

If you have never had the pleasure of listening to Supt. Austin Parker teach on Sunday mornings,





1856 -Booker Taliaferro Washington born. Born in Franklin County, Virginia, on April 5, Washington was the first principal of Tuskegee Institute (1881), and was the individual most responsible for its early development. Washington was considered the leading African-American spokesman of his day.

1862 - Slavery abolished in the District of Columbia. Congress abolished slavery in the District of Columbia — an important step on the road for freedom for all African-Americans.

1863 - The Emancipation Proclamation. Lincoln's Emancipation Proclamation took effect January 1, legally freeing slaves in areas of the South in rebellion.



kids, all college graduates. Her youngest son, Emmanuel, 26, graduated from University of North Carolina at Charlotte and is an architectural engineer in Charlotte. Her daughter, Marquan, 27, lives in Cary and is an administrator for Walgreen's. Her oldest son, Marvin, 28, earned a double major at ECU and lived in Atlanta before returning to Greenville. He is now on the Little Willie Center Board.

"Since he came back, it has turned this program, because everybody brings something unique," she said, trumpeting Marvin's administrative abilities and social skills. "My children are products of this

program." And as for the center's namesake, Jamal "Little Willie" Nobles? Arrington doesn't know, she lost contact with the boy! Facing giants Arrington has confronted giants throughout her life, and only the grace of God brought her out stronger,

she said.

Her heart for abused and neglected children has roots in a childhood in which she was adopted and endured more than she thought she could handle. Survival, even now when there are those who want to tear her down. relies on a foundation of faith. "You know it's God," she said. "He works through us. I couldn't take the mental abuse, I couldn't take the negative things spoken of my life. ... People don't know all my history. I had to take abuse, I had to take torment. I had to take being rejected, misunderstood, ostracized and criticized. ... You don't take stuff like that. God has to be doing it."

There's many times she's "wanted to throw in the towel" at the Little Willie Center, she said.

"Every time I got ready to quit, something inside of me, and I know it was God, said, 'Greater now is He that is in you than is he that is in the world.' ... It's his work," Arrington said. "That's what keeps me focused. They're fighting against God, and they're not going to win." In 1998, her world was rocked when her husband walked out on the family. She "cried like a baby" but leaned on God for strength. She said the words she received through prayer comforted her.
"Not one (word) that God spoke to my spirit fell to the ground, not one word," she said. "And he has treated me like a woman of God, and he helped me when I felt like I couldn't do it." Arrington's greatest relief is

her children not only survived but prospered.

"They didn't become a statistic when my husband decided that was it," she said. "... It wasn't easy. I could have lost them to the world, but I told them God didn't walk out on you. We have had to caress each other. They've kept me from falling so to speak.

"I wouldn't wish that on anyone. That is the most devastating thing that ever in my life I have had to live with."

Another personal battle came in 2000 with the news she had cancer. She stayed away from the center through treatments but vowed to beat the disease. "I said Lord, 'You didn't make this body for cancer.' I know I may go out with something else, but I don't believe he made it for cancer," she said. "I rebuked that, and I didn't accept it."

She now has a clean bill of health after a recurrence in 2002, except for high blood pressure. Her doctor told her to slow down, but there's more she wants to do.

"I know there is a time set for me," she said. "So I've been running ever since. I've got to get it done. I have an urgency. This is kingdom work. I'm not looking at what I'm doing now and what I'm going through. I'm looking at the finished product. There is a light at the end of this. And I believe with all my heart that people that are living in this city have been born to do this work. ... And whether we step up to God and do it, that's a different story."

Arrington's work has been recognized with numerous awards, including the Points of Light Foundation Volunteer Award, But there's only one reward she cherishes.

"When a child comes through that door and says, 'I love you Miss Arrington' and just smiles," she said. "That's the greatest gift."

If you do not, then maybe you should repent. Husbands, you should not act like the devil if the wives are to submit themselves to you as unto the Lord. DUMP THE VICTIM MENTALITY

Only the actions of black people really concern me and that is a full agenda.. In my opinion, anyone who begins embracing issues that affect black folks by first considering potential white reactions or objections is simply looking for controversy and has no genuine intent of realizing goals that would benefit a single soul.

To be specific, I'm referring to illiteracy, weak voting strength, black on black crime, soaring school drop out rates, teen pregnancy, dysfunctional families and poor college entrance percentages. Each of these complex issues are worthy of constant work and attention and don't require the

approval of white folks in order to be acted upon. Therefore, I would encourage leaders of black organizations or even individuals to develop projects that address these problems. I also encourage black people in general to ignore any so-called leader who can only offer lip service toward these, our real needs,

In spite of tremendous injustices that we have endured, we built this nation and we can always be proud of that. However, no one can feel like a victim and feel victorious at the same time. The victim mentality is a form of modern day slavery that need not be perpetuated any longer by focusing on what we need white folks to do on our behalf or for us. Beware of anyone who is always focused on white folks. We are black people and we need to focus on us rather than being concerned about what white folks think about us. After all, we really don't know what all white folks are thinking and I don't care.

Organ donation saves lives."

