Athletics Rebranded

Throughout Tuesday and Wednesday ECU athletics, under the leadership of first-year Athletic Director Jeff Compher, unveiled a finalized strategic plan called, “UNDAUNTED.”

According to a press release from the athletic department, Undaunted “will serve as a road map that will guide decision-making and operational efforts over a three-to-five year period.”

The athletic department also released a print and online pamphlet explaining the plan as well as an undaunted video featured on ecupirates.com.

According to the release, Undaunted “establishes goals

and priorities for ECU Athletics that enable efficient and effective management consistent with its core values and a common understanding of the department’s mission and vision for the future.”

Undaunted was a project started under the direction of former-AD Terry Holland in September 2012. With the help and input from 82 individuals representing the university, Compher, who addressed the media on Tuesday, completed the project.

“[Undaunted] means being fearless in the face of challenges, to be bold and confident, knowing that there will be challenges out there,” explained Compher. “I think that defines our athletics program. It speaks to who we are

as a program and the history and legacy of our program. We take on a lot of challenges and we always seem to come out on top.”

One of the key components of the plan was to create a new brand (logo) for ECU. The process of deciding on the brand involved drawing influence from several former ECU brands dating as far back as 1934.

“Our goal was to develop a brand that wasn’t totally new,” said Compher. “There were some great elements in our [previous] brands. The problem is there’s so many of them. We wanted to consolidate our branding efforts

Pirate dad coaches in Super Bowl

There will be no former ECU football players participating in the Super Bowl this season, which snaps a streak of three years that a Pirate has won professional football’s ultimate prize.

And although you will not find ECU alumni while scanning the rosters of the Denver Broncos and Seattle Seahawks, there is one direct link between the Pirates and the big game.

Senior safety Damon Magazu’s father, Dave, is the offensive line coach for the Broncos.

Damon, who was often times referred to as “C.K.” or “coach’s kid,” completed his collegiate career with a game-clinching interception in last month’s Beef ‘O’ Brady’s Bowl.

However, this will not be the Magazu family’s first trip to the Super Bowl. In Dave’s first season

SGA election orientation addresses changes

Student Government Association’s election season has begun, and it includes a variety of changes that will change the election process.

The filing period for candidates began on Tuesday and is open until Monday. Students will file their candidate paperwork online on Org Sync. This is the first time paperwork will be filed online instead of requiring candidates to come into the SGA office with their paperwork.

“We just thought doing it online would be more timely,” said Courtney Hartman, SGA elections chair. “It was put online to save us and the candidates time.”

Dallas Owens, a freshman finance major, is considering running for a position in the senate and thinks the online filing system will be beneficial.

“I think it keeps it a lot more organized,” said Owens.

After the filing period there will be two compulsory meetings for candidates and then campaigning will go on until Feb. 28, when the winners will be announced.

By ending on Feb. 28 the election process will be ending earlier than it has in previous years.

“We got a head start on it,” Hartman said. “We hope to finish before spring break instead of last year when it was after.”

The announcement of the election results will also be different than it has in past years. On Friday, Feb. 28, there will be an election announcement banquet to reveal the winning candidates. “I don’t think that there’s ever been an announcement banquet before,” said Hartman.

For candidates not already familiar with the election process, there was an initial orientation meeting for candidates that took place on Monday before the filing period began.

During the orientation Hartman described the election process to prospective candidates and discussed the policies of clean campaign-

ing, school policies, and election rules. Then the current SGA executive officers explained the responsibilities of each position.

Owens appreciated receiving information about the election process at the meeting.

“It went well,” said Owens. “They spoke very clearly about the positions and the election procedure.”

The orientation meeting is just one of many techniques the SGA is using to let students know about the upcoming elections.

“The next cycle will be to inform people about the candidates,” said Hartman. “They can get to know the candidates on a personal

level.”

Hartman described the techniques SGA will be using to inform students.

“We’re working really hard to get the word out that anyone can run no matter what grade you’re in,” said Hartman. “Emails are big thing, we have a couple of banners going up, and we’re putting ads on the transit buses; anything we can think of really.”

Hartman’s overall goal is to have as big a voter turnout as possible.

“I just hope as many people can vote as possible,” said Hartman. “My goal is to get the voter turnout higher than it’s been in the past.”

Police Chief begins term

Gerald Lewis was selected to be ECU’s new police chief and will help lead 60 full-time officers, 10 reserve officers and 20 staff members who work for the ECU Police Department.

He was selected for the position after a nationwide search that was led by the International Association of Chiefs of Police.

Scott Shelton, former chief of police, retired from the department in late Mar. 2013. He was in law enforcement for 36 years and became the university’s chief of police in 2008.

While they were searching for someone to take over as the new chief, Deputy Director

Jason Sugg took over until someone was chosen for the position.

