Denounced Russell.

A meeting of colored Republicans was held, on last Friday, at Wilmington where Judge Russell lives, and they adopted the following:

Resolved, That we, the Republicans of the county of New Hanover, in mass meeting, assembled, do hereby denounce and execrate the gubernatorial candidacy of the Hon. D. L. Russell for the followin reasons:

- 1. A little anterior to 1888 he declared that all negroes are natural born thieves, and that they steal six days in a week and go to church Sunday and pray it off.
- 2. In 1888 he bolted the State ticket and said that the negroes were "savages."
- 3. In 1888 he wrote letters to the Republicans of the North, suggesting that a movement be be made to disfranchise the entire negro race in this country.
- 4. In 1892 he issued an address to the Republicans of the State to withdraw the Republican tickei, becasue President Harrison had put two negroes into office which address may have caused Harrison's defeat in this State.
- 5. In 1894 he wrote another let ter against negro citizenship, and about the same time he said, in effect, that he could carry North Carolina without a single negro

9. On account of his being of a vindictive nature, it is extremely dangerous to submit the affairs of the State into his hands, which act might be the cause of a comparative innocent man dying an untimely death.
