Adams of the Department of Afro American Studies at Howard University in Washington, D.C., explained in commenting on the recent debate over racial identity during Black History Month.

Writing in the current issue of the new Black Excellence magazine on "Naming The Race," Adams points out that "persons of color" in the United States have been identified as "Colored, Negro, Afro-American and Black," before the Rev. Jesse Jackson suggested using the original term, "African-American," for U.S. citizens whose ancestors came from the new world's second largest continent.

The basic rationale for suggesting this specific change now was that of all the distinct ethnic and cultural groups in America, "blacks" were the only group which did not have a clear geographic reference point in its name (such as Italian-American or Irish-American), Dr. Adams em-

phasized. By adopting the term 'African American,' it is asserted, persons of African descent at last could reject previous ... labels, all of which were applied by others to them-rather than being originated by

Americans of African descent them," he added. Of course, black have been identified by a variety of free and slave emigres have always

What are the obstacles preventing Pitt County from realizing its potential today? - What are the ideal strategies


needed to carry Pitt County into the future (i.e. into the Year



Apples are good to eat. Apples offered for sale right now in North Carolina stores, farmers' markets, roadside stands, anywhere, are good to eat. According to the N.C. Department of Agriculture, there is no evidence

of the contrary. N.C. Agriculture Commissioner, Jim Graham, recommends that North Carolinagrown apples or anybody's apples or juice are wholesome and nutritious. The food and drug laboratory of the North Carolina Department of Agriculture says they are good and so does the

federal government.
Our lab has tested 150 samples of apples, apple juice and juice concentrate and found nothing but clean, safe and good

products. Ninety apples tested have shown no Alar; 39 juice samples showed no Alar and 21 frozen concentrate, only 3 showed any sign of Alar. And that was well below the tolerance of 20 parts per million set by the Environmental Protection Agency. One sample of the concentrate showed 1 ppm;

Somke Doggie restaurants serve enormous portions of food which their customers can't possibly finish. when this happens it is appropriate to ask the the waiter to have uneaten portions wrapped for you to take home. I think it shows prudence and foresight to take food home rather than to allow perfectly good food to be thrown out in the restaurant kitchen.

Simple introductions. Men should always stand, and most women too, when being introduced to older people or to high officials. A man always stands when being introduced to another man or a woman, and today at small gatherings more and more women feel comfortable standing when the men stand to be introduced to a newcomer. How Much to Tip. A waiter is tipped between fifteen and twenty percent of the meal, including drinks, before taxes.

For a permanent or a hair coloring your tip should not be under five dollars.

The guideline for beauty-parlor tipping is fifteen to twenty percent for any service they provide.

Whether or not you visit the salon only a few times a year or you have a standing weekly appointment, your tips should remain consistent. Don't pay less if you visit less often. They are still putting out the same quality work for you.

If the owner of the shop has cut your hair, he or she doesn't receive a tip. Often the owner charges more for a cut, so there is no reason to tip, though on your way out show your appreciation with a thank you.

AUTOMOBILES. A woman is not expected to wait for a man to get out of the car and trot around to open her door for her while she sits there like some delicate hothouse flower. Women no longer need to appear helpless, just as men no longer need to act

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Journalist needs to re-think his blackness, stop misguiding



Fresh from his televised appearance before the

of white racism and labeled the ousting of Republican National Committee Chairman Lee Atwater from the university's 30-member board of trustees as a moral victory.

Atwater, who became a convenient umbrella for years of pent-up student frustration over campus crime, housing, and student loans, was just as lame in his Republican defense. Being as pure as the driven snow, all this official of "the party of opportunity" wanted was a chance to serve the black community by raising money and scholarships for Howard and getting internships for the students at the White House, Atwater intimated.

Both Jackson and Atwater reeked of political partisanship; both were conveniently shielded from the truth by their shared objective of controlling the black vote. However partisan, their ambitions were at least motivated by an understandable objective.

But it was a black columnist for The Washington Post whose motives are suspect, at best. Courtland Milloy, who has written previously that black people are incapable of economic self-sufficiency, interpreted the student activism

The Howard students, he wrote, suffered from the delusion that what they were doing was meaningful. "What black students should really be outrraged about is the fact that so many of them are flunking out of school," charged Milloy.

To prove his point he quoted from an article in "Harper's" by an English teacher at a white college in San Jose (previously, to prove his point that blacks were too brain dead to run a business, he used a white teacher at the University of Maryland as his reference).

The black "drop-out rate is 72 percent," despite the white colleges' attempt to help them. Rather than demonstrating, they would be better off "reading and studying," Milloy quoted the teacher as saying. After all, blacks have "the highest drop-out rate and lowest grade point average of any group in American universities," Milloy further quoted his source from San Jose University

And, Milloy stressed, the students at Howard cannot justify this academic failure by denouncing Atwater's presence on the board of trustees. "The issue, for now, is the proliferation of mediocrity among black college students, and what to do about it," the Black Sage of The Washington Post proclaimed. He seems to suggest black students are stupid ("mediocre," he says) because of activism and retarded because they are activists.

## "Love's Labour's Lost" to be presented at ECU

Their plan is upset and highspirited frolics ensue when the Princess of France and her ladies appear on the scene. The result is humurous deceit, surreptitious delivery of love sonnets, music and dance. A comic subplot in "Love's Labour's Lost" offers satiric portraits of a schoolmaster, a clergyman, a constable and a Spaniard.

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



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

Had Jesus gone with the flow, He perhaps would have saved Himself much of the suffering that He endured on the cross for the sake of all mankind.

Such resolve should be the rallying cry for all oppressed African Americans everywhere.

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### The family is the core of our existence

Back in May of 1984, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, in conjunction with the National Urban League, jointly sponsored a "Black Family Summit" which was held on the campus of Fisk University in Nashville, Tennessee.

The two sponsoring groups recognized then that the black family, the single most important institution in our community, had come under withering assault by any number of social factors. Among them were racism, unemployment, inferior educational opportunities, drugs, crime, as well as other negative influences.

Those factors had had a devastating impact on the family, the once impregnable bastion of security and hope in the black community.

The proportion of black children born out of wedlock had increased nearly 60% or almost three times the 1960 rate. The seeds for an ever growing cycle of poverty, once sown, had begun to grow to full bloom and

promised to reap an unhealthy harvest within the country.


This in itself was alarming and it called for immediate action then, and it calls for concerted action now on the part of the African American community.

Black family crisis was not one brought on by an intrinsic weakness in the body politic of African Americans, but by economic and political factors over which African Americans had little or no control.

But, now, many of the conditions which led to breakdown in the black family have spilled over into white families as well.

Fortunately, there are some positive signs that increasingly, all segments of society have recognized that unless resolved, potentially the breakdown of the family structure can be as deadly as a nuclear attack.

There can be no question about it, America must find solutions to he problems which now involve families of every race. The solutions must be found soon.



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
