### Belk hall residents moved to new dorms

Campus Living has relocated students affected by the demolition of Belk Residence Hall this semester.

Belk Hall will be demolished and replaced by Gateway East and West, two new dormitories that will hold more students.

Freshmen students who had to move out of Belk at the end of the fall semester were moved into now vacant dorms in West End, Central and College Hill.

"We had students placed across the three neighborhoods," said Aaron Lucier, the university's director of operations for Campus Living.

According to Lucier, the open dormitory rooms were due to students who were not returning this semester. This includes transfers, dropouts, students who are studying abroad and students who are taking a semester off.

While some students moved their belongings out before winter break, Campus Living allowed students use a storage service if they were unable to bring their belongings home with them.

Campus Living attempted to keep roommates together when they were moved into their new dorms.

"We tried to keep together roommates who wanted to stay together," said Lucier. "Unfortunately not all of them were, but some were, which we're pleased about."

The university managed to

## Burst pipe floods dorm

At 1:30 a.m. on Wednesday morning, a 2-inch pipe connection broke in a men's bathroom on the first floor of Aycock Residence Hall on College Hill.

The on-call plumber shut down the water to begin repairs. Water from the pipe flooded most of the first floor of Aycock and places in the basement. Some residents stayed overnight with friends while others stayed in temporary spaces during clean up.

"I was coming up from the basement and the ceiling just looked like it was raining. When I got

upstairs, there was at least five inches of water on the first floor carpet," said Frank Letchworth, freshmen business major. "I live on the first floor and so far I've seen carpets in rooms with damages and wires such as Ethernet cables that got ruined."

According to Letchworth, a student spoke with Jonathon Blount, Aycock's resident coordinator, about the pipe leaking and Blount then reported the leakage.

Aaron Lucier, director of housing operations at Campus Living, said, "At this time, we do not know the cause of the pipe breaking. Our first concern was to shut off the water rather than see what it was

that had caused the pipe to burst. We did not issue an evacuation on the building because there was no immediate safety concerns. The students just left on their own."

Campus Living staff responded by 2 a.m. to clean up and remove the water. They worked until 5 a.m., and at that time, a private fire restoration company arrived to complete the clean up.

The first found of clean up was completed by 6:30 a.m. and workers will continue the clean up today.

Joshua Spence, freshman business major, said, "I had a few friends who had to sleep on couches in the lounges and I saw

students just wading in the hallway as the water made its way down the first floor. It was crazy. It was like we had our own swimming pool."

University personnel will be working with students who have any follow-up issues, including damages to their property in their room. Campus Living staff said that all student rooms affected by the water damage should be normal and dry later today.

Floors above the first floor were not affected by the water valve break. Students were able to move

## City Council to revitalize downtown scene

City council wants to see new, thriving businesses in the First Street Corridor.

Greenville City Council will be focusing on student safety and the revitalization of downtown as part of this year's agenda.

Top of that list, according to council members Marion Blackburn and Calvin Mercer, is safety.

"I believe that anyone should be able to come downtown anytime of the day or night and walk back to the university in safety," said Blackburn.

Safety seems a top interest to students as well, according to Matthew Hoshko, a sophomore engineering major.

"[Downtown is] an area of high

risk and I wouldn't want to travel in anything less than a group," said Hoshko.

Junior construction management major Brian Segers said, "Safety is a huge thing. People seem to be getting messed with a lot. They should increase patrols."

Mercer said desired measures are neighborhood watch programs, aggressive investigation of crimes, and increased visibility of police officers. Some of these measures may already be in place.

Another major issue that city council wants to address this year is developing downtown into a more diverse and vibrant area.

"We want a 24-hour downtown," Mercer said. "We want all sorts of businesses in the day time. We want evening restaurants and music scenes and late night entertainment that is safe."

There also seems to be a push to develop the First Street Corridor, which is the area surrounding Town Commons and includes businesses across the street.

"We need to put our money where our mouth is and fund some improvements there," said Blackburn.

One of the things that Blackburn

keep the freshmen living in Belk last semester out of off-campus apartments.

"The only people that were offered off-campus housing were transfers and returning students," said Lucier.

Certain Greek students were also allowed opportunities to move out of Belk and into their Greek houses.


"We allowed a limited number of Greek students to transfer into their Greek houses," Lucier said. "We allowed a few, but they were people with high GPAs, not just anybody."

At first there were some concerns that there might not be enough open spaces for all the freshmen.