Rosa's Story

As a science teacher, Rosa knew the advantages of organ donation, but personally never gave donation much thought until she was told she needed a kidney transplant to live. Dialysis three hours a day for three years kept her alive... It was a difficult time. Eventually, Rosa did receive a transplant. Forever grateful for this generous gift of life, Rosa is now able to continue building memories with her husband and family... they have even made organ donation a permanent agenda item at the annual family reunion.



The First Black Women To Start A Four Year College

Bethune, Mary McLeod (buthyOOn') 1875-1955, American educator, b. Mayesville, S.C., grad. Moody Bible Institute, Chicago, 1895. The 17th child of former slaves, she taught (1895–1903) in a series of southern mission schools before settling in Florida to found (1904) the Daytona Normal and Industrial Institute for Negro Girls. From 1904 to 1942 and again from 1946 to 1947, she served as president of the institute, which, after merging with Cookman Institute (1923), became Bethune-Cookman College. A leader in the American black community, she founded the National Council of Negro Women (1935) and was director (1936-44) of Negro Affairs of the National Youth Administration. In addition, she served as special adviser on minority affairs to President Franklin Delano Roosevelt. At the 1945 conference that organized the United Nations, she was a consultant on interracial understanding.

Kemba Smith, a Virginia college student with no criminal record, was sentenced to 24 years in prison in 1994 for conspiracy to distribute cocaine, lying to federal authorities and conspiracy to launder money. Her boyfriend ran a large cocaine ring and when he was briefly jailed, she took money from one of his drug associates to a lawyer. Later she lied about his whereabouts. Ultimately, she spent a year on the run with him and became pregnant. She eventually turned herself in and revealed the boyfriend's location, but by then, he was dead. Smith, featured in the Court TV documentary Prisoners of Love, had her sentence commuted by President Clinton in 2000. She is raising her son, attending college and working in a law

because the Judiciary Committee is still in its organizational stages. The subcommittee that will handle the issue will likely be chaired by Rep. Robert Scott (D-Va.), the spokesman said. Scott, like Conyers, is strong opponent of the mandatory minimums in regards to drug offenses and has stated in the past that he wants to see changes. A spokesman for Scott told the AFRO that no decision will be made on scheduling a hearing in the subcommittee until the congressman is officially appointed as chairman. The US Sentencing Commission held hearings on the issue on Nov. 14. 2006. Nkechi Taifa, a senior policy analyst for the Open Policy Center, an organization that engages in

policy advocacy on US and international issues, including foreign operations, criminal justice reform, and human and civil rights, said that the guidelines were openly hostile to Blacks.

"In 2002, 81% of those convicted of crack cocaine were African American," Taifa said. "Although there are larger number of documented White crack cocaine users, federal law enforcement and prosecutorial practices have resulted in the 'war on drugs' being targeted at inner-city communities." Hilary Shelton, Washington bureau chief of the NAACP, said that the mandatory minimums have become a source of contention in the Black community. "I should also state that, for the record, the NAACP is opposed to all mandatory minimum

sentences," he said. "The bottom line is this: Until the racial inequities in our nation's war on drugs and other crime initiatives' are addressed, communities of color across the nation will continue to distrust the American criminal justice system. The federal government's crack cocaine policy is one glaring example of how the American government has failed its entire population." Mauer said that The US Sentencing Commission is expected recommend to Congress that changes be made in regards to the mandatory minimums some time this year. He said that a Democratic Congress would be more receptive to change even though the Bush administration would likely want to keep them the way

The History {1760}

Pitt County got its name from William Pitt, Earl of Chatham. William Pitt was an English statesman and orator, born in London, England, UK. He studied at Oxford University and in 1731, Pitt joined the army. Pitt led the young "Patriot" Whigs and in 1756 became secretary of state, where he was a pro-freedom speaker in British Colonial government. Pitt County was founded in 1760 under British Colonial government. Prior to 1760, there was one large county, Beaufort, which was split into five smaller counties, Pitt County being one of those smaller counties. Since 1970 Pitt County has operated under County Manager government.

The Government {Pitt County}

Pitt County was established in 1760 as an arm of state government. All North Carolina counties continue to perform this role and



consequently have considerable state responsibilities and mandates to operate and fund departments and agencies such as the Health Department, the Department of Social Services, the Sheriff's Office, the Register of Deeds, and the Board of Elections, to name a

few. Since the late 1960's and early 1970's, the North Carolina General Assembly has modified North Carolina law so that counties now have almost identical powers as municipalities to offer services to citizens in addition to their traditional state service functions.

Nine commissioners are elected from six districts on a partisan basis for staggered, four-year terms. The County Manager is appointed by the Board. The Commissioners' meetings are held on first and third Monday of each in second floor auditorium of the Pitt County Office Building, 1717 West Fifth Street. Pitt County Commissioner meetings are televised on Suddenlink Communications and Time-Warner Cable systems. The public and media are encouraged to attend.

Pitt-TV has been on the air since 1999. We cablecast Board of Commissioners (BOC), Department of Social Services (DSS), Planning Board and Board of Health (BOH) meetings live and then replay them for the public's viewing pleasure.
