunset. We are grateful for the ECU faculty's commitment to both of these pathways. We certainly do not have all the answers on this new model, but we are committed to collaborating with you in the Latham Clinical Schools Network and across the state to serve the needs of alternative route educators.
