## THEY HAVE FUSED.

### STRAIGHT ENDORSEMENT OF GOLD BUGS.

Above will be found the fusion ticket as it was arranged this week by the Populist and Republican Executive Committees. How long it will remain this way no human being can tell. Certainly no longer than the bosses wish. We venture the assertion that not a Republican or Populist in the State knows now what ticket he will be called upon to vote. The People in these parties are purely at the mercy of the bosses. If this is not a spectacle for people in a country where they nominate their own officers in conventions to be in then we are mistaken.

Let us analyze this ticket a little: First we have two candidates respectively for the offices of Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, and Auditor. This is simply a sham. Nobody believes that there will be more than one candidate for each of these offices on the day of election. It is only kept as it now stands to deceive the people. The Republicans were afraid to take Russell off for fear their followers would not support Guthrie. The Populists knew that the rank and file of their party would never vote for Russell so they dared not take Guthrie down. The programme evidently is to run both men until the time is near that there will be no time for kicking, and then send out tickets with only one name on for each office! So with all the other offices for which there are two candidates. Will the people be fooled this way? It remains to be seen, with the prospects in favor that it will be done. Now as to the ticket where both parties have the same candidate. Worth for Treasurer, Thompson for Secretary of State, Mebane for Superintendent of Public Instruction, and Montgomery for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court; all are advocating free silver and Bryan for President. Walser for At-

torney General, Douglass for Associate Justice, and four of the Congressmen, including White, (col.) are open and avowed Gold bugs and favor McKinley for President. This is the ticket as it is now fixed for you to vote.

As to whether the Populists should vote it we will not give you Democratic authority but will give you what your organ, The Caucasian, has had to say along this line. These are extracts from that paper with dates affixed, you can examine the copies and see if they are not correctly quoted:

"Some months ago the Republican party made a proposition to divide equally the electoral ticket in the State with the Populists. The Populists thought it prudent to decline this proposition because it might possibly lead them to the support of goldbugs, and this the Populists are pledged not to do. A pledge is a sacred thing and NOTHING but the PRESERVATION OF LIFE OR EXISTENCE can be plead as an excuse for breaking it."—Caucasian, Sept. 3.

"Again, what a spectacle it would be for us to have a State ticket with one-half the candidates supporting and advocating on the stump the election of a gold bug for President, and the other half of the candidates on the same ticket fighting goldbugs and supporting just the opposite kind of a candidate. There is no use in discussing such a proposition; it fails of its own weight; it condemns itself; it is absurd."—Caucasian, Feb. 20.

"The Caucasian is in favor of co-operating for principle. But how can we co-operate with those who are going in an opposite direction? We are striving to bring about relief to the industrial classes and the business of the country. We must fight those who are herding in the camp of the gold-bugs and the monopolists. We have no patience with those who favor joining together opposite and opposing forces by a division of tickets for official positions. We are opposed to co-operating with those who have no principles but who simply want our votes to help them to the pie counter. It we will stand by principle we will find that there are fifty thousand men in the old parties who are as patriotic as we are."—Caucasian, March 26.

"A man who supports a gold bug for President is a party bug, and an enemy to the people and good government. The People's party was organized to fight this kind of men."—Caucasian, April 6.

"We don't believe in the honesty of any man who says he is a Populist and then says he is willing to vote for a gold bug. He may be honest but we don't want to be mixed up with any such honesty as that. A man may be a good fellow in his WAY, but it might be a very proper thing to damn his way."—Caucasian, April 2.

"The majority of the voters of the State endorse the resolutions passed by the Silver convention, held in Raleigh on the 25th of last September. If the People's party shall co-operate with any other party in the coming campaign, it will be on the basis of those resolutions. The People's party cannot co-operate with any party unless such party is willing to co-operate on principles and to advance a great cause."—Caucasian, January 20.

"We do not want to co-operate with gold bugs, but we want to co-operate against gold bugs. If we cannot co-operate with the Republicans on that line, certainly it is impossible to co-operate with them without giving up every plank and letter of the platform."—Caucasian, March 12.

