According to a press release from ECU athletics, the two Pirate football players were traveling on the Alternate route of U.S. Highway 264 when Stanley, the driver, lost control of his vehicle and wrecked due to icy road conditions. Both studentathletes were transported to Vidant Medical Center where Harris

was eventually released after passing precautionary evaluations. Meanwhile, Stanley is still at the medical center and is listed as critical condition.

With recent inclement weather upon Greenville, the ECU Alerts system has been working to keep students and staff updated on the status of school operations.

Yesterday at 12:10 p.m., students were alerted with "Classes to end 1 p.m. Feb. 12," due to the wintry mix of snow, sleet and freezing rain.

The decisions made regarding when to stop classes and transit, are based on a number of official meetings and outside

Professor awarded for research

Professor Ning Zhou, with the department of Health Communication and Science, will receive 2014 new investigators award from the American Auditory Society for her research with cochlear implants.

The award is presented to researchers who have made consistent and productive articles to the organizations journal, "Ear and Hearing Journal."

Her submission titled "Integration of Electrical Pulses by Listeners with Cochlear Implants" explores how to better improve the implants for better hearing and acuity.

"When you are deaf, it does not mean you have lost the nerves but rather you have lost inner ear function, you have lost the hair cells," said Zhou.

Cochlear implants work by surgically implanting an electrical stimulus directly to the auditory nerve. A receiver and mini-computer translate sound waves to digital signals to apply to certain regions of the nerve.

"Figuring out the regions where neuron survival is better or where it is worse and the roles they have is the focus," said Zhou. "Furthermore, we look at the quality rather than the quantity and the role it plays."

Zhou has been given the opportunity to present her research at the upcoming 41st Annual Scientific and Technology meeting in March 6th through 8th in Scottsdale, Ariz.

"I will be presenting data from both guinea pigs and humans from my paper and research," said Zhou.

The almost two-year study included both guinea pigs and human subjects. Zhou will be specifically working with human patients in her lab.

According to the National Institute on Deafness and Other Communication Disorders, in the U.S.

SGA presidential candidates discuss platforms

SGA executive council candidate campaigning has begun and the candidates for president have their own ideas that they would like to see implemented into the university.

Presidential candidate of Ticket 1 is Micah Lockhart, who is currently SGA's deputy chief of staff. He said the focus of his campaign is to make sure that SGA is accountable to students.

"We've agreed to have a promise tracker," said Lockhart. "We'll track the progress of each initiative. The entire ticket is based on accountability."

Ron Hinton, presidential candidate for Ticket 2, previously served as SGA's chief information officer and designed the SGA website. He has a variety of ideas he would like to put through, including making the city and campus more connected.

"With [Greenville] Mayor Thomas we'll work to get a stoplight at 33 East and Copper Beech," said Hinton. "Basically it's time to bridge the gap between the university and the city."

Michael King, presidential candidate for Ticket 3, has held leadership roles in his fraternity Pi Kappa Alpha and is advocating for a separate student legislature that allows student organizations to have their own representatives based on their size.

"We want to have a bi-cameral congress," said King. "We don't want to leave anyone out. With all the delegates we want to have, they'll be going to the faculty senate to advocate on our behalf"

Brooks Barrett, who is running without a ticket, is

currently the SGA treasurer and is a former SGA senator. Barrett wants to increase funding for the SGA appropriations process, which allocates money to student organizations.

"Due to the amount of positive impact this program has and the need for funding student organizations have, I'm actively

proposing an increase in the SGA appropriations budget for the 2014-2015 academic year," Barrett said.

The candidates are also advocating a variety of other changes

Barrett desires to pay more attention to the Allied Health Sciences campus and believes Laupus Library should also be on a 24-hour schedule similar to Joyner Library's.

King would like to put cross walk across 10th street where the ECU Police station to increase campus safety.

"Students are just dodging cars and it's ridiculous," said

Lockhart wants there to be limits set on student fees. He thinks students should not pay more than they need to.

"We want a floating student fee cap," said Lockhart. "It's so students don't pay more than necessary for the university

to function."

Hinton is trying to implement a SGA scholarship program.

He has ideas that will provide incentives to students and ideas

He has ideas that will provide incentives to students and ideas that would turn donated money back into scholarships.