Lewis started his position on Jan. 21, but he has already spent time walking around campus and speaking with the campus community.

“I really want to interact with students here. I want to be easily accessible and proactive with everyone from students to faculty,” said Lewis.

Lewis held the rank of major and was commanding officer of the Office of Community Affairs. He retired from the New Jersey state police after 26 years of service in early December.

During his time there he served as a spokesperson, a road trooper and operation dispatcher. He handled situations that dealt with assaults, DUI’s and domestic calls. He was also known for his efforts to attract more minority men and women to the state police force and for strengthening the ties between

state police and the public.

Lewis is excited for a change of pace from his previous line of duties.

“This will be the first time that I have experience working near a large amount of college students,” said Lewis.

As chief of police, Lewis plans to work with other agencies, such as the Greenville Police Department and Pitt County Police Department in efforts to build a stronger partnership to create a safer community.

“My first goal here is to provide the safest environment for everyone here. I want everyone to have a great learning environment, while keeping students and staff safe,” said Lewis.

Chris Sutton, administrative lieutenant of the ECU Police Department, is happy that Lewis joined the department.

“We are all excited to have him here with us. He has brought energy that will push us further and is helping to build moral to other officers,” said Sutton.

Faculty to receive Achievement Awards

The university has named four faculty members as the recipients of the 2013-14 Achievement Awards.

Awards include the Lifetime Achievement Award, Five-year Achievement Award for Excellence in Research and Creative Activity and the Scholarship of Engagement Award.

“This year’s roster of award winning faculty members illustrates the breadth of ECU’s research and creative activities... but also pays a testament to our focus on mission,” said Ron Mitchelson, interim vice chancellor for Research and Graduate Studies. “Each contributes a significant impact on our region’s... and state’s intellectual, environmental and public health.”

Margaret D. Bauer, a professor in the Department of English, is the recipient of the Lifetime Achievement Award. Joining the department about 18 years ago, Bauer has balanced work as a professor, being editor of the North Carolina Literary Review and also

writing of her own. She currently serves as coordinator of literature for the English Department and is the co-chair of the Planning Committee for the Eastern North Carolina Literary Homecoming. Her mission is to help North Carolinian writers get started and showcase talent right in North Carolina’s own backyard through the pages of the “Literary Review” and “Literary Homecoming.”

Receiving the Five-year Achievement Award are David G. Kimmel, associate professor in the department of Biology, and Heather L. Littleton, associate professor in the department of Psychology.

Kimmel joined Pirate Nation in 2008 and has worked to bring the university knowledge and understanding of solving coastal issues. He is a member of the Department of Biology and the Institute for Coastal Science and Policy.

Kimmel has spent much of his time studying plankton ecology and has focused on why plankton is important to humans and smaller organisms. Along with teaching

and research he also co-leads a study abroad program to Australia and volunteers for the city.

Serving the university for the past six years, Littleton has worked as an assistant professor in the Department of Psychology and also in the Department of Obstetrics and Gynecology.

Littleton is a clinical psychologist and is licensed as a psychologist in North Carolina and Texas. Last year she and several of her graduate students received the 2013 Georgia Babladelis Best Paper Award for their paper “Health Risk Behavior and Sexual Assault Among Ethnically Diverse Women.” The award was given by the journal “Psychology of Women Quarterly.”

“Heather has contributed to our emphasis on health by understanding people’s responses to trauma with a focus on sexual assault,” said Mitchelson.

The Scholarship of Engagement Award was awarded to Martha Engelke, professor in the College of Nursing. She came to the university alongside her husband almost 35 years ago and has strove to improve the

effectiveness of school nurses in the region and school-based case management of children with chronic illnesses and clinical research focused on patient outcomes.

In October, Engelke, alongside 172 other nurse leaders, was inducted in the American Academy of Nursing.

“I’m very honored to receive the Scholarship of Engagement Award because as a nurse and someone who really values working with people in the community, I just can’t think of a nicer way to be honored,” said Engelke.

Recipients were nominated by their peers both within the university and community and were recognized based on certain characteristics. Each recipient will receive a cash award.

A lecture and reception to honor the recipients will be held Mar. 6 at 4 p.m. in the East Carolina Heart Institute Auditorium.