"How was this proposition (to fuse on the silver question) met by the Republicans. By a fatuous, selfish, cold-blooded and almost brutal proposition to overwhelm a political enemy by numerical strength, and coolly divide the plunder among a few men. There was not the shadow of a suggestion as to an issue on which both parties could favorably unite. There is no evidence that a moment's thought was given to the interests of the people on whose votes the capture and distribution of spoils depends. A flat interpretation of their proposition can be nothing less than this: 'We, the officeholders and leaders, are in this thing for the stuff, and

## Remarkable Marriage Experience of Young Mrs. Vaughan.

Thrice married and twice within a six months is the unusual experience of Mrs. W. S. Vaughan, of Rocky Mount, N. C., and also of Washington. Mrs. Vaughan is young, pretty and wealthy. On St. Valentine's Day she was Mrs. Maggie C. Davenport, a young widow with much property near Rocky Mount. She had married when a girl. Her husband died within two years and she gave up house-keeping.

On March 26 she was married to James H. Portis, of Winston, N. C. He was a very sick man, but he loved her devotedly and it was his dying wish that they should be wedded. To please him and sooth the last hours of one for whom she was bound to have a deep affection she consented to the ceremony. Within a week, Mr. Portis, who had consumption and could not speak above a whisper at the ceremony, was dead.

He had been an early sweetheart. They both married others and their companions died. They met again a year ago and the old attachment sprung up. When he begged for a deathbed marriage she could not refuse. He had two children for whom he asked a mother's care.

After his death she met Mr. Vaughan, a successful traveling agent for a Baltimore house, whom she had known for many years. They saw each other often and Mr. Vaughan made it convenient to come again and again to her side.

It was not long till they made up their minds that life for them could only be happy when they were united in the closest relation of human existence. When this conclusion was reached it was not hard for them to find that no just objection could be made to their early union.

Mr. Portis left no very near relatives who could take offense at their wedding. Mrs. Vaughan is well enough off to disregard conventionalities. She came to her aunt, Mrs. B. A. Johnson, No. 208 Maryland avenue northeast. There for three weeks past she has been very happy preparing for her third wedding, a match of her own choosing, and in which her heart went out to the man she was to wed.

Mr. Vaughan came on Monday and spent the day with his affianced. At the same time he secured the license for their wedding. He gave his own age as twenty-eight, and that of his bride to be twenty-six. His residence was Baltimore, hers Rocky Mount, N. C.; he had never been married before; she was a widow.

Yesterday Mr. Vaughan, accompanied by Mrs. Portis and her aunt, Mrs. Johnson, drove to the residence of Rev. B. F. Bittinger, at No. 638 F street southwest. They presented their license, and Mr. Bittinger, finding it in perfect form, performed the ceremony. The couple then took the afternoon train for Baltimore. They will spend a week or two in travel before settling down in their home in Rocky Mount.—Washington Times.

we have no further interest in the people than to use them to that end.

From every consideration of common decency and equitable reciprocity, the first thought of a man or party that is honored with the confidence and votes of the people should be the interests of the people. They can only be the beneficiaries of the policy for which they vote (if the policy be an beneficial) and the men whom they elevate to positions of emolument and trust are put there for the purpose of securing, or trying to secure, the operation of that policy.

But in the proposition made by the Republicans no such obligation is recognized. "We want the honors and the offices" is the plain inference. "What we do after we get them is none of your business," is the hidden dictum of the people whose votes are sought. It may be that there are some people who can endorse such a course of procedure as this. If there are they are more of a menace to Republican institutions than a wild Anarchist, for the wild Anarchist is watched, while the endorser of the above course is confided a power which he can exercise to bring this country under the rule of autocracy and into a condition of abject servitude.

If the proposition of the Republican party (to fuse on division of offices) expresses the attitude of the Republican party, then that party is nothing less than an organization for official brigandage and spoliation. A division among the "leaders," of what can be exacted from the people constitutes the limits of its intentions and purposes, and the sooner the people can arouse themselves to absolutely and everlastingly repudiate such an organization, the better it will be for their individual welfare and for the future of the land in which they live."—Caucasian, April 23rd.

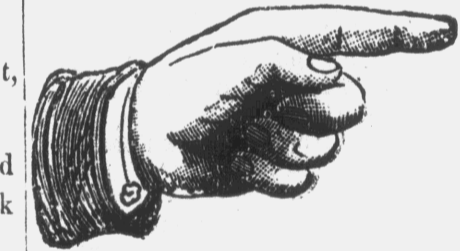
