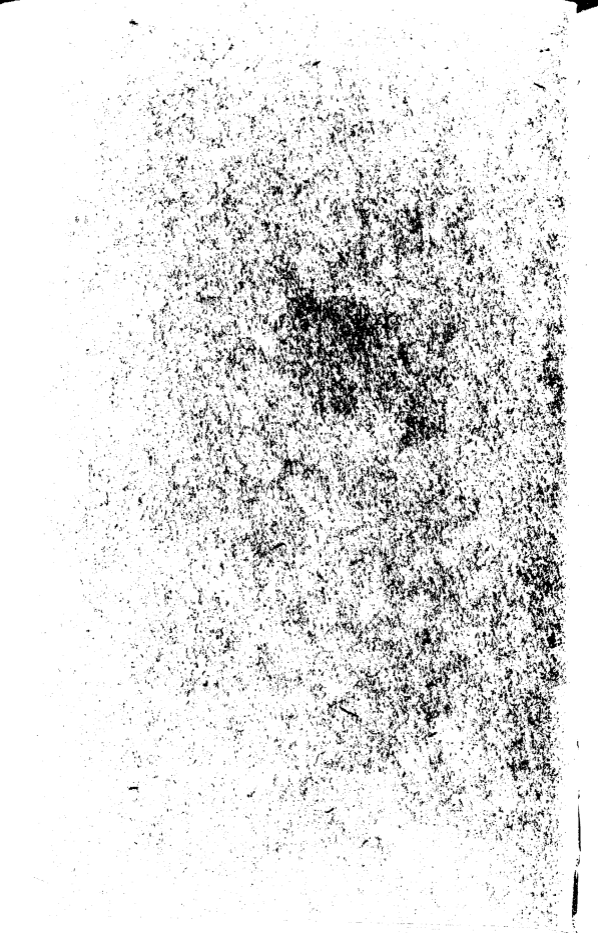

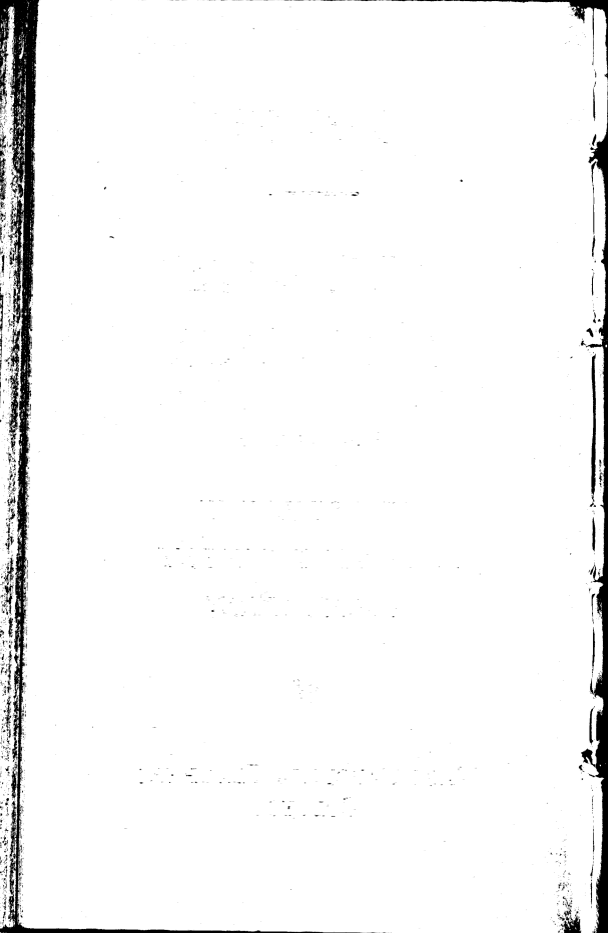

CONSTITUTION

ARTICLE I—NAME

The name of this association shall be the Student Self-Government Association of the East Carolina Teachers College.

ARTICLE II—PURPOSE

The purpose of this organization shall be to develop student honor and self-control; to direct matters concerning college life, not reserved to the jurisdiction of the faculty; to encourage right ideals and promote a sense of personal responsibility in the students of the college; to keep in sympathetic touch and to cooperate with the student government movement.

