Vernon Robinson for State Superintendent

Vernon L. Robinson, of Winston-Salem, will run for State Superintendent of Public Instruction. The theme of his campaign is "Effective Schools for the 21st Century."

Robinson's experience in both public service and political leadership proves to be the backbone needed to strengthen his campaign. Robinson obtained a BS degree from the US Air Force Academy and MBA degree from the University of Missouri. His years of public service extends from his affiliation with the NAACP as a Life Sustaining Member (1983-90). Also, he was a member of the Winston Lake YMCA Board of Management, the NC Black Leadership Caucus regional Vice Chair, the Advisory Board-Boys Club Unity Cleveland Ave. Homes and ended his years of service as Chair of the Political Action Committee of the NAACP.

In his campaign for State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Robinson stresses three issues that would improve the educational system in North Carolina. In point "Effective Schools Measure Outputs Not Inputs", Robinson declares "Effectiveness should be gauged exclusively on student performance. The education bureaucracy is producing ill-equipped students,

judged with mediocre standards used to validate their results. World class standards should be used to set desired levels of competence."

Another point, "Effective Schools Are Most Likely When Parents Choose," Robinson stresses that he supports empowering parents to choose the public school that best meets their children's educational needs. "I also support giving teachers more autonomy so that they are better able to create programs that meet the great diversity of learning styles and would encourage school districts to allow teacher initiated alternative schools. Eleventh and twelfth graders should be able to enroll as special students at any college or university if those programs are stronger than his or her high school."

The final point of his campaign is "Effective Schools Have the Best Teachers in the Classroom." With this concept in mind Robinson added, "Part-time and full-time alternative certification will help put the best teachers in the classroom instead of emphasizing teacher education classes. The concept of the master teacher should be implemented and we must also cut administrative overhead at the state and school district levels."

In conclusion, Vernon L. Robinson is a man with a mission to hype-up the educational statue of the North Carolina School system. Throughout his campaign Robinson continues to emphasize that it is crucial to make sure North Carolina won't continue to remain in low hopes of attaining education excellence - which is why his words continue to ring "High expectations, hard work and faith..."

Clayton Honored as Nation's Top 1992 Women Candidate

Eva M. Clayton was honored as one of the nation's top 1992 Women candidates at a gala reception in Washington, D.C. sponsored by the Women's Campaign, an organization that supports women candidates and recognizes the unique qualities they bring to political office.

"Eva Clayton represents one of our best prospects for increasing the number of Women Members of Congress, and we're proud to support her," said WCF Executive Director Jan Danowitz.

Clayton was honored in our nation's capitol, the day after she announced her candidacy for Representative from North Carolina's First Congressional District. That

"whistle-stop" tour covered five major cities in the newly-created district, and drew enthusiastic support from Elizabeth City to Henderson.

Twenty-nine other women from across the nation shared the spotlight with Eva Clayton, at the Washington affair. They were congressional, mayoral, and gubernatorial candidates which WCF sees as talented and energetic public servants.

If elected, Clayton would be the first female top represent North Carolina in the U.S. Congress. She would also be the first minority from North Carolina since Reconstruction to serve in Congress.

"The Clarence Thomas confirmation

proceedings represented an unpaid advertisement for why we need a fresh perspective — and a female perspective — in the Congress. All of our political barometers tell us that the climate has never been better for electing women to public office," said Danowitz.

The Women's Campaign Fund, founded in 1974, is the nation's oldest and largest political committee serving professional women candidates. In the last election cycle, WCF provided over one-half million dollars in cash and technical assistance to 113 candidates in 36 states — more money to more women than any other organization.

Concerned Parent Expresses Opinion on Discipline of Six Year-Old

To Whom It May Concern:

I have heard and read many accounts where Black males are in danger. I had no reference, or, I thought I had no reference until things began to add up over a period of time.

My son, Robert Barnes is Black, six years old and is in the first grade. He is a student at South Greenville School. I would say he

is an average child, very energetic and curious. He loves to go to school at this point.