"It was in line of what we thought and thank God it was," Lucier said. "There were a few panic moments."

Lucier attributes the success of finding housing for Belk's residents to preparation.

would like to see is a multi-functional performing arts center and visiting artist program.

"I want us to fund a visiting artist program. The city, to me, can come up with 10 thousand dollars as a stipend for visiting artists."

This all transitions into the economic development that City Council would like to see for the area.

"We've got to make sure it's a place that people want to come and do business in," said Blackburn.

The economic development could also benefit the university. Hoshko said it could create a more competitive university by providing jobs after graduation.

"I think that if we want to be competitive, we have to be able to offer jobs to our graduates after graduation," said Hoshko.

"We really want to just meet with students and see the extent of the damages

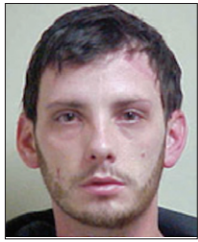
that may have occurred and then we will see how we can help to fix it," said Lucier.

Student charged in NCC break-ins

Detectives from the Property Crimes Unit of the Criminal Investigations Bureau recently investigated 19 break-ins and larcenies that occurred at North Campus Crossing Apartment complex.

The investigation led to an interview with a prior maintenance employee, Curtis Andrew Prax, who was working at the complex in return for rent while he attended college.

The break-ins all occurred last year, from October through December and

victims reported money, electronics and jewelry missing. Most of the residents at North Campus Crossing are college students, which is why the bulk of the break-ins took place during holiday break.

"There was no forced entry in any of the break-ins which led detectives to

investigate current employees and anyone who may have had access to keys in the past," said Kristen Hunter, Greenville Police Department public information officer.

Prax was taken into custody on Jan. 3 and was issued a \$100,000 secured bond. He was charged with 19 counts of felony breaking and entering and larceny after breaking and entering.

The case has not gone to court yet because of the lack of physical evidence and no more reports of break-ins have been made.

"So far we haven't received

any reports of more break-ins, but we know that there is the possibility that we will receive more as the students start returning from winter break," said Hunter. "Anyone who returns and finds items missing is encouraged to give us a call."

Detective C.S. Dawson of the Greenville Police Department is accepting calls at 252-329-4179 from anyone who can provide additional information about the suspect.

Tickets are available for all students and faculty for \$3 beforehand and \$5 at the door. T-shirts will also be available to buy.

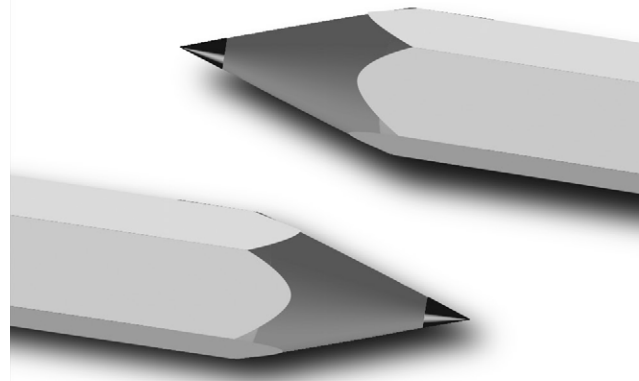
"You get a lot out of your three bucks... There will be corn hole, redneck

# Groups bring trafficking to attention

January is National Human Trafficking Awareness Month and both Eastern North Carolina Stop Human Trafficking Now and Restore One are raising awareness on this issue.

Both organizations are groups that advocate for the prevention and public awareness of human trafficking. This month, both organizations are promoting awareness of trafficking through social media and education on trafficking.

Pam Strickland, founder and CEO of ENC Stop Human Trafficking Now, said the first way that anyone can get involved in preventing human trafficking is being educated on it.

"The way that we believe we need to be working to prevent human trafficking is two-fold," said Strickland. "One is demand reduction, which is the idea that we need to make it less appealing to purchase sex, especially for minors, by increasing penalties and making it less acceptable."

Strickland said another proactive prevention method is education about the subject.

"The other thing is that we need to educate young adults, particularly young girls in middle school and high school about the way that pimps manipulate and recruit girls, and to talk with them about their own self worth," Strickland said.

One upcoming event Strickland encourages students and faculty to attend is a training conference called "Light Dispels Darkness-Shedding Light on Child Trafficking in N.C." in Raleigh on Jan. 23 and 24. Strickland said training is geared toward students in programs where they will deal with children.