"I want to tell students that the first 50 students that donate a book to the SCA will receive free scentrops [feet] the rest of

a book to the SGA will receive free scantrons [for] the rest of your tenure at ECU," said Hinton. "Students would also be in a raffle for a special prize. We'll take the total sellback value of the books and we'll sell them back to UBE or Dowdy. That money will be used for a scholarship."

Hinton is also planning on working with the mayor and Greenville Police to enforce an alcohol amnesty code.

said Bill Koch, associate vice chancellor for environmental health and campus safety. "We drove the roads and consulted with ECU Transit to ensure the roads were safe throughout the day."

Officials also collaborated with local facilities in effort to make the safest decision for the community.

"Fortunately, we knew from conversations with the Pitt County Emergency Manager that roads were aggressively salted prior to [yesterday's] storm which kept the roads from freezing throughout the event," saidKoch.

Because the university is National Weather Service StormReady certified, officials have access to National Weather Service conference calls and individual consultation with their predictions about weather conditions.

Officials have been assessing the weather and how to go about operations around the clock for the past two days.

"Since we needed to make a decision early in the morning about classes and operations, our severe weather team discussed conditions, forecasts and schedules via conference call so we could get a message out before 6 a.m.," said Koch. "We prefer to make these decisions the night before if possible, but this system has been somewhat unpredictable."

"W.O.M.A.N. really came about because I knew lots of misguided freshmen with no foundation," said Iluyomade. "They have nowhere to go."

After discussing the idea of this organization with her friends, roommates and family, Iluyomade decided to take steps to create it. She picked her executive board based on strengths and different things each woman could offer.

The current executive board consists of President Glory Iluyomade, Vice President Keylynne Cunningham, Secretary Ekene Akpom, Treasurer Amber Watkins, and Media Director Morgan Gibbs.

The executive board is working hard to build their image and promote the organization's name. They wish to build networks through roundtable events, reaching out to other organizations and using social media.

"We go out in the community as well, handing out fliers," said Amber Watkins, junior accounting major.

W.O.M.A.N. will be holding an interest

meeting soon, where they will discuss what W.O.M.A.N. stands for, why they created this organization, its goals/vision and what a potential member could expect.

The organization is open to students from all years and all majors.

W.O.M.A.N. is hoping to recruit 30 members. Membership will be a strict application process. They are looking for individuals with leadership ability, poise, grace and who are well put-together.

officer. "We will also maintain constant contact with the Department of Public Works to address roadways needing immediate attention to allow for safe passage during emergency events."

On Monday, crews applied salt on highways and major city streets to help with the ice and sleet. Pitt County has trucks prepared in case plowing is needed.

The roads remained pretty clear after the snowfall, but the GPD did receive a significant amount of accident calls on Tuesday due to the heavy snowfall blocking drivers' views.

"We encourage people to use extra caution if they absolutely must drive, particularly on bridges because they ice first. Slow down and leave extra time to get where you are going."

roughly 58,000 adults and 38,000 children have received cochlear implants.

"The good thing about human patients is that the experiments [are] noninvasive. We will be looking at physical properties of the stimulus. It is about perception," said Zhou.

Elements of research will include psychophysical methods and studying the relationship between physical stimuli and the sensations and perceptions they affect. Threshold measurement, among other aspects, of hearing will be collected and analyzed.

"The ultimate goal is to improve hearing in humans and while there is a correlation in the nerves of both [humans and guinea pigs], analyzing the data is quite different," said Zhou.

Zhou plans to continue studying the nature of nerve condition and

the properties and roles in cochlear implants.

"Cochlear Implants have improved dramatically over the 25 years since it first came about, from single electrodes to many electrodes," said Zhou.

Zhou arrived at the university last semester from Ohio University. Her past submissions include papers to the "Acoustic Society of America" and "Ear and Hearing."

"These papers basically are methods that we looked at to improve outcomes by selectively stimulating areas or adjusting parameters and finding ways [to] make it better," said Zhou. "There are a lot of factors and this research is continuing that line of study."

"Last time we weren't prepared and we had 2-3 inches of straight ice."


Brooke Brushe, a freshman

Shooting the breeze with Shae Nelson

It was easy to see her frustration as she shot just 1-5 against Bethune-Cookman and 4-12 against Florida Atlantic. These types of performances summarized the first half of Shae Nelson's season.

