October 8, 1964

The regular meeting of the Pitt County Medical & Dental Society was held at the St. Pauls Episcopal Church in Greenville on Thursday, October 8, 1964, Dr. John L. Wooten, president, presiding. The meeting was held in conjunction with the Greenville Ministeral Association.

The following recommendations of the polio committee were given by Dr. Ward; it was pointed out by Dr. Ward that these recommendations were merely recommendations and not manditory requirements set down by the committee:

- 1. Two months Type I Sabin + DPT
 - Alternate quadruple vaccine
- 2. Three months Type III Sabin + DPT
 - Alternate quadruple vaccine
- 3. Four months Type II Sabin + DPT
 - Alternate quadruple vaccine
- 4. Fifteen months Type I, II, and III bivalent with booster DPT
- Alternate Salk vaccine in place of Sabin vaccine 5. Childhood - Three of monovalent vaccine followed by a trivalent booster one year later
- 6. General recommendations:
 - (a) Oral Sabin vaccine should be give during Fall, Winter, and Spring months, not in the polio season.
 - (b) Sabin should not be given with smallpox, measles, or other viral vaccination.
 - (c) A complete series of either Sabin or Salk is manditory for complete immunity.

Dr Wooten then appointed a nominating committee with chairman, Dr. Carson, and members Dr. Adams and Dr. Gradis. This committee was appointed to come up with a slate of officers to be elected at the November meeting.

Dr. Adams, chairman of the welfare board, then presented Mr. Grimes, head of the Pitt County Welfare Department, who presented a synopsis of the medical services at the Pitt County Department of Public Welfare. The synopsis is here attached.

The program was introduced by the Reverand John Drake, Rector of St. Pauls Episcopal Chirch. He introduced the Reverand William Spong, Episcopal Chaplin to the Duke University Hospital, Memorial Hospital, and the Durham Veterans Hospital. He also introduced the Reverand Doug Gilbert, Resident Chaplin at the Duke University Medical Center. Mr. Spong then presented a most interesting and informative discussion of the importance of the interrelationships between the various ministers of the healing arts, that is, the medical profession and the clergy. Following the discussion by Mr. Spong, Mr. Drake invited the members of the medical society to attend a more detailed seminar on the same topic to be held on Wednesday, October 14, at Pitt Memorial hospital. At this time, a detailed discussion will be carried out concerning the possibility of a volunteer chap**kin** program for Pitt Memorial Hospital.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
