Last Year and This

A few days ago a practical farmer, and a good judge of tobacco was out at the Warehouses walking around looking at prices. The sales were over and he had examined several piles he walked into the office and said to one of the warehouseman, "well, I have a good lot of tobacco all graded out which I should like to sell, but really tobacco is so low that I hate to put mine on the market now.

The warehouseman asked him to go with him back on the floor and without looking at the price at which the tobacco sold that day asked him to price it according to the way it sold last year. The first pile the farmer examined pretty closely and finally said, "well, last year that tobacco would have sold for 15 cents." The warehouseman showed him the tag and it was marked 18 cents: "Oh," said the farmer "you just picked out that pile because it sold floor," and in the presence of a number The admission is only 25 eents for of farmers they went to several pites and there was not a single pile that did not sell for more money that day than it

was priced by last years prices. The trouble this year with tobacco is this, it is by far the most inferior crop that we have ever had and farmers are not governed so much by the quality of the tobacco as they are by the pices they got last year for tobacco that was at least on an average 25 per cent better than this crop, hence a great deal of the talk of low prices.



Everything for Bryan.

The Press Bureau at the National Democratic headquarters has issued the following statement:

Based upon the present outlook the following estimate of Bryan's majorities in November 18 made:

Alabama, 60,000; Arkansas, 75, 000; California, 50,000; Colarado, 10,000; Delaware, 10,000; Florida, 15,000; Georgia, 75,000; Idaho, 10, 000; Illinois, 45,000; Indiana, 50, 000; Iowa, 30,000; Kansas, 40,000; Kentucky, 35,000; Louisiana, 40 .-000; Maryland, 15,000; Michigan, 30,000; Minnesota, 35,000 Mississippi, 50,000; Montana, 15,000; Nebraska, 30,000; Nevada, 4,000; North Carolina, 20,000; Ohio, 25,000; Oregon, 10,000; South Carolina, 60,000; South Dakota, 10,-000; Tennesee, 40,000; Texas, 175 000; Utah, 10,000; Virginia, 25,000; Washington, 15,000; West Virginia, 10,000; Wisconsin, 30,-000, Wyoming, 5.000.

These estimates give Bryan twenty-six out of torty-five States with 324 electoral votes.


Wrangel was highly gratified with the civility of the lad, and said to the crown prince:


