South African Blacks to get back Land Stolen during Apartheid

Special to the NNPA from IPS/GIN

Thousands of Black South Africans will soon be able to buy back land taken from them during the apartheid era. Landless Blacks are allowed to claim White-owned farmland. If White farmers refuse to sell, a new law lets the government step in and forcibly buy the land at market price.

So far, about 20 percent of the land has been claimed. In some regions, such as Limpopo and KwaZulu-Natal, the figure is close to 50 percent.

So far 45,000 of the total 70,000 claims have been settled. The government aims to settle the rest by 2005.

The enforced selling law is only expected to be used in about 5 to 10 percent of claims, chief land claims commissioner Tozi Gwanya told Reuters.

During the apartheid regime, Blacks were denied the right to own land. Apartheid ended in 1994, and the new government promised to give back 30 percent of the farmland to landless Blacks within five years. But 10 years on, just 2 percent has been handed over. More than 90 percent is still owned by South Africa's White minority.

Several African countries are involved in the controversial practice of redistributing land to Blacks. In Namibia, landless Blacks frustrated with government land reform programs have threatened to take White-owned land by force

And in Zimbabwe, President Robert Mugabe faced international criticism for allowing Blacks to occupy and take White-owned farms. A number of White farmers were killed in the process.

If one needs any more evidence that whites and people of color live in two totally different places, politically and psychically, one need only look at the visual evidence provided by the death of Ronald Reagan.

More to the point, all one needs to know about this man and his Presidency can be gleaned by looking even haphazardly at the racial and ethnic makeup of the crowds flocking to his ranch, or his library to pay tribute. So too will it be apparent from the assemblage lining the streets of DC for his funeral procession, or gathering in the Capitol Rotunda to pay respects to their departed hero.

They are, and will be - in case you missed it or are waiting for the safest notice prediction in the history of monochromy of their throng is no to Reagan's death: namely, either prognostication - white. Gentlemen, I greet you here on the bank of the James River in the year of our Lord one thousand seven hundred and twelve. First, I shall thank you, the gentlemen of the Colony of Virginia, for bringing me here. I am here to help you solve some of your problems with slaves. Your invitation reached me on my modest plantation in the West Indies where I have experimented with some of the newest and still the oldest methods for control of slaves. Ancient Rome would envy us if my program is implemented. As our boat sailed south on the James River, named for ur illustrious King, whose version of the Bible we cherish, I saw enough to know that your

standing human bodies along its old highways in great numbers you are here using the tree and the rope on occasion.

I caught a whiff of a dead slave hanging from a tree a couple of miles back. You are not only losing valuable stock by hangings, you are having uprisings, slaves are running away, your crops are sometimes left in the fields too long for maximum profit, you suffer occasional fires, your animals are killed. Gentlemen, you know what your problems are; I do not need to elaborate. I am not here to enumerate your problems, I am here to introduce you to a method of solving them.

How Wealth Perpetuates Inequality The Hidden Cost of Being African American

Atrıcan Americans otten seem cut off from the economic mainstream. They face higher risks of poverty, joblessness and incarceration than their fellow citizens do. Community organizing, civil rights legislation, landmark court decisions and rising education have advanced the cause of racial equality. Overt bigotry has been banished from public places, and polls show that whites harbor fewer improvements have not been enough. How can disadvantages persist, so long after most laws, minds, and practices have changed? The answer is the disparities of wealth. Whites are wealthier than African Americans, and whites' wealth advantage is much bigger than their advantages in either income African Americans inherited less

or education. Whites start out ahead wealth from their parents than today's because they inherit more from their whites did. It is not hard to see why: parents, and America's racially The generation of African Americans segregated housing markets boost now passed away accumulated less whites' home equities, while depressing those of African American families. Shapiro concludes that African Americans will not gain significant Americans enjoyed. The disparity in ground in the wealth divide until inheritance and housing policies change. Wealth is the sum of the important assets a person or family owns--home equity, pension funds, savings accounts and investments. Wealth is better than income because it is durable. Large portions of an intensely self-conscious Black "leadership class" disconnected themselves from mass organizing, believing their own upward mobility to be synonymous with "progress" for "The Race" as a whole. We are reaping the whirlwind of the late-Sixties era political mission divide - which gives the appearance of a generational split only because those who abandoned the "movement" nearly 40 years ago (and their successors) have been allowed to dominate Black politics to the present day

It is incorrect to characterize the "Civil Rights Generation," which is also the "Black Power Generation," as having collectively skipped out on the "Hip Hop Generation" - those born after 1965. Actually, the more opportunistic elements of the broadly defined Sixties "movement" bailed contemporaries. They packed their briefcases and strode briskly into the new age that had been made possible by the sacrifice of their generational peers, the thousands who joined the common jihad against legal American apartheid. As we wrote in the June 10 edition of :

Having won as many "rights" as they actually wanted, but uninterested in fundamentally altering power relationships in America, those African Americans who perceived Jim Crow as the only problem disbanded the "movement," leaving poorer Blacks to their own devices. The pursuit of individual wealth is not a mass activity, although the aggrandizers never hesitate to invoke the plight of the Black masses when it is to their advantage.

In truth, much of the Black "leadership class" had not changed in the 100 years since slavery, holding fast to a self-serving "trickle-down" theory of racial advancement - and believing in their version of "trickle-down" as fervently as any ideologically committed Republican businessman. For far too many of these ambitious men and women many of them quite young in the Sixties and early Seventies - the "movement's" very purpose was to advance those segments of the Black mooted population that were deemed "ready"

to enter and compete in white society as it existed. The "unfinished business" of the struggle was to further advance that class's interests, so that it might speak more effectively on behalf of - and provide role models to inspire - the rest of Black America. "Help us become rich and influential; it's good for the whole community," said the post-1968 Black leadership class, demanding support from the ghetto while simultaneously claiming personal credit for every achievement.

Conned from the inside

Much of the leadership class urged Blacks to rely on elections as the only post-Civil Rights form of mass activity. African Americans were instructed to fight for candidates on a seasonal basis, but not for themselves, or in any other forum. In effect, they were told to stand down until called upon at election time. Thus, the "movement" was disbanded, except for those activities that directly benefited the "leaders." Mass Black politics, which according to Julian Bond spawned 10,000 demonstrations in the year 1963, was henceforth to be confined to the polls. The decisive political domain would be limited to elected officials, the broker-politics of established churches, lobbying (a form of brokering), and the expansion and legal defense of past civil rights victories. This kind of politics works fine for the well-connected, who have plenty of private social, economic and political levers to pull every day of the year, but "trickle-down" Black politics led to disaster for the masses of Black people, now captives of a class that had only its own interests in mind.

Black youth were especially toarginalized by the leadership class's insistence on narrow electoral and brokered politics. Mass movements cannot exist without the energy, creativity and risk-taking of youth but the post-Civil Rights leadership class did not want a mass movement, nor was it interested in risking its newfound mobility. Put simply, with the exception of young people who might be groomed to the upwardly mobile, professional ranks, the leadership class had nothing that it wanted Black youth to do - other than stay out of jail and avoid embarrassing "The Race." • If you are not already registered to vote, you can register by mail using a mail-in voter registration form. You may get one from your County Board of Elections office, a public library, or on-line at www.sboe.state.nc.us.

• On the voter-registration form, it asks "where you now live." If you will be incarcerated on election day, use the prison address. Otherwise, list the address where you will be living after completing your sentence.

• Mail the completed form to me County Board of Elections in die county "where you live," along with copy of a valid N.C. Drivers License, if you have one, or the last four digits of your Social Security

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As of yesterday, the war in Iraq cost Americans \$119.4 billion. That's a lot of money for anyone's pockets, much less all of America. But how are those dollars are affecting the black pocketbook? As of the 2000 U.S. Census, there

were 11,845,257 blacks under age 18 living in America. "The average cost per child per year for childcare - including the 70 percent in after school care and the 30 percent full day care - is \$6,042," Paul Smith, a researcher for the Children's Defense Fund, told Black.AmericaWeb.com. For one-year-olds, that cost increases to \$13,000. For \$119 billion, the U.S. could send

19,695,465 children older than one to day care, and 9,153,846 children less than one to day care.