Some time ago I began to get Disciplinary Referrals from Robert's school. I did not keep them because they were so silly, I could not believe some of them, that a teacher would take time to sit down and go through the process of a Disciplinary Referral Action for

what had happened. I did keep the enclosed Disciplinary Referral because this one was the last draw. How can a 6 year old Black male be charged with damaged to property and vandalism for eating a green crayon.

This is the kind of thing that starts early in a child's life and is perpetuated over a period of time because these slips are placed in his school record. Each teacher will believe he is "BAD" and therefore he will become what is ex-

"Mama can't you help me?" and find that parents are helpless to stop this kind of treatment. Kids grow believing there is no one who can help them and their parents can't talk to them anymore because respect has been lost. The teacher's bottom line is always, "you must not care about your child."

I know there are many other parents out there who are having the same kind of experiences I am having South Greenville School

istered. They had him sitting out in the Secretary's office more than one time because they said he could not go to class. He always properly registered; the school lawyer had to verify that for these teachers.

Now that that situation is over, they want to place him in a "Special Class", because I disagreed, they reported me to the Department of Social Services for Child Neglect. Each time I disagree with the teachers at South Greenville School, I get a call from the De-

partment of Social Services on a referral from the school for "Child Neglect".

The two teachers at South Greenville seem intent on destroying Black families and rights they may have. It seems the Principal come in on the end of this and only relay information the teachers may have. It is as it has always been, the teacher is always right. What happens to family and student rights? "What is going on in Pitt County?"

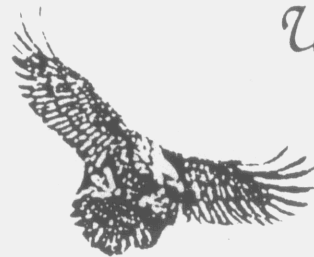

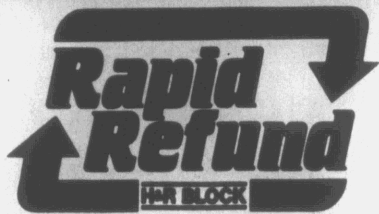

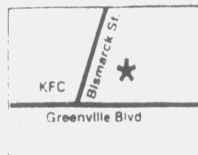

Elizabeth City State University to Observe Annual Founder's Day

Elizabeth City State University will observe its annual Founders' Day Celebration on March 8, beginning at 10 am, in Moore Hall Auditorium. The guest speaker, Dr. Jimmy Raymond Jenkins, Chancellor of Elizabeth City State University.

In recognition of the launching of the University's second-century the Founders Day Committee deemed it appropriate that Dr. Jenkins deliver the Founders' Day address. The Committee is grateful the Chancellor accepted the invitation.

Dr. Jenkins serves as an excel-

lent role model for the students, faculty, staff and alumni of ECSU. First, because of what he has already achieved as a leader in north-eastern North Carolina and secondly, because he also attended ECSU.

Dr. Jenkins received his B.S. degree in Biology from ECSU in 1965. From 1965 through 1969, he taught Biology and Chemistry at Queen Anne's Country High School in Centerville, Maryland. From 1969 to 1972, Dr. Jenkins studied at Purdue University in Lafayette, Indiana where he received his Master's degree in Biology and his

Ph.D. in Biology Education.

Dr. Jenkins returned to his alma mater—ECSU—where he was appointed assistant professor of Biology. After teaching at ECSU for a short period, he was appointed Assistant Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and in 1977, after a national search, he was appointed Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs and Dean of the Faculty. In 1896 when Josephine St. Pierre Ruffin founded the National Association of Colored Women's Clubs in Boston, Mass., Black women came together to address their specific concerns and to promote the welfare of their people in religion, education, health, employment, and social welfare. Our youth and the Black family have been the central unifying force behind the establishment of Black women's organizations. In 1935, Ollie Chin Porter and other Black businesswomen founded the National Association of Negro Business and Professional Women's

Clubs. Also in 1935, Mary McLeod Bethune established the National Council of Negro Women.

