The names of Dr. C. O. H. Laughinghouse and Dr. B. T. Cox were presented. Dr. Laughinghouse received the nomination on first ballot, the vote being 53 to 32.

FOR SURVEYOR.

The names of J. D. Cox and J. B. Kilpatrick were presented, and Cox receiving 70 votes on first ballot was declared the nominee.

A number of the congregation denounced Dixon for the attack and many left the service in disgust.

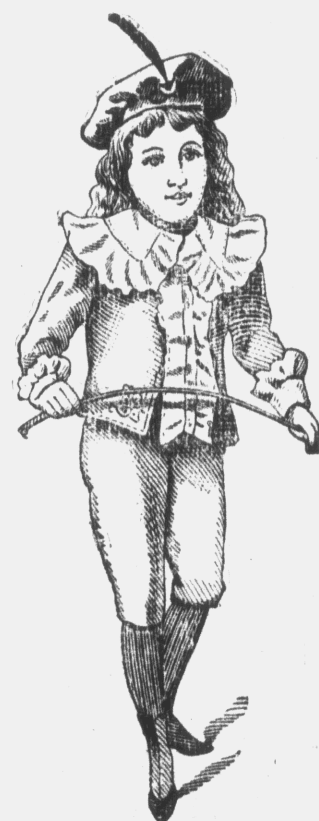

PROFITABLE PUBLICITY.

What Advertising Will Not Do.

Advertising will not sell goods.
Advertising will not make business.

Advertising will not consummate sale.

Advertising simply makes it easier for business to be done, and easier for the salesman to sell.

The unsuccessful advertiser complains because his advertising did not bring direct return.

Assuming that the advertising was well constructed, it was not the advertising fault.

In the combination of good advertising, good goods, good salesmen, good location, and good management, is profitable business.

Leave out management and the other four conditions are worthless.

Leave out salesmen, and what you have left cannot make profit.

Leave out goods, and you sell nothing because you have nothing to sell.

Leave out good location, and it will be hard to do good business.

Leave out advertising, and good as the other conditions of your business may be, there cannot be flush return.

In the harmony of the parts is the strength of the whole.

Advertising is simply the yeast in the bread of business.

It will raise nothing if there is nothing for it to raise.

Place upon advertising the responsibility of advertising, and no more.

A dark gloomy store and bright advertising are as unprofitable as a cheerful store and dull advertising.

The most cordial advertising and the most indifferent clerks, allow the good of the one to be spoiled by the faults of the other.

Give your advertising a chance to pay, and it will pay.

A theatre-hat law has just gone into effect in Louisiana, and during the present season ladies who present themselves at the door wearing a hat which is likely to obscure the view of those directly behind them will be required to remove it and place it in charge of a person who will be assigned to take care of such property and who will give them a check for it.

Denounced Russell.

A meeting of colored Republicans was held, on last Friday, at Wilmington where Judge Russell lives, and they adopted the following:

Resolved, That we, the Republicans of the county of New Hanover, in mass meeting, assembled, do hereby denounce and execrate the gubernatorial candidacy of the Hon. D. L. Russell for the following reasons:

1. A little anterior to 1888 he declared that all negroes are natural born thieves, and that they steal six days in a week and go to church Sunday and pray it off.

2. In 1888 he bolted the State ticket and said that the negroes were "savages."

3. In 1888 he wrote letters to the Republicans of the North, suggesting that a movement be made to disfranchise the entire negro race in this country.

4. In 1892 he issued an address to the Republicans of the State to withdraw the Republican ticket, because President Harrison had put two negroes into office; which address may have caused Harrison's defeat in this State.

5. In 1894 he wrote another letter against negro citizenship, and about the same time he said, in effect, that he could carry North Carolina without a single negro vote.

9. On account of his being of a vindictive nature, it is extremely dangerous to submit the affairs of the State into his hands, which act might be the cause of a comparative innocent man dying an untimely death.

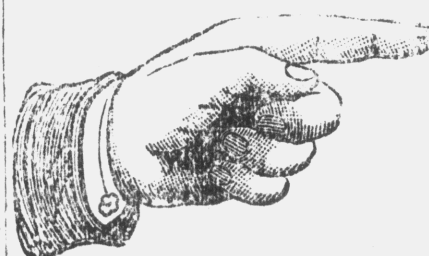