ARTICLE III—MEMBERSHIP

(Amendment to the Constitution of Student Self-Government Organization)

Section 1.

All students of the college shall be members of the association.

Section 2.

There shall be a fee of \$5.00 per term, payable by every student at registration to the Student Self-Government Association. This fee shall cover all publications and entertainments.

Section 3.

Funds thus collected shall be appropriated by a budget committee, which shall be composed of five students and two faculty advisors constituted as follows:

The president of the Student Government shall be ex-officio chairman of the committee.

The president of the Student Government Association shall appoint each year, within one week after she assumes the duties as president, four members of the Student Government Association at least one of whom shall be a day student, who shall serve on the committee for the rest of the year and for all the ensuing year.

The president of the Student Government Association shall at the same time each year appoint one member of the faculty who shall serve as an advisory member for a period of two years.

Section 4.

The budget committee shall meet within two weeks after the opening of the fall term each year and appropriate on the percentage basis the money to be derived from the students' fees for the ensuing year; the funds shall then be paid over by the Student Self-Government Association, as collected, to the different organizations that are to receive such appropriations.

Section 5.

The appropriations made by the budget committee shall be subject to review by the President of the College.

Section 6.

All money collected under this section of the constitution shall be appropriated for the purpose of entertainment and publications.

Funds thus appropriated shall be administered by the committee elected or appointed, by the organizations sharing these funds.

Section 7.

The budget committee shall have power to grant to college organizations special permission to give entertainments for which they may charge admission.

Section 8.

The President of the Student Government Association shall appoint in January, three students and one faculty member to serve on the entertainment committee. The faculty member appointed shall select two other faculty members to assist her.

ARTICLE IV—MEETINGS

Section 1.

There shall be three regular meetings of the Student Self-Government Association each year: one as soon as possible after the beginning of the first term in order to read and explain the constitution and by-laws; the second meeting, soon after the beginning of the second term; the third meeting, not later than the first Wednesday in the third term.

Section 2.

Special meetings of the Association may be called by the president upon her own motion and must be called by her upon the written request of twenty-five members. The object of these meetings shall be stated in writing when the request is made.

Section 3.

All members must attend all meetings except when excused by the president or when in the infirmary.

Section 4.

At regular mass meetings, members of the Association shall occupy their regular chapel seats. Students not attending mass meetings, unless excused by the president of the Student Government Association, will be subject to penalties imposed by the Student Council.

Section 5.

There shall be a special course of training in student government for the new girls during the first four weeks in each term. Attendance at these meetings is compulsory. A knowledge of the handbook is required in order to drop this training.

ARTICLE V—OFFICERS

Section 1.

The officers of this organization shall be the president, elected from the incoming senior class; the vice-president from the incoming senior class; secretary, from the incoming junior class; treasurer, from the incoming sophomore or senior normal class; chairman of the campus committee and house presidents, from the incoming senior, junior, sophomore, and senior normal classes. The president must be chosen from those who have served on the Council one year.

A two-thirds vote cast in the election of the president of the Student Government Association shall elect a nominee to that office. There shall be no separate nomination for vice-president of this organization, when the vote for president is cast, the nominee receiving the number of ballots next highest to the number which elected the president shall be named the vice president.

Section 2.

Officers of the Student Government Association shall be nominated at a mass-meeting at least two weeks before election day and shall be approved by the Advisory Board of the Association at least one week before election.

Section 3.

(a) These officers shall be elected by the Australian ballot on the first Tuesday after the first Monday of the spring quarter, to go on duty four weeks after the election.

(b) The president shall be elected by a two-thirds majority. The others shall be elected by a simple majority vote.

(c) Vacancies shall be filled within one week by special election.

Section 4.

(a) The duties of the president shall be to call and preside over all meetings of the Student Self-Government Association and to summon before the Council at her discretion any member of the association.

(b) The duties of the vice president shall be to act in the absence of the president.

(c) The duties of the secretary shall be to record the proceedings of all the meetings of the Association and of the Student Council; to post all official notices; to submit to the Dean of Women the list of members, officers, committees, and other bodies appointed by the Association.