At the opposite end of the spectrum, her career high performances of late have left her with an ear-to-ear smile in postgame

"It was all about focus and preparation," said Nelson. "At first I was spending a lot of time in the gym, but it wasn't productive time or quality time that I was doing things that I needed to get things done. The more I started to focus and put in the work that was necessary to get it done, it just started to come together."

Nelson netted her ECU career high in points in back-to-back games against Old Dominion and Charlotte with 17 points.

Following Nelson's career night against Old Dominion, Coach Heather Macy said, "We know she can do this every night and we hope this is a breakout game for her."

As it turned out, Macy's hope became reality as Nelson's hot streak continued as they took to the road to face Marshall and UAB. Nelson picked up a then career high 24 points in just 21 minutes against Marshall. Then, just three days later, she did it again as she picked up 27 in the overtime win against UAB after logging just 23 minutes.

Early on in the season, the Lady Pirates looked to two explosive scoring options in Jada Payne and Abria Trice. With the addition of Nelson as a major scoring threat, the Lady Pirates attack has become much more dangerous.

"I'm very comfortable now," said Trice. "On my off days in games, I know that I have teammates to come and step up in the game and help our team win."

Trice also expressed how exciting it has

been for her to watch Nelson's game reach

"It's great to see her start to hit shots, because it's not only making her better as a player, but it's making all of us better," said

Nelson took the long road to ECU. Her colligate career started in the Southeastern Conference (SEC) as she attended Ole Miss. After her freshman season, she transferred to Northwest Florida State College. From there, Nelson started to look for a new home for her junior season.

"I was supposed to initially go to Auburn, but things did not end up happening that way," said Nelson.

That's when ECU assistant coach Ollin Dunford stepped into the picture. Nelson met Dunford through one of her old coaches.

"Talking to him and Coach Macy made me feel like this was the place for me," said Nelson. Given his long relationship with Nelson,

his excitement for her is obvious.

"Shae has started to understand the system and that is what we want for all of our players," said Dunford. "We want them to learn their place in the system and to peak and make the most of their opportunities.

Nelson's game could not have reached this level at a better time in the season as just six games remain in the season. Three of the six games will be against top-tier conference teams - including Middle Tennessee who has spent most of the season ranked in the AP Top 25.

"It comes down to competitive greatness," said Dunford. "It's about being your best when your best is required."

Nelson and the Lady Pirates will look to continue their stellar season Saturday at home against North Texas at home.

Pirate baseball takes to the diamond

Diamond Bucs start season with JMU

ECU baseball opens up their highly anticipated 2014 campaign when they host the James Madison University Dukes for a three game set starting Friday.

JMU is coming off of a 25-30 campaign and returns four keyplayers from last year's team including outfielder Chad Carroll.

Carroll is the Dukes best offensive player. He is a solid contact hitter, but what sets him apart is his speed. He finished second in the nation last year with eight triples. He also hit .389 with 55 RBIs and 21 stolen bases.

Sophomore catcher Travis Watkins will be charged with keeping Carroll in check along the base paths. Watkins started 34 games last season for the Pirates and gunned down 13 base runners.

Pitching wise, the Bulldogs return two starters. Junior's Michael Howerton and Patrick Toohers. Both Howerton and Toohers are

right-handers and will be tasked with matching up against ECU's strong rotation.

Chase McDonald, now graduated, vided the Pirates with power last season. With his departure, there is a gap in the middle of the lineup and Godwin will have to look elsewhere to fill the void.

If no one is able to step up and provide the Pirates with consistent power the rotation will have to carry

The battle of replacing Jack Reinheimer at the shortstop position will be between junior college transfer Hunter Allen and freshman Kirk Morgan. Both players have seen equal reps in the preseason and it will be interesting to see who Godwin chooses on opening day.

This series could be a pitchers duel and whichever team commits the least amount of errors should have the advantage.

Pirate hoops hits the road

After an impressive win against Texas-San Antonio Saturday night in Minges, the Pirates have won two of their last three games and are playing with more confidence.