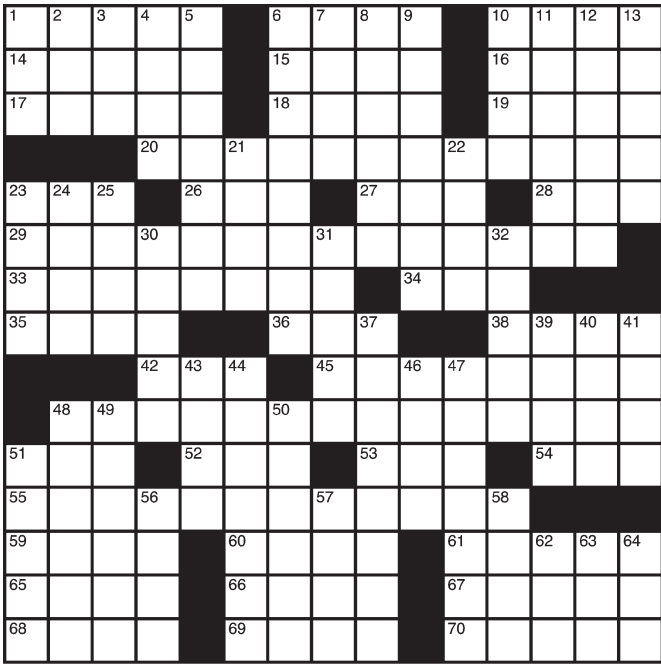

Hoping for a change of pace

Men’s basketball looks to win first conference game

The men’s basketball team has lost its last five games and has sunk to the bottom of the conference standings. Their next two matchups against Middle Tennessee and UAB will be two more tests for ECU.

The Pirates (11-9, 0-5 C-USA) will take on the Middle Tennessee Blue Raiders (13-7, 3-2 C-USA) tonight at 8 p.m. in Murfreesboro, Tenn.

The Blue Raiders are currently ranked sixth in Conference USA after getting three conference wins.

“Middle Tennessee is physical,” said ECU Head Coach Jeff Lebo. “It will be a difficult place to play.”

The Blue Raiders have excelled in three areas where the Pirates are weak— seniority, size, and depth.

Middle Tennessee is coming off a 70-63 win at North Texas (11-9, 2-4 C-USA) last Saturday. Senior swingman Kerry Hammonds II had 18 points and six rebounds in the victory. Hammonds II averages 12.3 ppg, 3.5 rpg, and 2.4 apg.

Two days prior to that, the Blue Raiders had a 58-53 loss at Tulsa (9-11, 4-2 C-USA). Despite the loss, their leading scorer and rebounder Shawn Jones had an incredible showing with 22 points, nine rebounds and five blocks.

The 6-foot-8 senior forward has been a valuable weapon for Middle Tennessee with averages of 13.8 ppg, 8.4 rpg, and a 58 percent field goal percentage.

On Jan. 18, the Blue Raiders defeated UTSA (6-12, 2-3 C-USA) at home in an 80-58 blowout. Freshman forward Reggie Upshaw Jr., 6-foot-7, who

averages 7.3 ppg and 4.1 rpg, had 12 points and five rebounds for Middle Tennessee.

The Blue Raiders’ only other conference loss was to the talented UTEP Miners (14-6, 4-1 C-USA) at home. Middle Tennessee’s 6-foot-7 senior forward Neiko Hunter had 13 points and eight rebounds in the 63-54 loss.

Hunter has attained 12.9 ppg and 4.6 rpg in his second season as a Blue Raider. Along with Reggie Upshaw Jr. and Shawn Jones, Middle Tennessee will have a huge edge over ECU in the low post department.

Middle Tennessee’s main facilitator is senior guard Tweety Knight. He has 8.1 ppg, 3.6 rpg, and 4.6 apg this season.

In the Blue Raiders’ dynamic 89-84 overtime home win over UAB, Knight had eight points, seven assists and three steals.

ECU will continue its road trip in Birmingham, Ala. The UAB Blazers (13-6, 2-3 C-USA) are the second best rebounding team in the nation at 47 per game and will certainly test the Pirates’ physicality in Saturday’s 3 p.m. matchup.

Last Saturday, the Blazers won, 70-63, on the road against Tulsa. Senior forward Rod Rucker scored 21 points and had seven boards. Junior guard Chad Frazier also had 21 points in the win.

Rucker has averaged 11.3 ppg and 7.5 rpg this season while Frazier has led the Blazers in scoring (17.7).

On Jan. 23, North Texas held UAB to 31 percent shooting and garnered a 76-65 win at home. The Blazers’ 6-foot-10

ECU set to face the Monarchs

Due to the weather conditions on Wednesday, the Lady Pirates match up with Old Dominion has been moved to today.

The Pirates will look to recover from a heart-breaking overtime loss to Southern Miss on Saturday, 82-80. A big advantage for the Coach Heather Macy’s squad will be the location of the game. Macy’s Pirates have not dropped a home game since Nov. 17, 2012 when the College of Charleston came in to Greenville and knocked off the Lady Pirates. Since that date, 23 different teams have tried and failed to beat ECU in Minges Coliseum.