(d) The duties of the treasurer shall be to keep a strict and permanent account of all receipts and expenditures, to collect fines, and to present a report at the annual meeting of the Association.

Section 5.

One class representative from each class shall be elected by her class within six weeks after the opening of the college in the fall, and shall immediately go on duty.

Section 6.

A day student representative from among both boys and girls shall be a member of the Student Council.

Section 7.

(a) The incoming President and Vice-President shall be the delegates of the Association at the Southern Inter Collegiate Association of Student Government. If for any reason only one of these officers may be chosen, the incoming President shall be the delegate.

(b) The President of the Association shall be the delegate to the annual congress of the National Student Federation of America.

ARTICLE VI—LEGISLATIVE DEPARTMENT

The legislative powers of this Association shall be vested in the Association as a whole.

ARTICLE VII—EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT

Section 1.

The executive powers of this Association shall be vested in the Student Council, composed of the officers of the Association, one representative from each of the classes, and the president of the Young Woman's Christian Association.

Section 2.

It shall be the duty of this Council to enforce the rules of the Association and to consider the business of that body. This Council shall have the power to remove members serving on the committees when deemed necessary.

Section 3.

The Council shall have the right to appoint proctors at the beginning of each quarter for the various halls of the respective dormitories. These proctors together with their house presidents, shall constitute the house committee.

Section 4.

(a) Any girl who has been restricted or who has failed a subject must be subject to re-approval by the President of the college before she may any longer be eligible to hold the office for which she has been approved.

(b) Every member of the council shall take

this pledge: "I promise that I will at all times enforce the rules of the Student Self-Government Association, and that I will perform faithfully the duties of my office."

(c) The Council shall require every girl who is brought up before the Council to take this pledge:

"I promise that I will not reveal anything that happens in this council meeting."

(d) The Council according to its discretion, shall punish those students who break this pledge.

ARTICLE VIII—JUDICIAL DEPARTMENT

Section 1.

The judicial powers of this Association shall be vested in the Student Council. This Council may call before it and reprimand any member of the Association and exercise the power to withdraw privileges.

Section 2.

The Student Council shall have the power to recommend the suspension or expulsion from college of any girl whose attitude after warning from the Council shows no improvement or whose continuance in college is deemed harmful to the highest ideals of East Carolina Teachers College.

ARTICLE IX—AMENDMENTS

Section 1.

There shall be an advisory board composed of the President of the College, the

Dean of Women, and three members of the faculty appointed by the President of the College for a period of three years. The President of the College shall be chairman.

Section 2.

The Advisory Board, with the Student Council, shall constitute the School Council.

Section 3.

The School Council shall hold at least one meeting each term.

ARTICLE X—AMENDMENTS

An amendment may be proposed by any fifteen members of the Association, by any member of the Advisory Board, or by the Student Council. A proposed amendment must be approved by the School Council, after which it shall be posted at least one week before it is presented to the Association. An amendment shall become a part of the constitution when adopted by a two-thirds vote of the Association.

BY-LAWS

Section 1.

November 20th shall be Union Pay Day, at which time all dues for organizations here must be paid. When this date falls on Sunday, the following day shall be recognized as pay day.

Section 2. Order of Business.

1. Meeting called to order by the president.
2. Attendance taken by the marshals.
3. College songs, and others, if desired.
4. Reading of the minutes by the secretary.
5. Report from the Student Council.
6. Report of the treasurer.
7. Report of the committees.
8. Unfinished business.
9. New business.
10. Adjournment.

Section 3. House Committees and Duties.

(1)—The duties of the house committees shall be:

(a) To uphold ideals of student government and to enforce its regulations.

(b) To report to the Student Council violations of regulations.

(c) To hold regular meetings.

(2)—The duties of the house president shall be:

(a) To preside over all meetings of her house and her house committee.

(b) To call before her at her discretion any member residing in her house.

(c) To give to all students living in her house, permissions which violate no dormitory regulations.

(3)—The duties of a proctor shall be:

(a) To keep order in her section.

(b) To give to the members of her section such information as the house president may ask.