Strickland said, "We're also going to have a speaker there talking about how gangs are getting more involved in sex trafficking which is an issue for our area because we know

we have gangs in the middle schools and high schools of Pitt county, and almost every county in North Carolina."

In addition to talking about gangs and minors, the conference will be about the N.C. Safe Harbor law that went into effect on Oct. 1. The Safe Harbor law ensures that minors who are forced into sex trafficking do not get arrested as prostitutes.

Justine Williams, director of prevention for Restore One, said that Restore One is a local anti-trafficking ministry that has been around for about two years. Currently, Restore One's chief project is the opening of the Anchor House, which will be the first safe home for boys who are victims of sex trafficking within the U.S.

Williams said Restore One is spreading awareness for Human Trafficking Awareness Month by social media.

Restore One posts tweets on Twitter, provides Facebook statuses and shares photos on Instagram for people to spread awareness on their own accounts.

"Social media is just so huge right now and we're just challenging everyone to go and tweet the daily tweet, on the Facebook event share the statuses, post on Instagram if you have a picture for that day," said Williams.

Williams got involved in Restore One after meeting Chris and Anna Smith, the founders of Restore One, and after a mission trip to Thailand, during which she saw firsthand accounts of human trafficking while working in the Red Light district with prostitutes.

"My life was changed when I was in Thailand and I knew when I got back I couldn't ignore it and I couldn't not be involved," Williams said.

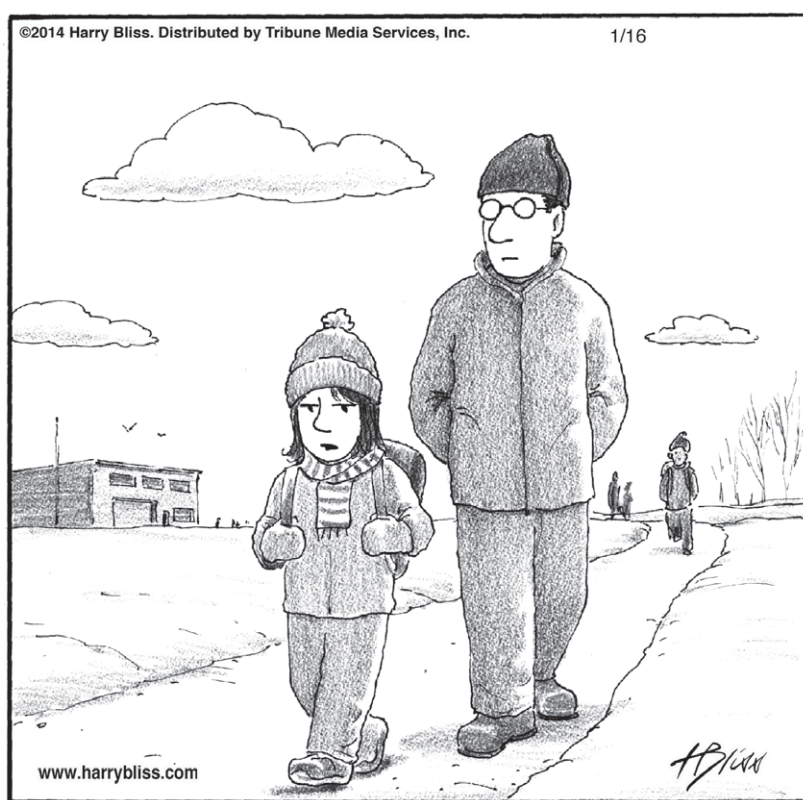

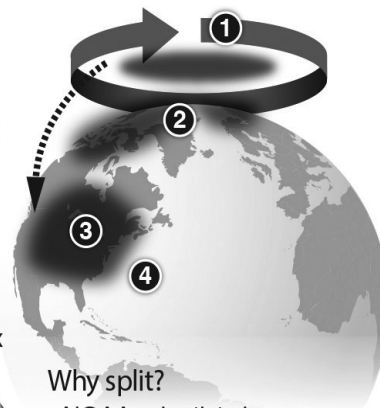
According to nasa.gov, the Earth's average temperature has increased by 1.4 degrees Fahrenheit since 1880. That may not really

- 4 Vortex weakens, dissipates



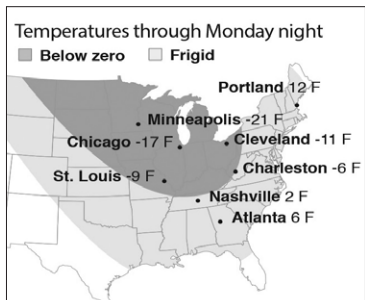

# Big road win for Lady Pirates

## Women's hoops battle through 21 lead changes to sink Tulane

The ECU women's basketball team captured its first Confer-

ence USA road victory of the year Wednesday night in New Orleans.

