THE LEGISLATURE.

Condensed Report of Proceedings.

THIRTY-FIFTH DAY.

SENATE.

The senate met at 4 o'clock.

Bills and resolutions were introduced as follows:

A petition was presented from the Robeson County Teachers' Association, asking for four months' public school.

Whedbee, to legalize bonds issued by Elizabeth City and to levy a special tax.

Scales, to authorize the city of Greensboro to issue bonds for the establishment of a public library.

Justice, to enable judgment creditors to reach the interest of judgment debtor is interested as tenant in common.

Newcome, to increase revenue and to regulate insurance. This provides that fire insurance companies not incorporated by the laws of this state, but legally authorized to do business in this state through regular commissioned and licensed agents located in this state, shall not make contracts of fire insurance on property herein, save through agents of such companies as are regularly commissioned and licensed to write policies of fire insurance in this state, provided, however, this act shall not apply to property of railway companies or other common carriers; that for the purpose of carrying out the foregoing section it shall be unlawful for any agent, commissioned or otherwise, of said company to sign any blank contracts or policy of fire insurance and upon conviction thereof, shall be fined for each offense not less than \$100 nor more than \$200, one half to the informant and one-half to the state.

HOUSE.

The house met at 10 o'clock.

Bills and resolutions were introduced as follows:

James, to make the fee for weighing cattle 15 cents.

Duffy, to prevent fast driving over bridges in Onslow county.

Currie, to give North Carolina the Illinois law for protection of inebriates.

Craven, to make it a misdemeanor to fail to remove obstructions to passage of fish in streams within thirty days after notice from the state board of agriculture.

Drew, to prohibit the taking of clams in Brunswick county.

Rawls to incorporate Severn, Northampton county.

Parker, of Wayne, to protect sheep by taxing male dogs 50 cents and female dogs \$1.00, no dog to be allowed to live unless licensed, making it a misdemeanor to fail to list dogs.

Sutton, of New Hanover, to amend the charter of the chamber of commerce of Wilmington, by giving it a perpetual charter and the right to borrow money.

Lusk, to amend The Code by adding as an additional cause for divorce: "If either husband or wife shall be indicted and convicted of felony and imprisoned

therefor for life, the act to apply to cases now pending in the courts.

Lusk, to provide that whenever any person is declared to be insane or inebriate the husband or wife of such shall be first entitled to guardianship of his or her property.

The calendar was taken up and the following bills passed.

To make wire fences lawful fences in Edgecombe county.

To establish the stock law in part of White Oak township, Bladen county.

To allow Nash county to levy a special tax and also to work the roads by taxation.

To incorporate Bridgersville, Wilson county.

To allow Washington county to levy a special tax for bridges.

To allow Robeson county to levy a special tax.

To allow Duplin county to levy a special tax.

To incorporate Saratoga, Wilson county.

By leave, Brown introduced a bill to incorporate Moyesville, Jones county.

They all performed their parts well, and Pitt was loudly applauded. We are always glad when Pitt county girls and boys are successful and well they should be, when they represent so great a section as Pitt county. The legislative committee were delighted with the entertainment and will make a favorable report to the General Assembly for the support of this great institution of learning that is doing so much for the development of the girls of the State of North Carolina.

A Word With the Doctor.

When finger nails are dry and break easily, rub vasoline on them at night and after washing the hands with soap or amonia.

The woman with the headache is a creature to be pitied. Generally she could help it if she would, for a headache is simply nature's revenge for some crime against it. It comes usually from overeating, undereating or irregular eating, which causes indigestion and gases in the stomach cause pressure on the brain, and that causes the very worst of headaches.

The most trying time for a sick person is between the hours of 1 and 4 in the morning. Vitality becomes diminished, and the strength should therefore be fortified as far as possible with some strong food, either soup or egg, or milk, about midnight.

Nature takes the time when one is lying down to give the heart rest, and that organ consequently makes ten strokes less a minute than when one is in an upright posture. Multiply that by sixty minutes and it is 600 strokes. Therefore in eight hours spent in lying down the heart is saved nearly 5,000 strokes, and as the heart pumps six ounces of blood with each stroke it lifts 30,000 ounces less of blood in a night of eight hours spent in bed than when one is in an upright position. As the blood flows so much more slowly through the veins when one is lying down, extra covering is needed to supply the body with the warmth usually furnished by circulation.

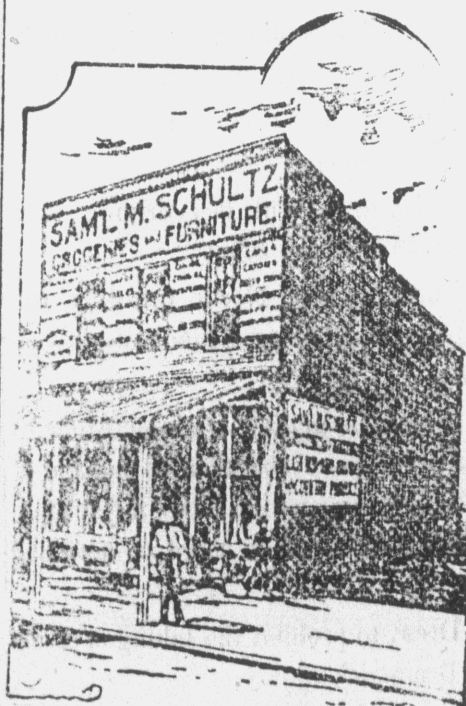
