We must learn that sometimes it is best to put ourselves to inconvenience if it is for the benefit of others. They will probably want to see these people today. In fact, I have told them to see you today if they are going to see you at all because I hardly think they want to go around to your homes all about over the state to see you, not that they would not enjoy the visits, but they are busy people.

I have the pleasure of making an announcement to you that I guess you know already; I am going to let you go home for Easter holidays. I am glad to let you go home for Easter holidays because you have finished the election,- you have had an election,- you have been voting it for I do not know how many days, but for some time. Let it be a real genuine Easter vacation. Take care of yourselves and do not bring back any souvenirs like you did Christmas. Have a good time; have all of those Spring dresses made while you are at home. Do not come up later and say, "I am bound to go home and have a dress made!" I know that you have to have dresses and I know that somebody has to make them; I know that. I know also that it is not nearly as much trouble to make them now as it used to be, and it does not take anything like the amount of cloth it used to take. I have seen the change; in fact, it is perfectly manifest.

Although I have spoken to you in a more or less humorous way, I think it is the proper thing for you to do. I think it is the proper thing for anyone to do to try to fix ones self up to look^{nice}, but try to attend to these things now so that they will not pull you away from your work when you come back because it is not long until Commencement, and if Easter is going to keep you from having a good report at Commencement, then the good things of Easter vacation become bad things for you. Do not let it do that. This is the point I want you to get: Go home and have a good time and attend to the new clothes. It is the right time because Nature is putting on new garments. I do not want you to be like Nature, however, as Nature is terribly green. But attend to the Spring dresses while you are at home and then come back and attend to your work so that when you get your reports you will not be sorry about what you did not do. The reports for the winter were better than the reports for the fall term, and that was very encouraging. I want the spring term to be the very best one. I want you to make your "home run" this spring, and I do not want you to have to be put out at the home plate.