Junior shooting guard Abria

Trice poured in 29 points, including a go-ahead three-point play with 1:08 remaining, to steer the Lady Pirates (14-2, 2-1 C-USA) past the Tulane Green Wave

(11-5, 2-1 C-USA) 69-65.

The six-foot, UNC-Wilmington transfer went 9-of-18 from the field, converted on all 10 of her free throw tries and accounted for 23 of ECU's 36 points in the second half.

"Abria is a great player and got some really high percentage jump shots and was able to get to the free throw line," said ECU coach Heather Macy. "We got stops we needed to, we got rebounds when we needed to (and) I'm certainly proud of this team."

ECU's first C-USA road game ended in heartbreak last Saturday in Miami – falling 76-75 in overtime against Florida International. Four nights later, the Lady Pirates did not fold down the stretch and closed out the Green Wave.

Trice hit a lay-up to put ECU in the lead 53-52 with 7:18 remaining in the game and her team would not let go of it this time around.

"It feels good (to win) because we learned a lot from Saturday's game," said Trice.

What she learned was to be aggressive and it paid off – earning a crucial trip to the free throw line. Leading 65-63, Trice drained a pair of foul shots with 20 seconds remaining to stretch Tulane's deficit to two possessions, subsequently putting the game away.

"I thought we executed when we needed to and got baskets when we needed them," said Macy. "It was a really neat game to be a part of."

ECU's leading scorer Jada Payne turned in a solid bounce-back outing after struggling in her first two C-USA contests. The 6-foot 2, La Salle transfer scored 16 points, on 6-of-12 shooting, to go along with five assists and a game-high 10 rebounds.

Tulane quickly jumped out in front 5-0 before ECU recovered, scoring seven consecutive points for its first lead, 7-5. The rest of the first half continued at a frenetic pace, laced with several lead changes and both teams entered the locker room with the

score knotted up at 33 going into halftime.

Payne set the tone by doing it all for the Lady Pirates early on. She amassed 13 points, four assists and three rebounds and C-USA's reigning sixth Player of the Year, Kristine Mial, came on strong for eight points in the latter stages of the opening half.

Meanwhile, Green Wave forward Tiffany Dale put up 12 points before committing her second personal foul at the 7:57 mark of the first half, which sidelined her until halftime. Dale closed tied for a team-high 18 points along with junior Jamie Kaplan.

Trice broke the tie by scoring the first six points of the second half to secure ECU's largest lead of the game at 39-33.

Tulane responded with an 11-3 run due in large part to freshman guard Leslie Vorspahl—who drilled a three-pointer to recapture the lead 44-42.

The Lady Pirates always had an answer, though. Mial buried a three-pointer on ECU's next possession as the game stayed tight down the stretch. Mial finished with 13 points.

Although she had just five points, junior Shae Nelson scored all of them in the game's final minute. Leading by a point, Nelson stepped up and hit a three-pointer with 31 ticks remaining to extend ECU's advantage 65-61. Later, she hit a lay-up in the final seconds to seal the road win.

ECU returns to Minges Coliseum Saturday at 5 p.m. when the Lady Pirates play host to Louisiana Tech (5-11, 0-3). The Bulldogs are 0-3 to start their inaugural season in C-USA, falling 82-68 at Rice Wednesday.

# Serving up a dose of tennis

After a long fall season and a lot of unpredictable weather, the ECU men's tennis team will travel to Chapel Hill tomorrow to face the UNC Tar Heels in their 2014 season opener.

Before students were welcomed back to the new semester, the Intercollegiate Tennis Association released its National Singles Rankings. ECU was among that list with two players cracking the top 125.

Senior Joran Vliegen, who was ranked 87th for the fall pre-season, elevated to no. 23 for the spring season. Vliegen added to his history making fall season by becoming the highest ranked ECU singles player ever.

Freshman Miles Holvoet, who posted a record of 7-0 during the fall season, was placed at 110th.

This is the first time in school history that two players are in the national rankings.

After competing in the NCAA Doubles Championships

and posting a near perfect 17-1 record, the duo of Vliegen and Sophomore Colin Roller rose to the 53rd best tandem in the ITA Doubles Rankings.