The Lady Monarchs come into the game with a 10-11 record and 2-4 in Conference USA play. ODU has played a tough schedule this season that has included three ACC teams and a Big 10 team. Troubling news for the Pirates though, the Monarchs bested Southern

Miss two weeks ago, 92-82.

Old Dominion is led by junior forward Shae Kelley who leads the team in points (16.4), rebounds (10.2), field goal percentage (.481) and steals (2.1). The Monarchs are anchored by their play in the paint. Of the team’s three leading scorers, only one averages more than one three-pointer per game. That comes in the form of the team’s second leading scorer, Tiffany Minor.

Macy will look for junior Ondrea Shaw to stop the offense of the Monarchs in Thursday’s game. Ondrea Shaw currently sits at 11th in the country in blocks per game with 3.1. Shaw is also second on the team with 7.3 rebounds per game.

ECU will come into Thursday’s contest with more confidence offensively. The Lady Pirates will be led as always by Jada Payne, who averages 20.3 points per game and Abria Trice, 16.6 points per game. The Pirates will also look to Kristine Mial and

J’Kyra Brown to help bear the offensive load from the two-standout wing players.

The Pirates need to watch foul trouble in this game if they hope to change their luck against the Lady Monarchs. Old Dominion is a solid free throw shooting team and can take advantage of a team that sends them to the line. Fouls were a big part of the Pirate demise against Southern Miss as they were forced to play without Ondrea Shaw for the entire overtime period.

The Lady Pirates will be happy to return to the friendly confines of Minges Coliseum following their tough loss on the road. A win would launch the Pirates from their current fifth spot in the conference to the second seed. With just 10 games now remaining in the season, conference standing becomes increasingly more important.

senior center Fahro Alihodzic had 12 points and seven rebounds but his efforts weren't enough. Alihodzic has put up 9.6 points and 6.7 rebounds per game.

Five days earlier, UAB had a narrow 63-61 loss to UTEP at home. 6-foot-8 junior forward C.J. Washington had 11 points and four rebounds for the Blazers. His presence on the court has resulted in 13.4 ppg and 7.5 rpg through 18 games.

In another home win; UAB took care of UTSA, 78-65. C.J. Washington demanded control of the game with his 20 points and 11 rebounds.

Time will tell if the Pirates can get the conference monkey off their back by winning one or both of these upcoming games. It will require a full 40 minutes of effort, a concept that ECU hasn't been able to adhere to lately.