ECU (13-11, 2-7 C-USA) will take on the Tulsa Golden Hurricane tonight at 8:05 p.m in the first installment of a twogame road trip. Tulsa (11-12, 6-3 C-USA) struggled earlier this season but has hit a stride in the midst of conference play. The Golden Hurricane have won eight of their 11 home games and will surely be a test for

Senior Akeem Richmond is seeking revenge for Tulsa's 79-72 home win against the Pirates in last season's conference

"I was telling Paris [Roberts-Campbell] and some of the other guys that we owe them for last year," said Richmond. "We're going to come out and play hard."

Tulsa's success stems from their young guards. Guard James Woodard leads his team with 14.4 points and 6.3 rebounds

Three weeks ago, Woodard had 16 points, as well as the go-ahead shot, in the Golden Hurricane's home win over Middle Tennessee (17-7, 7-2 C-USA).

The Pirates should be weary of Golden



Akeem Richmond scored 31 pts. last game. Hurricane forward D'Andre Wright. His 6-foot-9, 250-pound frame could pose a threat to ECU's shorthanded frontcourt.

On Feb. 6, Tulsa nearly took down conference frontrunner Louisiana Tech (20-5, 8-2 C-USA) on the road, but fell short, 66-61.

The Pirates will be Texas-bound for their matchup against the North Texas Mean Green at 8 p.m. on Saturday.

The Mean Green (11-12, 2-7 C-USA)

are coming off four straight conference losses and are tied with ECU in the C-USA standings. This game should be a good opportunity for the Pirates to notch another conference win, but nothing is certain on

Junior guard Jordan Williams and senior guard Alzee Williams have been efficient for North Texas. Jordan averages 12.7 points and 6.3 rebounds per game while Alzee scores 11.8 ppg this season.

In a home match versus UAB on Jan. 23, Jordan and Alzee combined for 34 points and led their team to a 76-65 victory.

If ECU can ride its momentum and win these two approaching road games, the Pirates will move up from the lower tier of the conference ladder to the middle of the pack.

Richmond was 15-for-15 from the free throw line in Saturday night's victory over UTSA and carried the Pirates with his 31 points. Richmond has expanded his game lately by drawing fouls and getting to the charity stripe where he makes 86 percent of his attempts.

"If the defense gives me an open three, then of course I will take it," said Richmond, who has the second-most three pointers in the NCAA. "If not, I'll drive or do whatever I have to do to help this team win."

The men's tennis team is coming off three consecutive shutout victories and they are one win away from surpassing last season's longest winning streak of eight matches. Their opposition today is The Citadel at 2 p.m., as they try to continue their

ECU has momentum on its side, but The Citadel look to upset the away team and add to their own streak.

The Citadel started the season off losing their first six matches, five of which were complete shutouts, while the other was a 6-1 romping. The team was looking bad, but things turned around once February came.

The Bulldogs are 2-0 this month with wins against Benedict and Spartanburg Methodist. Both wins were Bulldog shutouts.

Even though The Citadel's record is only 2-6, they have faced higher profile opponents in the form of Florida State and South Carolina.

Arguably, the only tough school ECU has faced was the University of North Carolina, which happens to be their one and only loss of the season.

Coach Shawn Heinchon says he is excited about today's match. It will be ECU's first outdoor match of the season and he's ready to see how the Pirates stand against the Bulldogs.

"They've played a really hard schedule so far, so we're looking forward to a good test there," said Heinchon.

The Citadel's last loss was against Coastal Carolina. Ironically, ECU's next opponent is Coastal Carolina, so the match against The Citadel will certainly show how the Pirates measure up. Saturday's match will start at 1 p.m. in Conway, S.C.

The Chanticleers have a record of 3-3; of their three

losses, two were against the likes of Wake Forest and Virginia Tech.

Coastal Carolina has yet to lose a home match, which could be a tough test for the Pirates.

"That's always a very tough test," Heinchon said. "We lost to them last year at home, so we're hoping we can go down there and avenge our loss at their place."

The last time these two teams faced was March of last year at ECU's home court. Coastal Carolina defeated the Pirates 4-3.

If ECU manages to defeat the Chanticleers, then they will be one step closer to reaching their goal of becoming ranked, but first they must beat The Citadel.

is slated as ECU's Saturday starter after he thrived in that role as a redshirt freshman last year. Lucroy had the lowest ERA (2.49) among the Pirates' weekend starters in 2013 and was second on the team to Hoffman in strikeouts (82). Fellow righty Tyler Bolton will get the nod Sunday to close the series. Bolton appeared in 10 games last season.