The North Carolina Tar Heels, who currently sit 43rd as a team, also have two players grace the singles top 125.

Freshman Ronnie Schneider cracked the top 20 nationally (17) and Sophomore Brett Clark is just outside, sitting at 36. Clark made it to the National Indoor Championships at the end of the fall season, but lost in the round of 16. He posted a record of 16-5 last fall.

One of Clark's losses came to Vliegen. The two faced each other in the final round of the ITA Carolina Regional. Vliegen defeated Clark in straight sets (7-5, 6-4). This win resulted in Vliegen becoming the first Pirate in program history to reach the USTA/ITA National Championships.

UNC also has two top 50 doubles teams in the National Doubles Rankings. Junior Esben Hess-Olesen and the aforementioned Clark come in at 29th. Junior Oystein Steiro

and Senior Nelson Vick (50) are just three spots above ECU's Vliegen and Roller.

On paper, the Tar Heels have the more talented team, but Vliegen showed the nation that rankings do not matter. He posted a 6-2 record against ranked opponents — all of whom were ranked higher than him.

ECU Head Coach Shawn Heinchon said that he expects UNC to show up prepared. He believes that they will become a top 15 team.

Heinchon says the key to having a successful spring is for his players to stay healthy, but he wants to really focus on doubles. The doubles teams weren't as solid as he expected them to be during the fall season, but he knows that his players are capable of having a successful spring.

# Pirates eyeing conference championship

## ECU dives into spring schedule with high hopes for '14

A month removed from a historic 2013 season, the ECU men and women's swim teams have their eyes focused on the championships in Atlanta.

The Pirates (4-1) in dual meet competition and the Lady Pirates (5-0) are coming off of arguably one of their best semesters in school history.

Last semester, the Pirates soundly dealt with nearly all competition, en route to their highest ranking in school history. The Lady Pirates (35th) also came back from a slow start to take a second place finish behind North Carolina in the annual Nike Cup Invitational, while the men (38th) fought for a fifth place finish to end 2013.

Going into 2014, both teams look to continue finding the magic that made their 2013 campaign so special.

"We had a great first semester," Assistant Coach Matthew Jabs said. "Our freshman and sophomore classes really stepped up for a semester and will continue to get better with more experience."

Bailie Monahan, Anastasia Amoiroglou, Michael Dugan, and Tori Angermeir are a few of the notable underclassmen that contributed greatly to the team last semester.

With a new year upon them, the Pirates have trained vigorously over winter break.

"We'd like to continue [the success we've had]" said Head Swimming and Diving Coach Rick Kobe. "Our focus right now is to train hard and to continue to swim fast in these dual meets, but our ultimate focus is to swim really fast in our championship."

With the Conference USA Championship

meet still more than a month away, the Pirates have instead focused their attention on preparing for tough matchups. Old Dominion, Catawba and William & Mary are the opponents coming up on the schedule.

"We're mainly focused on our championship meet at the end of the year," said Jabs. "We use our

dual meets as tune-ups and opportunities to race and get ourselves prepared for the end of the year."

With only six weeks and three meets remaining before the winner-take-all meet in Atlanta, the Pirates are both prepping themselves for a title run, while also monitoring their Saturday matchup against conference-foe Old Dominion.

"They are one of the better teams on our schedule," said Kobe. "It's always been a great meet at their pool."

The last time the Pirates squared off with Old Dominion was during the Dowd Nike Cup Invitational in Chapel Hill. The Lady Monarchs finished sixth behind Navy, while the Monarch men finished also placed sixth behind ECU to round out the final day of competition.

Starting the year off on the road in a hostile Monarch Natatorium will be a challenging feat for the team to accomplish. "It will be a tough environment for us, it's a tough place to swim but we'll be ready," Kobe said.

The Pirates will head to Chandler Natatorium Saturday, looking to shake off the rust after over a month without a dual meet and defeat the Monarchs.

"It's like everyone else," said Kobe. "You'll have to reintroduce yourself to racing the guy right next to you, so it should be a really good meet."

