What is Happening Over the State.

Hardy T. Gregory, of North Carolina, has been appointed a post-office inspector.

Mr. W. C. Thorne, Solicitor of Halifax county Inferior Court, died Saturday night.

A bill to tax bachelors and establish an "old maids' home" when the tax fund shall have reached \$50,000 was introduced in the Illinois House of Representatives by Representative Walleck. The bill defines bachelors as single men of 32 years or over who have never been married, and exempts men who have reached 65, or who can prove to a board of unmarried women over 60 years of age that they have proposed marriage at least three times to marriageable females and been refused each time.