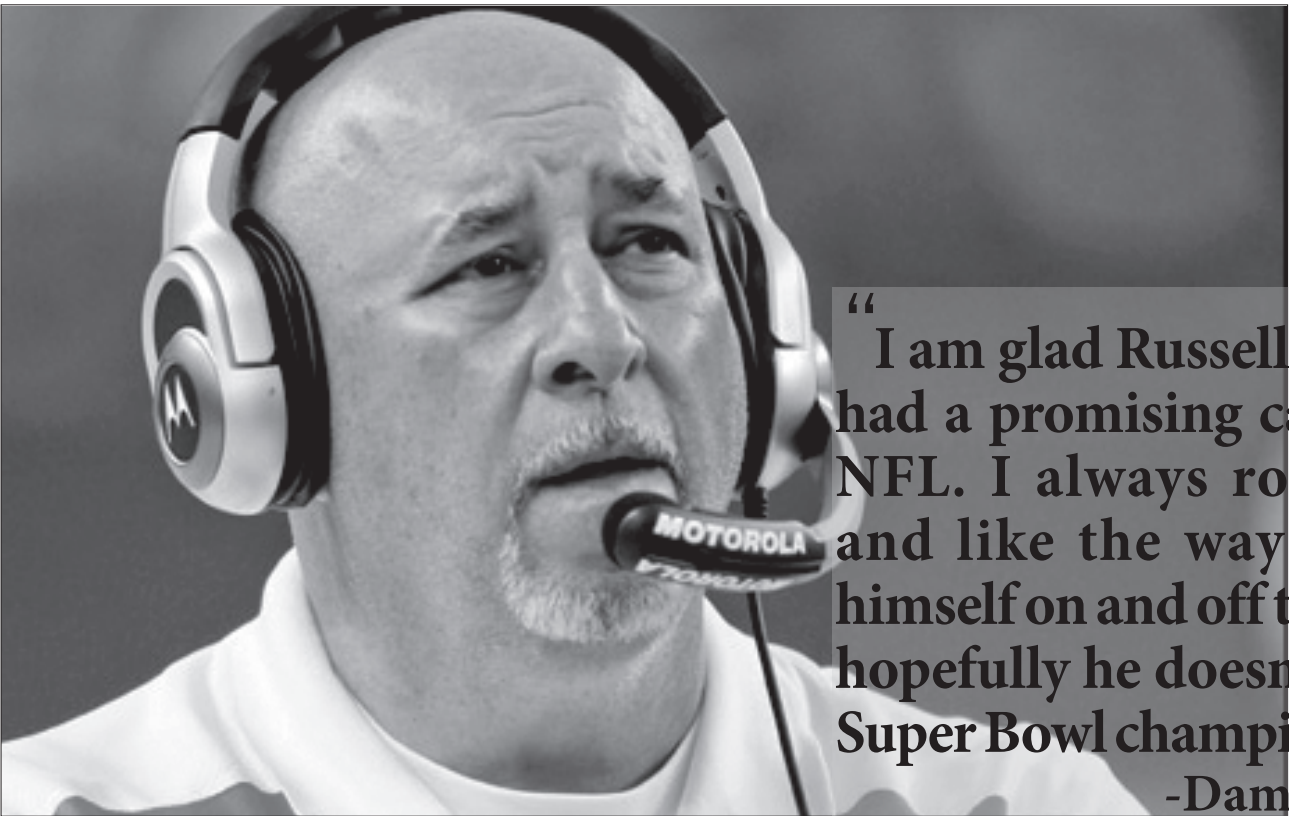

in the NFL (2003), he served as the tight end's coach of the NFC Champion Carolina Panthers during their magical run to Super Bowl XXXVIII.

It didn't end well for the Panthers, though. They fell just short, 32-29, on a last-second field goal by New England Patriots kicker Adam Vinateri. Damon, a middle school student at the time, was in Houston to experience the game at Reliant Stadium.

"I remember going out there that whole week and it just being a crazy experience, being able to be there for such a big event," Damon said. "I remember after the loss, it took a while for the whole Panthers organization to get over it. It's not easy to go to a game that big and come up a little short."

It has been a long road to Super Bowl XLVIII. A decade removed from the championship loss, Dave remains on Head Coach

John Fox's coaching staff, except this time in Denver. The Broncos went 13-3 in the regular season behind future hall-of-fame quarterback Peyton Manning's historic year.

But Damon Magazu's connections to Super Bowl XLVIII do not end there. On the other sideline are the Seattle Seahawks and their all-pro quarterback Russell Wilson. But long before he was winning games in the NFL, Wilson was a quarterback at N.C. State.

Both Wilson and Magazu's names will be forever intertwined in the pages of history because of a memorable game at Dowdy-Ficklen Stadium in 2010. The Pirates were clinging to a 33-27 lead in overtime and the Wolfpack had the ball at ECU's 17 yard line. Then, on third and six, Magazu, who was a freshman at the time, to preserve a victory in his first career-

start, intercepted Wilson.

Nearly four years, 11 interceptions and 270 tackles later, Magazu still considers that moment one of the high-points of his playing career.

"It's definitely up there. It gave me a chance to get more playing time that next year because they trusted me more," said Magazu. "I am glad Russell Wilson has had a promising career in the NFL. I always root for him and like the way he carries himself on and off the field, but hopefully he doesn't become a Super Bowl champion this year."

Magazu has been working out in his hometown of Charlotte since his collegiate career ended as he aspires to land onto an NFL roster this summer. He said he plans to arrive in New Jersey before the weekend to support his father.

"I'm just proud of him and everything he's done and accomplished. And not only him, but the team. I've told him before the (AFC Championship) not to stress out about it too much because there are a lot of people that wish they could be in his shoes and be able to experience something so great like that."

Not to mention when the entire United States honors the late great Jim Valvano, former N.C. State head basketball coach.

Valvano fell to cancer in April of 1993 after a 10-month battle with metastatic adenocarcinoma. Along with being the head basketball coach of the Wolf Pack, Valvano was also the athletic director for a four-year stint.

After the 1987 football season, Valvano suspended play between ECU and NC State after the Pirates tore down the goalposts in Carter-Finley Stadium. The Pirates beat the Wolf Pack, 32-14.

ECU Head Coach Jeff Lebo and his coaching staff participated in the Coaches vs. Cancer movement last Saturday when he sported tennis shoes with his regular game day

suit against Southern Miss.

"We've been doing it for a long time, you see it all across the country bringing awareness to cancer," said Lebo. "There is probably not one person in the country that cancer hasn't affected and this is a nice way for the coaches and their staffs to show our support this weekend for cancer awareness."

Through the efforts of numerous donations, the Coaches vs. Cancer movement has donated more than 87 million dollars to cancer research.

The American Cancer Society advocates the Coaches vs. Cancer Suits and Sneakers weekend and the mission that they support.

"Wearing sneakers is much more than a fashion statement," said the ACS website. "It's a visual reminder that prevention is key when it comes to blocking cancer before it takes center court in our lives."