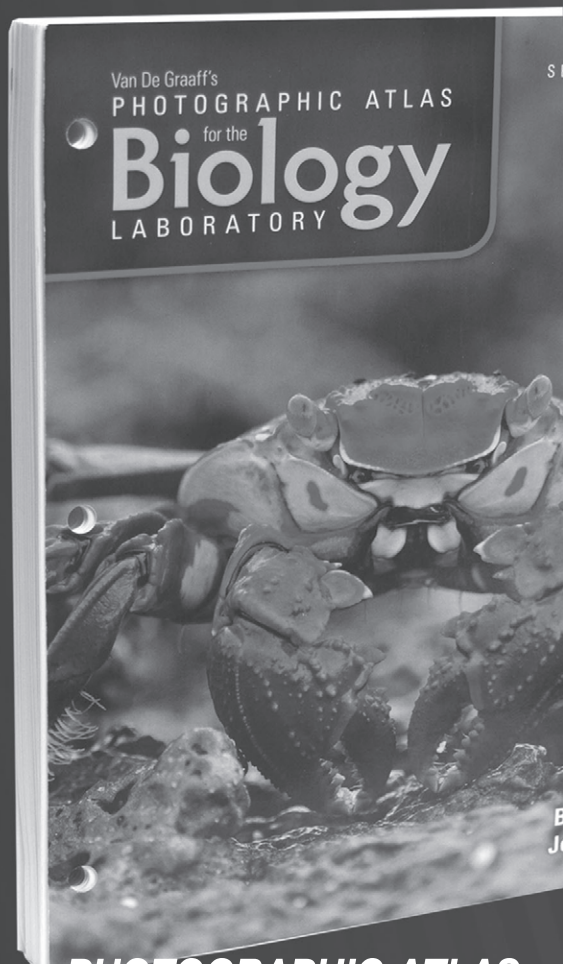

# Pirates set sail to Sunshine State

## ECU basketball heads to Florida for two-game road trip

The ECU men's basketball team will travel to southern Florida in search of its first Conference USA win of the season.

After falling to Old Dominion in a home conference matchup Saturday night, the Pirates (11-5, 0-1 C-USA) will challenge the Florida Atlantic Owls (5-11, 1-1 C-USA) tonight at 7 p.m. in Boca Raton, FL.

On Saturday at 5 p.m., ECU is set to play the Florida International Golden Panthers (9-8, 1-1 C-USA) in another conference road contest. FIU is 5-2 playing at home in Miami.

Both of these games will be crucial to the Pirates, due to the competitiveness of Conference USA this season.

"I'm looking forward to playing games back-to-back," said senior guard Akeem Richmond.

Florida Atlantic has been subpar in 2013-14, but has had a few solid wins. It garnered a 73-68 conference win on the road against Rice (5-10, 0-2 C-USA) and won 75-64 at home versus UCF (9-5, 1-2 AAC).

Maryland (10-7, 2-2 ACC) narrowly defeated the Owls at home, 66-62, in what was a solid showing for FAU.

In mid-November, FAU was crushed at Duke (13-4, 2-2 ACC) in a 97-64 landslide. Four days later, the Pirates lost to the Blue Devils by only nine points and had a far more respectable appearance in Durham than the Owls.

A week ago, the conference-leading Louisiana Tech Bulldogs (14-3, 2-0 C-USA) handled the Owls easily in an 84-64 home win.

FAU is carried by its senior guard and scoring leader Pablo Bertone. Bertone has averaged 18.6 points per game (ppg) and 3.6 rebounds per game (rpg) in his best season yet as an Owl. Sophomore guard Jackson Trapp has been a threat on the court with 10.3 ppg and 3.5 rpg.

The Pirates will look to silence the two talented FAU centers. The 6-foot-9 junior Justin Raffington and 7-foot senior Dragan Sekelja combine for an average of 15.4 ppg and 14.8 rpg.

ECU's Brandan Stith and Michael Zangari have the task of preventing a performance like the one that NC State's 7-foot-1 senior Jordan Vandenberg had against the Pirates a few weeks ago in

Raleigh. In that game, Vandenberg was unstoppable in the paint and went nine-for-ten from the field with seven dunks. He posted a career-high 18 points on the Pirates.

Both Florida Atlantic and Florida International are ranked higher in offensive rebounds and blocks per game than the Pirates, while ECU has advantages in shooting percentage and points per game.

On Nov. 30, Florida International won 61-60 at home against a talented Georgia State Panthers team (10-6, 3-0 Sun Belt). A month later, Georgia State marched into Greenville and delivered ECU an 89-82 loss.

Like the FAU Owls, the Golden Panthers have won at Rice and have lost badly at Louisiana Tech. They beat Rice 71-60 on Jan. 9 and suffered a 34-point loss to Louisiana Tech two days later.

FIU sustained endured a brutal 85-56 home defeat at the hands of 18th-ranked Louisville (14-3, 3-1 AAC) on Dec. 21.