Drew Reynolds will be relied on again for his talents as a closer and a revered hitter at the plate. He led the Pirates with a .322 batting average and 68 hits in 2013 and has 24 career saves—three away from

setting the school record. As a result, he has been tabbed Conference USA's Preseason Co-Player of the Year along with Florida International's Houchins, (Ian) Townsend catcher Aramis Garcia.

Outside of Reynolds, ECU has a large hole to fill in the middle of its batting order. Chase McDonald, who led the Pirates in home runs (11) and slugging (.519), was drafted by the Houston Astros, last July.

Third baseman Zach Houchins will likely fill the void at the clean-up spot. He finished just a couple points behind Reynolds and McDonald in

batting (.317) and slugging (.513) and led the team in extra base hits (25).

"I think Reynolds, and (Luke) Lowery have really had good preseasons and I think they are poised to make a formidable middle of the order," Godwin said.

Another spot that needs to be filled is the middle of ECU's defensive infield. The Pirates need to replace Bryan Bass and Jack Reinheimer and Godwin said he's been impressed by freshman Kirk Morgan and junior Hunter Allen at

shortstop. Reynolds will likely be asked to play second base when he's not pitching.

The most notable matchups on ECU's schedule are its home-and-home series' with both North Carolina and N.C. State, who each reached last summer's College World Series.

"It's unbelievable. You see (local teams) having so much success and you want to be a part of that," said Hoffman. "This year we've got goals set for each other, we know we can trust each other."

Folk Arts Society hosts dance

his Saturday at the Drew Steele Center, the Folk Arts Society of Greenville (FASG) will hold a Contra Dance. The FASG describes contra dancing as a "self-inflicted amusement park ride." The Hollis Family Band, a local group, will perform live music at the dance and freshman Sarah Hollis will be

playing fiddle. The band typically plays a mix of old-time, bluegrass, and Celtic music.

The FASG is non-profit, was established in 1986 and began sponsoring dancing events such as Contra dance monthly since the 90s. Contra dance is a type of folk dance similar to square dancing, and the FASG holds a contra dance every third Saturday of the school year.

Although contra dancing is similar to square dancing,

there are small differences in the two styles. In square dancing it is common for the caller (music player/band) to improvise calls (music) on the fly, allowing for a dynamic interaction between the caller and the dancers, whereas contra dances are highly repetitive and include a variety of waltzes.

Leanne Smith, an English professor, is on the board of the Folk Arts Society here in Greenville and says no

partner or experience is necessary.

"Some of the movements in contra dancing, like circles, stars, allemandes, and swings are also elements of square dancing, but the overall group formation for contra dancing is lines," said Smith. "In pairs of lines, couples progress 'down the hall' (away from the band) and 'up the hall' (towards the band), interacting with most or all of the other dancers in the line during a single dance."

While walk-throughs typically precede each dance during an evening, new dancers will find the lesson (a definition session) useful, and dancers from beginner to experienced are welcome. Prior to the actual dance, retired ECU dance teacher Pat Pertalion will give a lesson.

Sophomore business major Shannon Carter has danced her entire life and is a fan of contra dancing.

"Partner dancing is always more fun than other styles of dancing because of the interaction," said Carter. She also thinks attending the contra dance, as a valentine date would be a great idea.

Carter was asked to teach freshman biology major, Joseph Chukwu the basics of contra.

Chukwu had no prior dancing experience but was a good enough sport to try it out. At the beginning, Chukwu was less than enthusiastic about contra dancing. With such little experience, and a male mentality that dance is an art best left to females, some of the dance steps were challenging to him. However, after a little practice he began to smile and enjoy himself.

"I'm not much of a dancer, but as the dance went on I felt a little bit more confident and got to feel the joy of dancing," said Chukwu. "Especially since my partner was so experienced."

Carter and Chukwu both highly recommend contradancing to the novice dancer and experienced alike.

The Contra Dance will bet in Drew Steele Center at 7 p.m. this Saturday for lessons, and those not needing a lesson should arrive at 7:30 p.m. The event lasts until 10 p.m. and costs \$5 for students and seniors and \$8 for the general public.

"LOVE ACTUALLY"





"WINTER'S TALE"





"50 FIRST DATES"