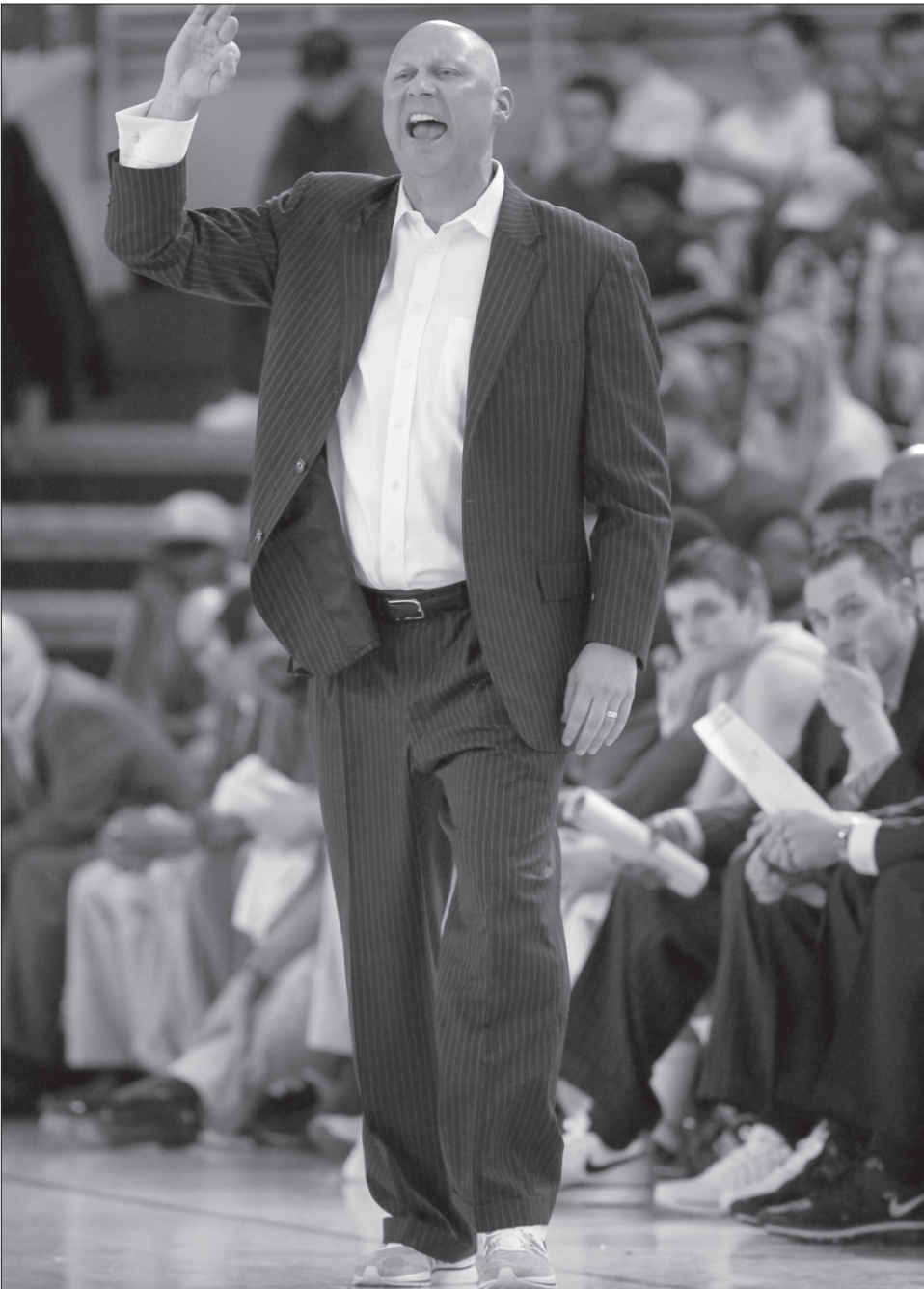
ECU's efforts to support cancer research on the hardwood don't stop there. Head Coach Heather Macy and her Lady Pirates "Play 4Kay" every year in remembrance of the late Kay Yow, NC State's historic women's basketball coach. Yow amassed 680 wins at the helm of the Wolf Pack before passing away in 2009.

The 66-year old North Carolina native

coached for 38 years after graduating from ECU with a Bachelor's degree in English. Yow is a member of the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame.

