There is a foundation for that feeling. there has always been a foundation for it and I presume there always will be. So you are just taking your time turn in the field and it will come to you some day to stand up and talk about the subject of young folks, only you won't be an old man. As a matter of fact, we feel like it is a break with the past when it is not and should not be. "But papa you don't understand the girl of today." Every papa in North Carolina has had that said to him sometime in the last twelve months, if he is a good papa, that is if he is good enough to talk with his own daughter about the things that come in her life and in every life, he has had that said back to him. Papa knows more than daughter, but not half as much. I don't know whether I can verify that statement or not, but when papa came along the girls did not wear clothes like you wear today. They wore a great ----- much more clothes, the behaved differently from the way they behave today, I don't think any better than they behave today, but just differently. Human progress is measured by the changes for the good that we accept. Human progress is measured by the changes for the good that society accepts, but we don't want to make those changes too suddenly. In the good old days when people wore hoop skirts, or just a short time after that when they wore those long skirts that went trailing in the dust and kicked up a terrible dust sometimes in the hearts of young men as well as on the streets, to suddenly change from that to the knickers of today is enough to break the heart of any old man of today. or old woman. It is like the girl often says "it is too sudden". The xxxxx glory of a woman is her hair, and she has cut her glory off. Did you ever stop

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to think about it. The rats are gone, they have even cut the rat nests out of their **hundu** hair. Did you ever say when your hair was so tangled in the morning that it was full of rat nests, well, that is what they say at my house. The change was not so sudden after all, and the change from clothes, to less clothes and less clothes and less clothes hasn't been so sudden.

It is the same principle that you must apply to education. Young women, let's be serious for a few minutes because there is a thought here that I want you to get and use it for your growth. Here is a little child as a student. You are his teacher. You have got to find where he is mentally. You have got to find out something about what he knows, something about the environment in which he has been spending the few years of his life and then something over here to which you want to carry that child in an educational way. But you won't pick him up here today and turn him aloose here tomorrow a university graduate. You have got to take him here today in the fourth grade perhaps and by a process of time and changes and work bring him through the grades and high school and into the college and on through to his university education. It takes time and growth and changes constantly taking place to bring about the desired end in the life of the child that we are trying to educate. Just so it is with these changes. Here's a thought