(c) To appoint sub-proctors in her sections to assist when necessary.

Section 4. Committees.

(1) Social.

The social committee shall have charge of all social functions of the Association. There shall be a social every fall for the new students.

(2)—Point System Committee.

It shall be the duty of this committee to keep a record of the honors and number of points held by each student during her college career.

The maximum number of points a student may hold is ten.

(3)—Campus Committee.

There shall be a campus committee whose duty shall be to look after the appearance of the campus.

to the infirmary at any hour.

1. Quiet must be observed in the library at all times.

2. Students sick in the infirmary may not be visited by other students unless they have permission from the nurse in charge.

3. There shall be reasonable quiet in the dormitories and the Administration Building at all times.

4. Students must stay in the dormitories when they do not attend church and Sunday school on Sunday morning, and during Y. W. C. A. services on Sunday evening.

5. Study hour shall extend from 7:30 P. M. to 10:00 P. M.

6. Five minutes after the ringing of the meal bell, students must be in their places in the dining room.

7. Students must be in their own dormitories at the 10:00 o'clock light signal.

8. Students, after shopping, calling, etc., must return to the campus by 5:45 P.M.

9. Students who do not take music are not allowed in the practice rooms during school hours nor allowed to use the pianos there at any time. They may, however, use the pianos in the gymnasium after school hours.

10. Quiet hour on Sunday afternoon shall extend from 2:00 P. M. to 4:00 P. M.; during spring quarter, from 2:00 P. M. to 3:00 P. M.

11. Victrolas may be played from 3:30 P. M. to 7:30 P. M. during the week except on Saturday, when they may be played from 3:30 P. M.

to 10:00 P. M. On Sunday they may be played from 4:00 P. M. to 5:45 P. M., and from 7:15 P. M. to 10:00 P. M.

II SOCIAL

1. Calling hours are from 3:30 to 5:45 P.M. on week days; from 4:00 to 5:45 on Sundays; from 7:30 to 10:00 P.M. in the evenings.

2. Students who expect company—relatives or friends—must file their own names and room numbers, and the names of the persons who are to come. These must be filed not later than 5:00 P.M. For Sunday engagements the slips must be filed by 5:00 P.M., Saturday.

3. When a student wishes to go calling, she must file her own name and room number and the name and address of the person upon whom she wishes to call. This request must be in the office of the Dean of Women not later than 1:45 P.M. on the day she wishes to call. If she hears nothing further from the Dean of Women, she may assume that the request is granted.

4. After public entertainments students may converse with guests, but must bid them good night before leaving the building in which the entertainment has been given.

5. Students must wear hats when calling or shopping.

6. On leaving or returning to the campus, students must register.

7. Students must have a special permis-

sion sent directly to the Dean of Women from their parents for each out-of-town privilege.

8. Week-end permits must be filed by 10:30 A. M. on the day the student wishes to leave. No permit will be signed after 10:30 A. M. on Saturday.

9. No student is to go home or make any out-of-town visits two week-ends in succession without special permission from the Dean of Women. No student is to leave the college within the first three weeks after the opening of the fall quarter unless given special permission by the Dean of Women.

10. A student must not leave the college for week-end visits until thirty minutes before her train or bus time, and must return within thirty minutes after her train or bus arrives in Greenville, unless she is specially permitted by the college to do otherwise.

III HOUSEHOLD REGULATIONS

A

1. Each student is responsible for keeping her room in order. Rooms are inspected regularly by the matrons.

2. Each student must make up her bed by 9:00 o'clock A. M.

3. Trash must not be swept into the corridors nor thrown from the windows.

4. Students must not drive tacks or nails into the walls, nor paste pennants or pictures on the walls or mirrors.

5. Furniture must not be removed from any room, except with the matron's permission.

6. Students are required to pay for any breakage of furniture or defacement of college property.

7. Electric lights should be turned off when not in use.

8. Needed repairs should be reported to the matron during her office hours.

9. All "found" articles should be taken to the office of the Dean of Women.

10. Absolute quiet is expected in the dormitories between 10:30 P.M. and 6:30 A.M.

B

By order of the State Insurance Department the following rules must be observed:

1. No electric curlers, unless standardized, are to be used in the rooms.

2. No electric irons or stoves are to be used. (Pressing rooms are provided in each dormitory.)

3. No candles nor matches are to be used in the rooms.

4. No gasoline, benzine, or other inflammable cleaners are to be used in the dormitories.

IV CURRICULA

The maximum number of credits freshmen and seniors may take in one quarter is 16. Other students may take 18.

