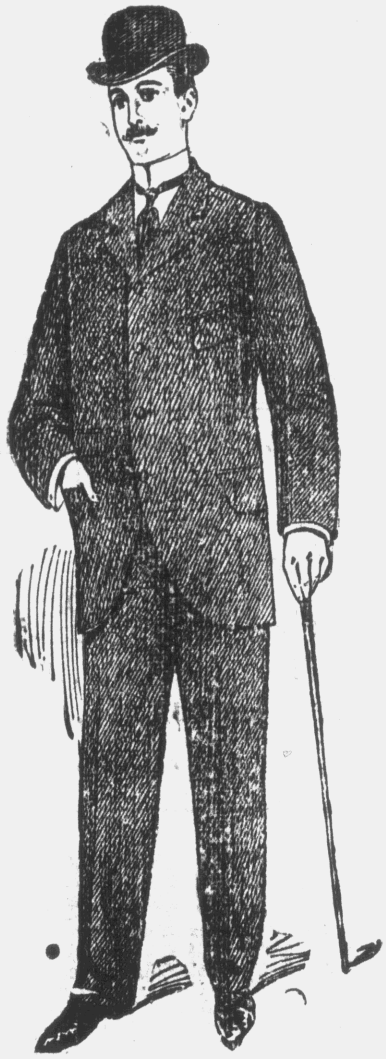

### EDITORIAL NOTES.

Seven more working days before the election. And we admonish Democrats to let these be days full of work.

Let no Democrat stay away from the polls on election day, thinking there will be enough votes without his to elect the ticket. Every man turn out and do his full duty. Too much is at stake for any Democrat to fail to vote.

When white men go to vote let them remember there are four straight gold bugs on the county fusion ticket, and there are others who make any kind of promises to get votes. You can't trust such men.

You men who were once Democrats, remember there are some moss-back Republicans on the fusion ticket. Are you going to be fooled into voting for such men under the belief that they are favorable to silver?

H. P. Cheatham, a colored ex-Congressman, made a speech here this afternoon and tickled the colored folks greatly. From his reputation we had thought he was a man of some intelligence, but his explanation of questions before the people, if he spoke what he believes, shows him to be about as ignorant on the issues of the day as any man who could be found. For instance he said this government had fixed the value of gold and silver at 32 to 1, it had stood so for 300 years, and that this 16 to 1 the Democratic party is agitating means that they want to cut silver down one half and make a silver dollar worth only 50 cents. Even some white Republicans present turned their heads and smiled when he said this. His explanation of the tariff and other issues was equally nonsensical.

### A WORD TO POPULISTS.

There are some phases of the political situation now which we believe the Populists do not fully comprehend. The REFLECTOR proposes to point them out. They ought to be considered by the men who will deposit their ballots on the 3rd of November. If they are not, then certainly these men who vote blindly will have no further right to complain of hard times.

First, have you noticed that the Republicans have apparently conceded most of the offices on the State fusion ticket to the Populists? This they had to do to get fusion. There were a certain number of men who had to be looked out for. But have you noticed what a shrewd game they have played upon you in giving you the offices which they did and reserving the ones they did for themselves? They take the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General and the one Supreme Court Judge.

Look for a moment. Suppose this ticket succeeds. Do you realize that you have turned over two branches of the government in North Carolina to the Republican party? They will have the Executive and Judicial. Think of three Republican Supreme Court Judges, and the Attorney General of the State also Republican. Now what have you got? Four State offices. Pray tell us what are the duties of these four officers? They are purely confined to office work and can't benefit you one particle. They might be filled by any party and you would never know it.

But you say there is one other branch of the government which we have not turned over to them which is very important to the people and that is the Legislature. You haven't, you say? Let us see. If the legislative tickets in

North Carolina where there is fusion should all be elected just as they are nominated the Republicans would have a decided majority over the Populists. Now this being true, and a Republican Governor, a Republican speaker of the Senate, don't you see that you have turned over every branch of the State government in North Carolina? Now you did not start out to do this but you see you are doing it. Many of you doubtless think now that you are going to yet control some branch of the State government, but this is not true.

Mr. W. J. Peck, a Populist lawyer in Raleigh, and a man who has written and aided the Populists a great deal and who is still a Populist, closes a two column article in the Progressive Farmer as follows:

"The outlook now is for four Republican members of the National House of Representatives, one Republican Senator, a Republican Governor and another Republican member of the Supreme Court. This gives the Republicans control of two out of three branches of our State government with a strong chance of controlling the legislature also. This is more than we bargained for when we first begun cooperation, and it comes so soon, too. Where will it end?"

The question now arises will you be parties to a scheme which gives the same Republican party of 1868 control of North Carolina again? If you do then stay at home and don't have any more to say about reforms.

There is one way and only one by which you can avoid this catastrophe. It is to scratch every Republican on your fusion tickets, and since you can not elect Guthrie Governor, vote for Cy Watson. If you don't scratch Douglas and Walser you give the Republicans the Judicial department of our government. If you don't scratch the Republican candidates for the Legislature you give them the legislative branch, and so far as you are concerned the only way you can aid in preventing their getting the executive is to vote for Cy Watson. Now when they have got you so that they know you can't get your Governor they are rallying every negro in the State for Russell and McKinley and thereby even preventing your voting some of them for Bryan. We do not believe you are willing to turn over all the interests of this State into their hands just to benefit four men of your party. Think about these things and you will be convinced that they are true, and then let your votes go towards preventing such a calamity.
