Byron, in the third canto of  
"Childe Harold," describes a thun-  
derstorm in Switzerland which oc-  
curred at midnight on June 13, 1816.  
He notices the awful stillness which  
precedes it:

From peak to peak, the rattling crags among,

quote, and, indeed, too well known,  
but Sir Walter Scott's criticism on it  
may not be so well known. He says:  
"This is one of the most beautiful  
passages of the poem. The 'fierce  
and far delight' of a thunderstorm  
is here described in verse almost as  
vivid as its lightnings. The live  
thunder 'leaping among the rattling  
crags,' the voice of mountains, as if  
shouting to each other, the plashing  
of the big rain, the gleaming of the  
wide lake, lighted like a phosphoric  
sea, present a picture of sublime  
terror, yet of enjoyment, often at-  
tempted, but never so well, certain-  
ly never better, brought out in po-  
etry."—Notes and Queries.

Packing Sugar.  
The bag has displaced both the  
hogshead and the barrel in the ship-  
ment of refined and raw sugars.  
There was a time, not so very long  
ago, when such a thing as shipping  
sugar in anything but a stave made  
vessel was unheard of, but now it is  
just the other way. The bag has be-