The Golden Panthers' senior forward Tymell Murphy has put up a balanced stat line this season of 16.2 ppg, 7.9 rpg and 2.1 (apg). He also shoots 60 percent from the field.

Another senior forward, Rakeem Buckles, is a Louisville transfer and has impressed at his new school with 13.4 ppg and a team-high 9.6 rpg. Junior guard Dennis Mavin has averaged 11.5 ppg and 4.2 rpg for the Golden Panthers.

"Hopefully, we can improve upon our performance from the last game [against ODU]," said ECU Head Coach Jeff Lebo. "We need to have accountability amongst ourselves as players. If that's a senior being held accountable by a freshman, then that's the way it has to be."

The outcome of these next two matchups could be an indicator of where the ECU Pirates stand talent-wise amongst the rest of the Conference USA teams.

The loss to Old Dominion was disheartening, but a pair of wins during this Florida road trip could re-energize a Pirate squad that has shown a lot of promise.

# Varied approaches to non-conference games

## Some in-state teams schedule tough games while others take easy route

The ECU football program has taken an approach to scheduling out of conference opponents that few schools do—they take on the big boys of the region.

The Pirates were once known as “giant killers” in college football as they beat the likes of West Virginia, North Carolina and Virginia Tech as underdogs within a span of two seasons.

Each season it seems that ECU football has contracts negotiated with three higher-level opponents, spaced by a “gimme” game against a team like Appalachian State, Old Dominion or next season’s NC Central.

People may say that ECU does this because of the lackluster conference that they have been relegated to, but with the Pirates moving to a more known American Athletic Conference, the schedule is just as competitive. With games against NC Central, North Carolina, South Carolina and Virginia

Tech, the Pirates have a long row to hoe next season.

Schools like UNC, NC State, Wake Forest and Duke don’t tend to schedule a strenuous grouping of teams for football season and there can be speculation as why that is. Maybe, it is to give some easy wins and make a bowl game more attainable. Exiting the non-conference with three or four wins can propel a team into the driver seat for a decent bowl venue.

For example, the Wolfpack didn’t test themselves in the non-conference except for their late season bout with the Pirates. They finished 3-1 out of conference with wins against Louisiana Tech, Richmond and Central Michigan, with the loss coming to the aforementioned Pirates.

Duke had a successful campaign with a 10-4 final record, tying ECU (10-3) for the most wins in the state. Yet the Blue Devils had the lousiest out of conference schedule besides Wake Forest. Duke coach David Cutcliffe and his Blue Devils played NC Central, Memphis, Troy and Navy (23 combined wins). While the Demon Deacons scheduled programs like Presbyterian, Louisiana-Monroe, Army and one admiral team in Vanderbilt (21 combined wins).

ECU did favors for the Tar Heels and Wolfpack by winning 10 games, which boosts the continuity of their out of conference opponents. On the flip side, NC State dropped the ball with just three wins and UNC had a subpar seven-win season that was spurred by six wins in their last seven games—heightening the strength of UNC on ECU’s schedule.

Switching gears to basketball, ECU takes a completely opposite approach to opponent selection. The Pirates continuously schedule Division II teams and even venture into the realm of Division III competition.

Meanwhile the ACC opponents down the road are featured in preseason tournament brackets, thus garnering national recognition.

ECU could have used the CIT Championship from last season to coerce bigger and better opponents to Greenville and even travel for great matchups. Yes, the Pirates played Duke and NC State, but those two close losses

don’t necessarily make up for scheduling the lackluster programs like Mount Olive, NC Wesleyan and Fayetteville State.

Winning those games may balance out the losses on the final record, but they don’t mean anything to the program. The football team may have the right idea when it comes to opponent selection, but that remains to be seen.

Head Coach Jeff Lebo and his squad have risen to the occasion when facing Duke in a hostile Cameron Indoor Stadium and, even last year, when the Pirates invaded the Dean Smith Center to face the Tar Heels.

Undoubtedly, Lebo knows how to prepare his team for those big moments, so my only question is why play the likes of St. Andrews, Washington and Lee, Methodist and NC Wesleyan if they do nothing for building and sustaining a program?