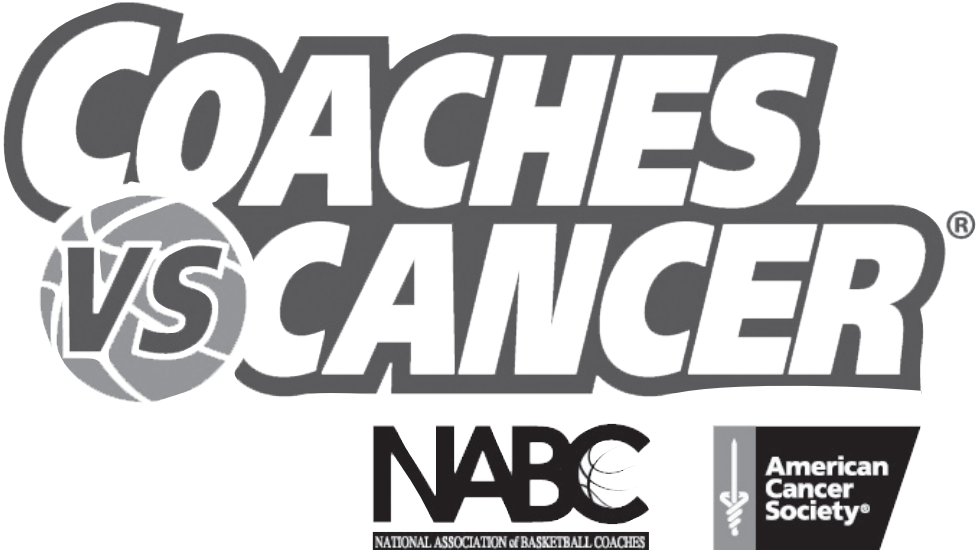
The Lady Pirates are expected to sport their pink uniforms in the month of February in memory of Yow.

strategic in our usage and placement of brand.”

The new look, with old ideas, is supposed to epitomize the unique brand of the ECU Pirates, while adding unmistakable national identity to ECU through the brand.

Compher noted that a recent study proved that people throughout the country failed to relate the previous Jolly Roger logo to ECU. The letters, “E-C-U,” located on the new Pirate’s hat is a small change to the look with larger implications in branding.”

Compher stated on Tuesday that he does expect the new Jolly Roger to be featured on Pirate football helmets come fall.

The release of Undaunted coinciding with ECU’s move to the American Athletic Conference is no coincidence. Compher explained, “The timing couldn’t be better. [We will look] to be a contributing member to the national brand that is the American Athletic Conference.”

On Wednesday, the new Jolly Roger was shown featured within the “Pirate State of Mind” midfield logo. Other new looks, including font changes to lettering within the words “East Carolina” and “ECU” were also unveiled.

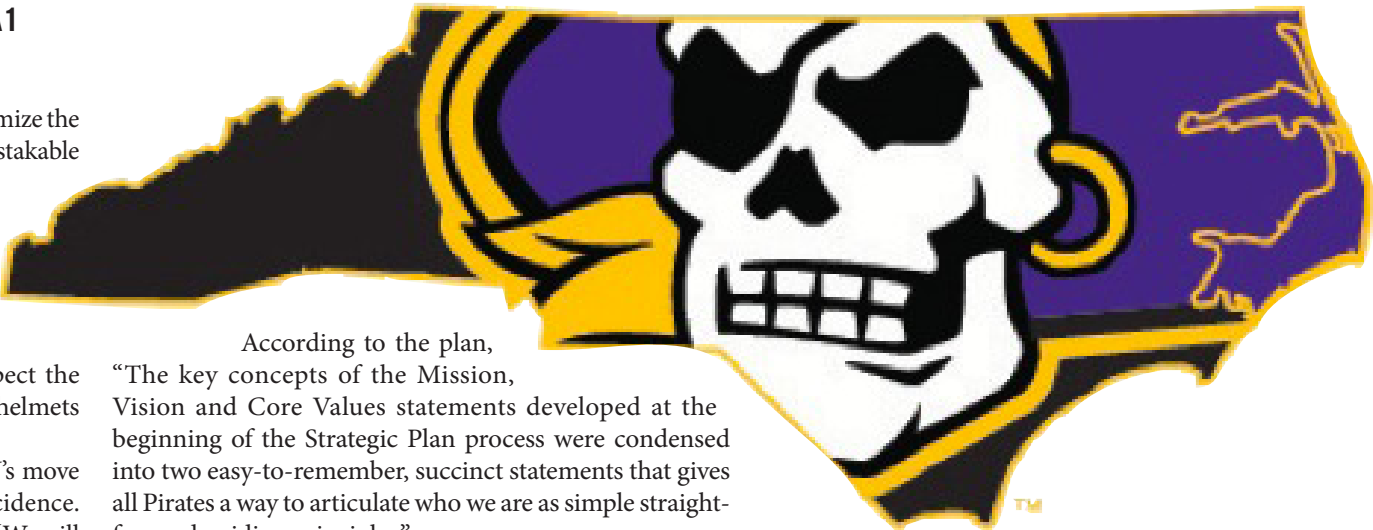
However, branding was just one concept of the Undaunted campaign.

According to the plan, “The key concepts of the Mission, Vision and Core Values statements developed at the beginning of the Strategic Plan process were condensed into two easy-to-remember, succinct statements that gives all Pirates a way to articulate who we are as simple straight-forward guiding principles.”

These guiding principles are labeled “The Pirate Creed” and “The Pirate Code.”

Compher explained that athletic success is, at most, half of the ultimate goal of Undaunted. “We are undaunted in our passion, in our service in building leaders and in winning championships,” he said. “For us, graduation is the ultimate championship for our student athletes.”

Among the several academic goals outlined in the plan

Tonight through next Tuesday, the ECU School of Theatre and Dance will present Dance 2014. This eclectic blend of dance genres range from graceful ballet, electrifying modern, percussive tap and hot jazz, all choreographed by ECU faculty and guest artists.

This year's guest choreographer is nationally famous and critically acclaimed Lauren Edson. She received schooling at some of the most prestigious arts schools in the world such as Juilliard, Jacobs Pillow, and NCSA.

As a choreographer, Edson has won several awards and fellowships, and been commissioned by numerous companies and Universities throughout the nation. Her original choreography has appeared at Jacob's Pillow's Inside/Out Series, Ailey Citigroup Theatre, Peridance Capezio Center, The Kennedy Center, On the Boards Seattle, Dance New Amsterdam and The McCallum Theatre.

Although Edson is choreographing some of the pieces, only students dance in the performance. John Dixon, assistant professor at the School of Theatre and Dance, said there are close to 50 performers that were selected from open tryouts held in 2013. The performers are then required to attend two to three extensive practices a week.

Dixon said this year's performance is unique in the aspect that it has pieces in it that make you think.

"The works look at who we are and how we interact with each other, there's even a piece on face-book and identity, kind of virtual culture," said Dixon. "There are seven dance pieces to be performed, each running 10-12 minutes."

Dixon also said the costumes for this year's performance is unique. "People attending this show may notice there's not a lot of color. The costumes are mainly black, white and gray. An example is one of the tap pieces uses black light, which will be a lot of fun," he said.

Dixon said people that have attended their show in the past have been pleasantly surprised by the quality of the performance.

"People always make the comment, 'Oh I thought this was going to be like a recital but it's actually a big show,' all the production values are as high as they get, everything is original," said Dixon.

Ashton Herring, freshman criminal justice major, attended Dance 2012 and recalls it as a moving show.

"The pieces were very abstract and got very emotional, especially the modern pieces, although the contemporary pieces were my favorite," said Herring.

This year's show will kick off with classic ballet, and transition into a contemporary modern piece by Epton.

"There's a real spread of dance types so there's definitely something for everyone," said Dixon. He also said the student performers work incredibly hard and displays a huge amount of commitment to rehearse and put on this show. "The heart of the show is the amount of hard work that goes into it," he said.

Dance 2014 will take place in McGinnis Theatre at 8 p.m. tonight through Thursday, 2 p.m. on Sunday, and 8 p.m. next Monday and Tuesday. Tickets are \$10 for students and \$12.50 for the general public.

EXPECTED TO BE 'RED HOT'



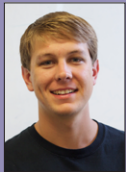

The Broncos

The "Horseshoe Sandwich"

The Sandwich

- 1 1/2 lbs. ground beef
- 1 package of frozen french fries
- 6 pieces of Texas toast

The Sauce

- 1/4 cup butter
- 1/2 cup flour
- 4 cups milk
- 2 lbs. Velveeta cheese
- 12 oz. evaporated milk
- 2-3 tsp. Worcestershire sauce
- Hot sauce (optional)
- Salt and pepper



1. Form six hamburgers, seasoned to taste. Cook to desired doneness. — keep warm.
2. Fry frozen French fries according to package instructions
3. Toast bread
4. Melt butter in large sauce pan
5. Gradually stir in flour for five minutes
6. Add milk and stir until thick
7. Transfer mixture to microwave safe bowl
8. Whisk in evaporated milk into the mixture until smooth.
9. Add cut up Velveeta to mixture and microwave for six minutes, stir periodically
10. Add Worcestershire sauce and hot sauce
11. Assemble the burger in the order of: toast, hamburger, lots of cheese sauce and french fries.

Seattle Cream Cheese Dogs

Serves 4

Ingredients

- 4 oz. cream cheese
- 4 hotdogs
- 1/2 cup butter
- 1 Sweet onion (thinly sliced)
- Brown mustard
- Sauerkraut (optional)



1. Preheat grill to medium heat
2. Sautee onions and butter in skillet on medium heat. Cook onions until they turn a deep brown.
3. Grill hotdogs and lightly toast hotdog buns
4. Spread warm cream cheese on toasted hotdog bun; add hotdog, top with onions, mustard and sauerkraut (optional).
