An Election Table Which Appears to Be Pretty Fair.

No body seriously expects Bryan to carry any of the New England States, or New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey or Ohio. We may therefore at once concede to McKinley the votes of these States as follows:

Nobody seriously expects McKinley to carry any of the Southern States, with the possible exception of West Virginia, Maryland, Kentucky, and North Carolina. We may therefore concede them to Bryan as follows:

—making for Bryan a grand total of 148.

We thus dispose of 288 out of the 447 votes which now constitute the electoral college. To carry the day a candidate must have 225 votes, and thus McKinley has yet to gain 84 and Bryan yet to gain 76 votes out of the States which are in doubt, and chiefly so because of the uncertainty as to the consummation therein of a genuine fusion between the Democrats and the Populists. Should that fusion be effected Mr. Bryan will be very likely to carry:

Of course there may be differences as to the doubtfulness of the States we have put in the column of the battle-ground. They are confidently claimed by both sides, and it follows that we must displease both by this estimate.

The fact remains, however, that most, if not all of them, are doubtful—quite enough so to furnish Mr. Bryan with the nineteen votes he needs, supposing our figures given above to be correct.—Washington Post, Independent.

Election Rules in Billville.