Students are expected to continue through the quarter in the courses in which they register. However, courses may be dropped within the first four weeks of the quarter provided such changes are approved by the teachers whose courses are concerned, the student's advisor, and the registrar. If a student registers for and pursues a course for four or more weeks after registration, discontinuance of such a course will be considered as a failure in fixing the next quarter's program of work.

Students cannot enter courses later than the beginning of the third week of the quarter and get credit for such courses.

Students may drop courses from their programs and take other courses instead provided such changes are made before the beginning of the third week of the quarter and approved by their advisors and the registrar.

If a student makes one or more 5's she shall be required to take three hours of work less than she carried during the quarter the 5's were made.

No student who has failed in 50 per cent of her work shall be permitted to register the next quarter except by recommendation from her teachers to the credits committee and with approval of the president.

No student will be given credit for the removal of a "C" unless the "C" is removed during the next quarter that the student enrolls.

Any student who misses 25 per cent of her class work in any subject will not get credit for the quarter's work, let the cause be whatever it may.

Students must apply for graduation at least one quarter before they expect to graduate.

In order to complete any curriculum in the college, a student must be in residence at least three quarters.

The last quarter's work must be done in residence.

Residence will not be allowed for less than 12 hours of work.

(See catalog for other regulations.)

THINGS TO AVOID

1. Talking from windows.
2. Sitting in windows.
3. Leaving shades up at night.
4. Loud talking and other forms of disorder in the Austin Hall and in the dormitories.
5. Chewing gum in company.
6. Going to town without hats.
7. Reading, writing, or talking during chapel exercises.

GENERAL PRIVILEGES

1. Students may occasionally go riding on any afternoon except Sunday with the approval of the Dean of Women. Students may go

riding with parents and near relatives on Sunday afternoon, and also with parents and relatives of friends provided they have a riding permit. (Any student whose conduct, while she is riding, is unsatisfactory, will have her riding privileges recalled. Any student riding during the day without permission will be subject to penalties imposed by the Student Council.)

2. Students may spend Sunday in town with relatives with permission from the Dean of Women.

3. Students may spend two Sundays off campus each quarter.

4. Students may spend Saturday and Sunday nights with friends in the dormitory with permission from the house-president, provided there are not more than three in the room.

5. Students may go walking in groups of four, provided they sign up and do not go to town. The streets which may be used are Student on to the river, the part of Fifth Street which leads toward Washington, and Charles Street.

6. Students may have their mothers, sisters, and friends (girls) in their rooms from 3:30 until 5:45 P. M., and from 6:30 until 7:30 P. M. during the week and until 9:00 P. M. on Saturday and Sunday nights.

7. Students may be permitted to see near relatives at any time except when in class or during study hours.

8. Friends coming to see students for just a

few minutes may talk with them in front of the building or in the parlor.

9. Friends (ladies and relatives) may be entertained in the parlors of Fleming and Wilson halls.

10. Students may leave the campus with a brother twenty-one years or older, or sister eighteen years or older.

11. Students may ride to town and from town with girls.

12. If girls wish to go hiking or play tennis or baseball, they may leave the dormitory at 6:30 A. M.

13. Students may have guests in the dormitory on week-end nights with request filed and approved by the Dean of Women. This request must be filed before 5:00 P. M. on Friday.

14. No student is allowed to go to the town theatre on Saturday night.

CLASS PRIVILEGES

In addition to the general privileges, the following are accorded to classes:

First-Year Normal and Freshman Classes

1. Students may go calling twice a month.
2. Students may go shopping every day except Saturday after 3:15 P. M.
3. Students may have four dates a month.
4. Students may spend two week-ends each quarter out of town if they have a permit mailed directly from their parents to the Dean of Women. Thanksgiving holiday shall count as one of these week-ends.

Sophomore Class

1. Students may go down town any afternoon except Saturday and Sunday after 2:30 P. M., provided it does not interfere with college work.

2. Students may go calling once a week.

3. Students may spend three week-ends each quarter out of town, with permission mailed directly from the parents to the Dean of Women.

4. Students may have company one night each week.

5. Students, if they obtain permission from the Dean of Women, may occasionally take meals in town with relatives.

Junior Class

1. Students have all the aforementioned privileges.

2. Students in groups of twos may sign up and walk off the campus in the vicinity of the college except during school hours.

3. Students may have three dates during one week-end, once each quarter, provided the friend comes from a distance.

4. Students may get permission from the Student Government Association president to go out to dinner occasionally, at cafe or drug store.

5. Juniors may go down town at any time during the day except at class periods.

6. Students may go to the show and church at night.

7. Juniors who have not been restricted are allowed senior privileges with the exception of number 7 during the spring quarter. The others are allowed these privileges during the last half of the spring quarter.

8. Students may wear the A.B. ring after they have completed two terms of Junior work.

9. Juniors may go down town in the morning without hats.

Senior Class

1. Students have all the aforementioned privileges.

2. Students may go to the theatre or to church with brothers by filing their names.

3. Students may go to church or to the theatre with a gentleman, provided there are two girls in the group and they return immediately after the show or church.

4. A student may entertain a woman or a girl in the dormitory during Commencement week-end.

5. Students may go to the cafe for lunch or dinner, except on Sunday, returning in time for study hour.

6. Seniors may have six dates during the month, with the approval of the Dean of Women.

7. All students who have completed three years (nine quarters) of college work, or equivalent, with a permit from parents filed in the office of the Dean of Women will be granted a free privilege to use their own discretion concerning their conduct so long as they sign in and out on leaving and returning to the campus and are in the dormitories by 10:00 P. M. All Sunday signing in and out will be in the Cotton Hall register.

A COPY OF THE GENERAL PERMIT

Please allow my daughter....., to have general privileges. This signifies that, with your approval, she has my permission to ride with friends, with or without a chap-eron, and relatives, to write her own off campus permits, spending as many week-ends off campus as she desires, and to conduct herself according to her own judgment so long as she breaks no college regulations.

Senior Normal Privileges

1. Students may go down town any after-noon except Saturday and Sunday after 2:30 P. M., provided it does not interfere with col-lege work.

2. Students may go calling once a week.

3. Students may spend three week-ends each quarter out of town, with permission mailed directly from the parents to the Dean of Women.

4. Students may have company one night each week.

5. Students, if they obtain permission from the Dean of Women, may occasionally take meals in town with relatives.

6. "D" practice teachers may go to town on Saturday during the quarter they are teaching.

7. "D's", provided they are 3rd term "D's", may have the following privileges Spring term:

a. Students may go to the theatre or to church with brothers by filing their names.

b. Students may go to church or to the theatre with a gentleman, provided there are two girls in the group and they return immediately after the show or church.

c. Students may go to town at any time during the day except at class periods.

d. A student may entertain a woman or a girl in the dormitory during commencement week-end.

Ten points are the maximum number any student may carry during one school year. The number of points for each office is based upon the work required for that office.

The Library

The purpose of the library is to give the best service possible to all who wish to use it. To do this, there must be a spirit of cooperation among the borrowers, and a willingness to abide by the rules of the library. The library is for the use of all, and the students are placed on their honor in regard to the use of the books, magazines, etc. It is also requested that the students take care in the use of the building, books, magazines, etc. In order to make the best of the library, the following rules have been adopted:

The books in the reference room, as encyclopedias, dictionaries, yearbooks, etc., are not to be taken from the library, and are to be used in that room as much as possible. The magazines, both back files and current issues, are to be used in the library.

The books on the reserve shelf, which are books used by classes for special work, are to be used in the room during the day, but may be taken out when the library closes at night, and over the week-end. They must be returned by 9:00 in the morning.