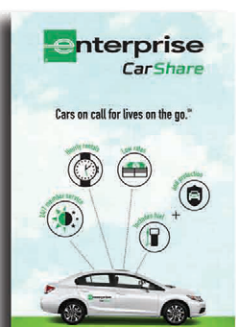

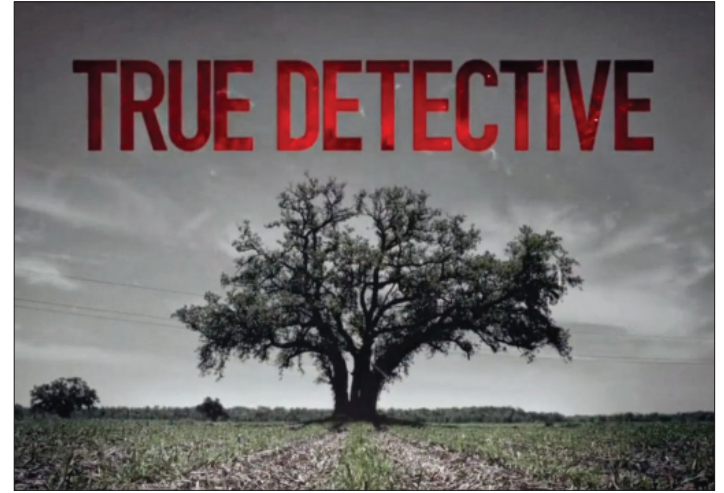
February brings to television the Winter Olympics, making programming all the more difficult for networks but some networks seem to be ignoring the phenomenon altogether.

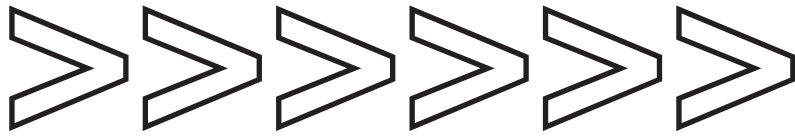

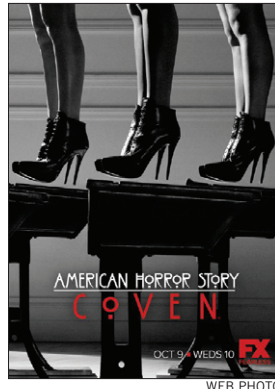

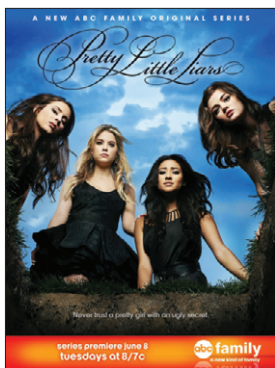

## “American Horror Story”

The Ryan Murphy phenomenon “American Horror Story: Coven” returned on January 8th from their mid-season hiatus to 3.49 million viewers—one of the lowest numbers the show has experienced this season. The witch-themed season has featured New Orleans predominately as a backdrop to a rather dark season. On Nov. 6, the show was picked up for a fourth season with several actors confirmed as returning including Evan Peters, Frances Conroy, Patti LuPone, Kathy Bates, Sarah Paulson and Angela Bassett. Jessica Lange, who won an Emmy for her work in the first season of the show, has been confirmed as returning but in a more limited capacity than in previous seasons. The show airs on FX on Wednesdays at 10 p.m.

## “Community”

The long awaited return of the NBC show “Community” began on Jan. 2nd after a seven-month hiatus where the show’s future was in the balance. Dan Harmon, the original showrunner, returns for season five after relinquishing the role in season 3 to pursue other projects. The one-hour season premiere rewrites the show’s premise in a “re-piloting” that places the main character of Jeff Winger as a teacher and the rest of the returning cast as returning students. The show had begun a steady decrease in viewers as well as quality since mid-season five but the change of time slot has brought new life to the dying show. The return of Chris Pratt to a main cast member as well as the return of focus on the characters lives rather than the interworkings of politics has led to an increasing quality that had been missing from the past season and a half. Unfortunately, Rob Lowe and Rashida Jones will be leaving the show after the thirteenth episode entitled ‘Ann and Chris’ which is set to appear on Jan. 30th. “Parks and Recreation” airs on NBC on Thursdays at 8:30 p.m.

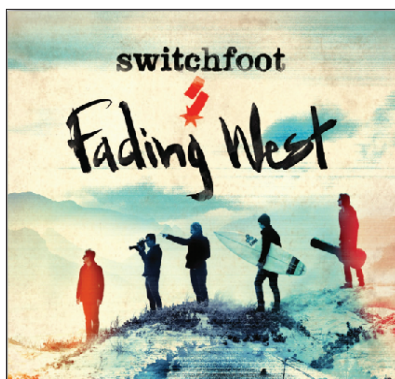