In addition, according to Smith, the average health care insurance per child per year costs \$1,420. By comparison, the price of the war in Iraq could have paid 83,802,816 children. And at an average cost of \$654 per child per year, the war could have paid for 181,957,186 children to be immunized.

Smith also said that at a unit cost of 17,161,811 children ages 3 and 4 to Head Start. Of the children serviced by this organization, 31.5 percent are black. That's 6,006,633 black children — every vears - attending Head Start.

With an average new teacher salary of \$30,719, \$119.4 billion could supply the U.S. with 3,886,845 additional teachers or double the salaries of the existing teacher population. "And \$119 billion is what has been

spent to date," Smith said. "But the war goes on, and Congress has already appropriated this year's dollars. The total up through September 30th of this year is 149 billion."

In addition, the war spent to date in Iraq could provide inroads to students of color into Corporate America, according to Reginald Duhe, Managing Director of INROADS, Inc. in Northern California. an organization that serves black, Native American and Hispanic students.

Duhe estimates the total cost to provide students with internships and provide them with training and development.

"It's probably safe to say [the cost] health insurance costs for is \$5,000 per student," Duhe said. "We have about 200 students here, but a safe guess is that our national organization sees about 5,000 students [per year].

- It could pay tuition and fees for 2,653,333 people - nearly every black child in high school in America - to attend Howard University for four years, based on the current cost of \$10,935 per vear times four.

- Or purchase 1,672,522,839 shares of Nike stock at \$71.15 per share .--- Or put 3,131,743 people in the driver's sear of a 2002 model Cadillac Escalade from Carmax that's one for every 12 black Americans.

- Or buy 17,024,320,457 boxes of Just for Men Natural Black Hair tonic at 6.99 per box.

- Or purchase a \$2,749 owner's suite on Royal Caribbean's Explorer of the Seas for a seven-night western Caribbean cruise from Miami, Fla., for 43,433,975 people, or every black person in America and then some

- Or purchase 58,048,780,487 allons of gas, at a national average of S2.05 a gallon, according to the report by the U.S. Energy Information Administration.

"I think people are looking at this positions in his presidential campaign campaign as a product, but it is a project - a work in progress," Cummings said. "One of the worst things we can do is to continue sniping at him (Kerry) when he is trying to do some good."

He's right. Left to fester, this gnawing problem will undermine Kerry's election bid in what appears to be a too-close-to-call contest. But fester it does, despite the hand wringing efforts of Kerry's backers to put this matter to rest.

"I know that our campaign has been diverse from the very start," said Marcus Jadotte, the black deputy campaign manager. "Twenty percent of our staff is black and Hispanic. ... We want people to judge us on the facts, not what some people are

saying." It's time for Kerry to speak up. It's time for him to seek a high-profile, public forum to quiet the bad talk about his campaign's lack of diversity. He should go on BET or TV One the nation's two leading black cable television networks --- to talk about his vision for America.

Kerry should make the rounds of black talk radio, seek a meeting with black newspaper publishers and meet with a broad cross section of black leaders and activists to personally address the concerns that have been raised about his campaign. He can't leave this heavy lifting to the members of his team, who have, thus far, failed to put out this fire. This isn't the work of surrogates. Time to get serious

Nine out of 10 voted for Democrat Al Gore in 2000. If Kerry is serious about giving blacks a place at the table where his most important campaign decisions are made, he should they so in a way that leaves no room for dispute.

Twenty years ago, Democrat Walter Mondale was slow to answer a similar rash of complaints about his White House campaign.

Back then, some black leaders complained that Mondale's campaign had no strategy for addressing the interests of blacks, a failing that caused Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young to grouse to a gathering of black journalists that Mondale's organization was being run by a group of "smart-ass white boys who think they know it all."

That swipe got a lot of media attention and belatedly threw Mondale's campaign into campaign into damage-control mode. Kerry shouldn't

let it come to that. While only 5% of blacks identified themselves as Republicans in 1984, nearly twice that number voted for Ronald Reagan in his landslide victory over Mondale.

"We've been assured that a plan is being worked out as to how the Kerry campaign will reach out to the African-American community to rally the Democratic Party's base," Cummings said.

Before that plan is unveiled.

Kerry has a lot of work to do to answer his critics among black Democrats. The sooner he does this, the less likely it is that his campaign will be derailed from within.