The books, not on the reserve shelf, may be taken for one or two weeks according to the demand for the books. Most books of fiction are issued for one week, but may be renewed unless there is a demand for the books. Students are allowed to go into the stack room and use the books, but they must sign at the desk for all books they take out of the stack room, even for those they use in the reading room. It is requested that students try to keep the books in order in the stack room.

The books on the reserve shelf which are not returned by 9:00 in the morning will be subject to a fine of 5 cents an hour, for the first five hours they are out of the library. The books not on the reserve desk will be subject to a fine of two cents a day for each day they are kept overtime.

All books must be returned and all fines paid before the end of each school quarter, or the grades of the student will be withheld until

the fines are paid. All lost books must be paid for. Any student who cuts, tears, or otherwise mutilates a magazine will be held responsible for the price of the magazine.

It is expected that order be observed in the library at all times.

The College Supply Store

The college supply store carries all kinds of school supplies, including college stationery, college stickers, pennants, and pillow tops. All supplies are sold at minimum prices for the benefit of the college girls.

The Postoffice

The college postoffice is under the supervision of the college and not the national government. Mail is brought to the college three times a day—before breakfast, before lunch, and about 3:30 P.M. Special deliveries are carried to the dormitories. The college handles in outgoing packages only parcel post. It does not handle insured or registered mail. That is handled directly by the Greenville U. S. Postoffice.

The college has a local service within the college postoffice in order that students and faculty members may communicate with each other readily by this means.

Postoffice boxes are assigned, free of charge, to students at the beginning of the year, or whenever they matriculate. More than one student is assigned to a box, because of the large number of students in school.

THE YOUNG WOMAN'S CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION

—of—

EAST CAROLINA TEACHERS COLLEGE

Article I—Name

This organization shall be called the Young Woman's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College.

Article II—Purpose

The Young Woman's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College, a member of the Young Woman's Christian Association of the United States of America, and a participant in the World's Student Christian Federation, declares its purpose to be:

We, the members of the Young Woman's Christian Association of East Carolina Teachers College, unite in the desire to realize full and creative life through a growing knowledge of God.

We determine to have a part in making this life possible for all people.

In this task, we seek to understand Jesus and to follow Him.

Article III—Membership

Section 1. Any woman of the institution may be a member of the Association provided she makes the following declaration: I wish

to enter the fellowship of the Young Woman's Christian Association and will endeavor to uphold the purpose in my own life.

Section 2. Anyone who contributes to the funds of the Association an amount not less than the regular membership dues may be enrolled as an honorary member of the Association, and shall be entitled to such privileges as the constitution may deem desirable.

Section 3. The membership fee shall be one dollar per annum.

Section 4. A member may be received from, or transferred to, any other Association affiliated with the Young Woman's Christian Association of the United States of America which makes provisions for such transfer and whose membership fee is not less than \$1.00 per year. Such membership shall be considered valid until the expiration of the original membership.

Article IV—Officers

Section 1. The officers shall be the President, Vice President, Secretary, and Treasurer. They shall be elected by ballot at the annual meeting of the Association in March, and shall assume the duties of their respective offices immediately after the report of the examination has been received.

Section 2. If any vacancy occurs in the list of officers, it shall be filled at the next regular meeting of the Association or at a special meeting called for that purpose.

Section 3. The President shall preside at

all business meetings of the Association and of the Executive Council and shall be an ex-officio member of the committees and sub-committees. She shall hold the committee chairmen responsible for the work of their respective committees, and for the development of efficiency on the part of the committee members. On retiring from office, she shall present a written report covering her term of office in the Association. This report shall be placed in the file of the Association.

Section 4. The Vice President shall perform the duties of the President in her absence, and shall act as chairman of the membership department and of the room committee.

Section 5. The Secretary shall keep full minutes of all the meetings and records of the Association, including a complete list of members, the number and character of meetings and classes, and shall aid the President in the correspondence.

Section 6. The Treasurer shall have charge of the funds of the Association under the direction of the Executive Council. She shall present to the Council a monthly report and at the annual meeting, a general report covering the receipts and expenditures of the year. The Treasurer shall be chairman of the Finance Committee.

Section 7. The officers of the Association, with the committee chairman, shall constitute the executive council, and shall have general management of the affairs of the Association. The Executive Council shall meet weekly and

shall have special meetings at the call of the President.

