### THE LEGISLATURE.

#### Condensed Report of Proceedings.

##### THIRTY-FOURTH DAY.

##### SENATE.

The Senate met at 11 o'clock, and bills were introduced as follows:

To amend the charter of the Rocky Mount Agricultural and Mechanical Association.

By Maulsby to incorporate the Columbus Drainage Company; also to make a picket fence four feet high a lawful fence.

To establish a normal school in Robeson county.

Early, to incorporate Garrysburg Educational Association.

By Grant, to incorporate Dudley, Wayne county.

Bills were passed as follows:

To incorporate Roanoke Rapids.

To levy a special tax to build a bridge over Roanoke river in Northampton and Halifax counties.

To amend the charter of Enfield.

##### HOUSE.

Bills were introduced as follows:

Schulken, for the relief of ex-Sheriff McPhail, of Columbus.

Morton, to tax cigarettes 15 cents a package.

Harris, of Hyde, to prohibit the sale of intoxicating liquors in that county.

James, to protect deer and turkeys in Pender county.

Ward, to declare ordained ministers and justices of the peace public officers.

#### Anniversary of Our Big Fire.

Today is the anniversary of our big fire, that occurred February 16th, 1896, and it looked at that time as if our little town was ruined forever. But not so, with the determination that the people of this town made of, they were soon planning to rebuild. It was the largest fire Greenville ever had. The number of brick stores destroyed were fifteen and now in their stead we have gained five brick stores—making twenty in all. It does not look now as if we ever had a fire.

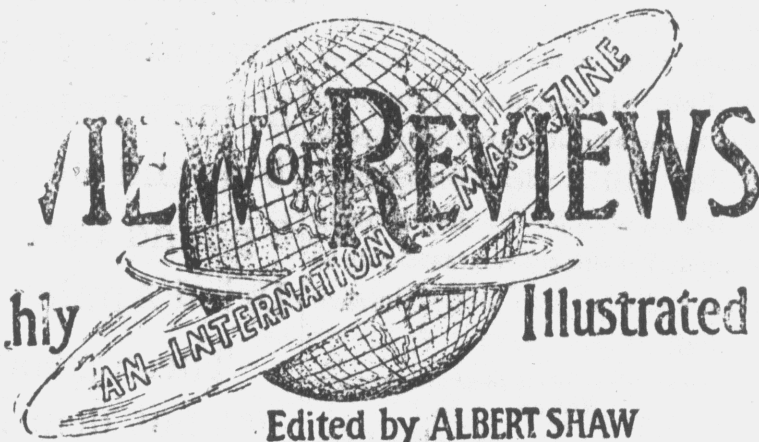
