Scripture lesson: Fifth Chapter Matthews, Verses 13-15

"Ye are the salt of the earth." Jesus was talking to his Disciples, and what He said is applicable to all those who follow Him from that day to this. But if the salt has lost its savor, then it is of no value. "Ye are the light of the world".