Article V—Committees

Section 1. Committee chairmen appointed by the President to serve one year shall be as follows:

1. Membership Committee.
2. Finance Committee.
3. Publicity Committee.
4. Religious Education Committee.
5. Social Committee.
6. Social Service Committee.
7. World Fellowship Committee.
8. Music.
9. Room Committee.
10. Morning Watch.

Section 2. Each Committee shall hold regular meetings for the consideration of its special part of the Association work.

Section 3. Duties of the committees shall be outlined as follows:

(1)—Membership Committee

The Membership Committee shall have charge of the special effort to reach new students at the beginning of the year, and shall throughout the second year aim to increase the membership of the Association.

(2)—Finance Committee

The Finance Committee, upon entering office, shall prepare a budget of estimated receipts and expenditures of the Association,

providing for all departments for the year, including special objects, such as mission funds, conference delegate funds, and social work. The budget, having been approved by the Executive Council, shall be presented to the Association for endorsement. The Finance Committee shall see that the budget is adhered to by all committees, unless subsequent action of the Executive Council permits increase of expenditures. This committee shall also collect the membership fees.

(3)—Publicity Committee

The Publicity Committee shall make posters for the Y. W. C. A. meetings, keep the Y. W. C. A. Bulletin Board full of interesting and instructive material such as current events, pictures of interest, and the posters announcing the meetings, and keep in the Y. W. C. A. rest room (hut) the church papers of the different denominations. This Committee shall be free to order any material necessary for the carrying on of its work following a discussion with the advisory member of the Committee. All important meetings and the Sunday evening vesper services shall be reported to the daily newspaper by one member of the committee.

(4)—Religious Education Committee

The Religious Education Committee shall arrange for the regular weekly meetings. The chairman of this committee shall see that the duties of the following committees are executed:

(a)—Bible Study Committee.

The Bible Study Committee shall seek to enlist every student in one of the Bible Classes, which this committee shall arrange. It shall also seek to encourage individual reading among the students.

(5)—Social Committee

The Social Committee shall aim to cultivate the social life as fundamental to the purpose of the Association. It shall have charge of social gatherings, setting high social standards and creating a wholesome atmosphere that shall permeate the student body.

(6)—Social Service Committee

The Social Service Committee shall have charge of the Y. W. C. A. flower garden and potted plants, both in the cultivation and disposal of all flowers, and shall render service wherever and whenever opportunity offers. This committee shall also make a study of problems existing today, and at times when opportunity offers, present results of the study to the Association.

(7)—World Fellowship Committee

The World Fellowship Committee shall provide for mission classes and arrange programs for the Missionary meetings, and seek to develop within the institution an intelligent knowledge and an interest in missions. This committee shall have charge of collecting the

World Fellowship Fund. It shall also have charge of the Study Courses held each year.

(8)—Music Committee

The Music Committee shall provide and arrange for all music for the various services.

(9)—Room Committee

The Vice President shall appoint each month a committee whose special duties are the keeping of the Association room in order, the arrangement of the Association Hall for Sunday evening services, and the care of the Association Library.

(10)—Morning Watch

The Morning Watch Committee shall have charge of the regular morning watch meetings held at 7:15 A. M. each morning except Sunday.

Article VI—Meetings

Section 1. There shall be an annual meeting of the Association in March for the presentation of the reports and the election of officers of the Association. At this time an annual report shall be prepared, which shall be forwarded to headquarters.

Section 2. There shall be a monthly meeting of the Association for social or business purposes.

Section 3. Special business meetings may be called at the President's sole initiative or at the written request of twenty-five members.

Section 4. One fourth of the active members shall constitute a quorum.

Article VII—Advisory Committee

The Advisory Committee consists of seven members: President, Treasurer, and five other members to be elected by ballot from the honorary membership. Each of these shall serve for three years.

If any vacancy should occur the committee itself shall elect a member from the honorary membership to serve until the next election of officers.

Article VIII—Amendments

Notice of proposed amendments to this constitution shall be given at the previous regular meeting, and shall require for their adoption a two-thirds majority vote of the entire membership of the Association.