We have celebrated Black American achievement through Black History Month in February and we celebrate female achievement in March, Women's History Month.

In 1770 Phillis Wheatley became America's first Black woman to publish poetry. No one can review Black female history without recognizing special heroines like ex-slave Harriet Tubman, known as the greatest "conductor" of the Underground Railroad; her's was a movement of freedom. It was 1911 when Madame C. J. Walker became America's foremost Black businesswoman and ran the highly successful hair dressing empire known as the Walker System.

There are countless more out-

standing Black women that I have neglected to mention, and those who followed. But when you speak of women committed to service, there is one who must be applauded - Mary McLeod Bethune. Not only did she found Bethune-Cookman College, but she founded the National Council of Negro Women and she was the first Black woman to serve as advisor to a United States President.

Let's think of some of our local Black women who have achieved: Mrs. Lucille Gorham, first Black woman on the Greenville City School Board; Mrs. Mildred Council, first Greenville city councilwoman, Said Saulter School bears the name of a devoted, dedicated school principal, Mrs. Belle M. Atkinson, Carver Library's first librarian; Miss Esther Rich, blind since age six and graduated from Howard University with honors,

and Mrs. Jean Darden, Rose High's first Black assistant principal to name a few.

The issue of poverty, human service, crime, sex, drugs, the paramount issue of equity, are all Black women's issues. Adversity has made the Black woman tenacious, concerned, assertive or aggressive, determined and task-oriented. She has learned to perceive obstacles as opportunities and stumbling

Jan Matzeliger Inventor 1852-1889

The shoe-lasting machine invented by Jan Matzeliger not only revolutionized the shoe industry but also made Lynn, Massachusetts, the "shoe capital of the world."

Born in Paramaribo Dutch Guiana, Matzeliger found employment in the government machine works at the age of 10. Eight years later, he immigrated to the United States, settling in Philadelphia, where he worked in a shoe factory. He latter moved to New England, settling permanently in Lynn.

The Industrial Revolution had by this time resulted in the invention of machines to sew, cut, and tack shoes, but none had been perfected to last a shoe. Seeing this, Matzeliger lost little time in designing and patenting just such a device, one which he refined over the years to a point where it could adjust a shoe, arrange the leather over the sole, drive in the nails, and deliver the finished product — all in one minute's time.

Matzeliger's patent was subsequently bought by Sydney W. Winslow, who established the United Shoe machine Company. The continued success of this business brought about a 50% reduction in the price of shoes across the nation, doubled wages, and improved working conditions for millions of people dependent on the shoe industry for their livelihood.

Between 1883 and 1891, Jan received 5 patents on his inventions, all which contributed to the shoe making revolution. His last patent was issued in September 1891, two years posthumously.

Matzeliger died when only 37, long before he had the chance to realize a share of the enormous profit derived from his invention. He never received any money. Instead, he was issued stock in the company which did not become valuable until after his death.

