WASHINGTON, Dec. 18th 1896.

Senator Vest has lost none of his old-time power of expression, nor any of his confidence in the principles for which he has been Ighting so long. Although he based his remarks upon the Dingley bill, he prefaced them by saying that he knew it was a dead issue and that he only did so because many well-meaning people were urging Congress to act upon it. Later, the death of the Dingley bill was announced by Sherman.