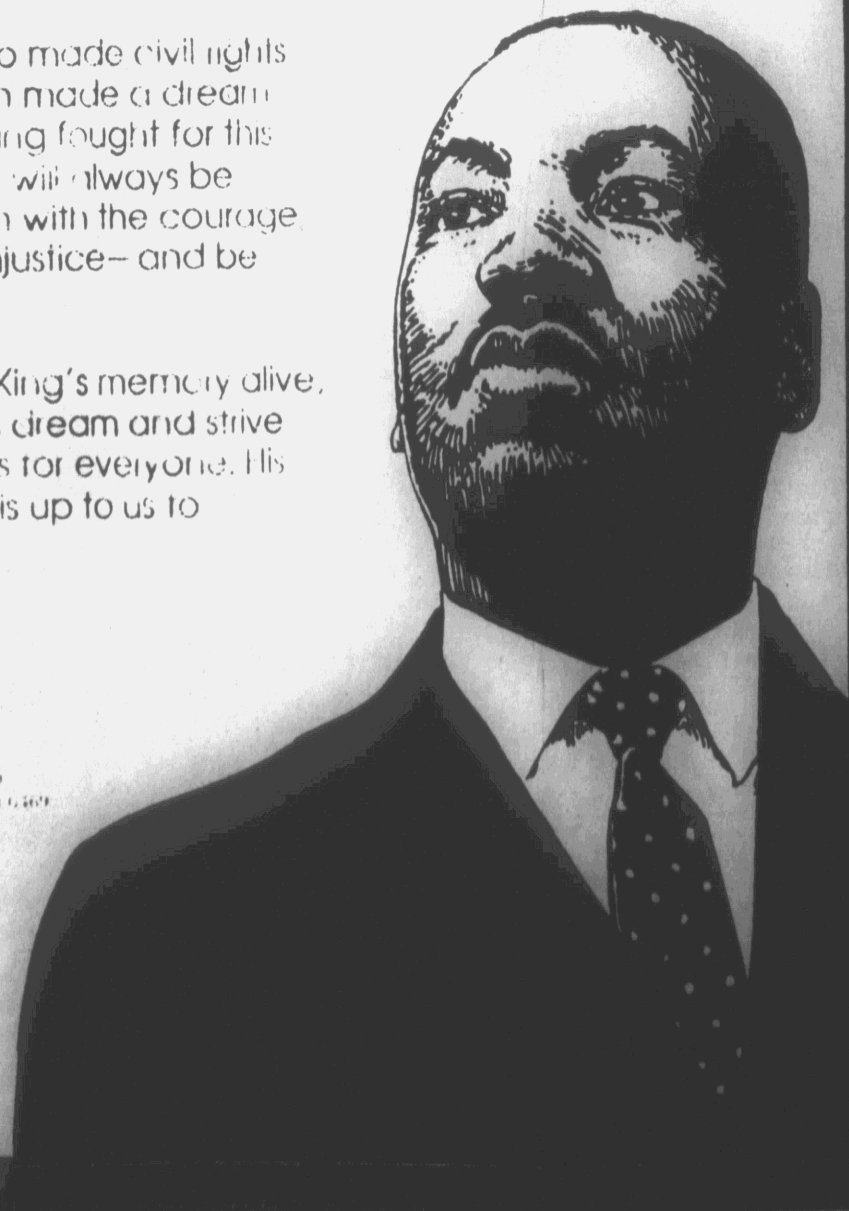

The Historical Walk

In recognition of Black History Month, We honor the contributions Of our nation's African Amercians

Black History Month has always meant to me a time we set aside to honor the achievement of those who have, and have paving the way for the next generations to come. But what does it mean to other young African Americans?

That question weighed heavily on my mind as I walked through the campus of ECU. So, I asked a few of the students for their interpretation of Black History month. Most said the same thing that I said; but, a few had different answers. One young man named Derrick said it should give people an incentive to find their origins, another student agreed with him on this.

Then, another said it should remind us not to forget where we came from and to give something back to our community. Alan Jackson liked to think of this as a time to honor our historic leaders who broke many barriers for us such as Dr. King. I was most impressed personally by that answer. Still, half of those I asked didn't know the answers. That really convinced me in a way that they either didn't know about their history or didn't think it to be very important.

Judging from the shortage of Black males and teachers on the campus that I noticed, I can see why.

History of the Multicultural Center Concept

The Multicultural Center Concept was a result of discussions during a "Community Round-Table Forum." Through a grant from NC Humanities Council, Dr. Mohammed Ahad conducted four community round tables on four cultures: Indian, Hispanic, Chinese, and Mid-Eastern. The program evaluations were glowing and suggested establishment of a

permanent community-based cultural center. The then president of the Pitt-Greenville Chamber of Commerce and other interested persons brainstormed the pros and cons of such an endeavor. The group suggested establishing a small committee and a study group of interested professionals, community representatives, and cultural activists. After exploration

of need, an executive committee was elected, and three subcommittees were appointed to begin the implementation process. The project is incorporated as an independent nonprofit corporation. A seventeen member Board of Directors and six Subcommittees were elected and are active. You are invited to lend your support to this worthy cause.


