#### THE LEGISLATURE.

Condensed Report of Proceedings.

FORTIETH DAY.

#### SENATE.

The Senate met at 10 o'clock, Lieutenant Governor Reynolds presiding; prayer by Senator McNeill.

Petitions were introduced as follows:

Lyon, a petition in behalf of indigent inebriates. Ashburn, a petition from citizens of Stokes county, relative to placing ladders at dams on Dan river. Barker, a petition from prisoners, asking that the laws concerning pardons be changed.

Yeager, a bill to authorize the sale of standing timber for partition in common among tenants.

Roberson, a bill for the relief of the sureties of J. M. Benson, of Bladen county.

Barker, a bill to remove the obstruction to fish in Catawba river; also to protect innocent persons from misrepresentation.

Cannon, a bill to appoint a board of finance for New Hanover.

Anthony, a bill to prohibit the sale of liquor within two miles of Mt. Pleasant Baptist church, in Cleveland county.

Geddie, a bill to prohibit the sale of liquor within three miles of Tabor Methodist church, Cumberland county.

Bills passed as follows:

In relation to the electoral college, to refund the bonded debt of Cumberland county; to legalize the bonds issued by Elizabeth City and to levy special tax; for the protection of fish in Banner Elk, Watauga county; to allow Mitchell county to levy a special tax; to authorize the commissioners of Haywood county to levy a special tax, passed second reading; to allow Washington county to levy a special tax, tabled.

To investigate the complaints of Mrs. Pattie D. Arrington and appoint a committee of Senators McCaskey, Maxwell and Mr. Person of the House. This is the same matter which was up in 1895, which the "Hoola Boom Campbell" committee was appointed upon.

By leave the following bills were introduced:

Rollins, to allow Madison county to levy a special tax. Person to prevent discrimination in jury list. Butler, to improve the public school system in North Carolina, and moved to print 300 copies. Adopted.

At 1:14 o'clock the Senate took a recess until 3 o'clock p. m.

#### HOUSE.

The House met at 10 a. m.

The following bill were introduced:

Person, of Wayne, to make it discretionary with the State Treasurer whether he will pay any annual appropriations monthly, quarterly or annually. Candler, to provide a dispensary for Asheville. Parker, of Perquimans, to protect timber cutters and sellers in that county. Currie, to prevent careless rafting of lumber in Lumber river. Spruill, to require railroads to carry bicycles as baggage. Watts, to allow

Alexander to levy a special tax to build a jail.

Meares, to allow court clerk of Bladen to be absent Mondays. Brown, to pay railroad debt of Pollocksville. Hileman, to pay solicitors \$200 a month after January 1, 1898. Hileman, to provide that the State Treasurer shall collect from all persons or corporations doing a banking business under State license a per cent. of the capital stock which has actually been paid in by the stockholders, and that he shall use this fund to pay guarantees against any loss to the State Banks which refuse for ten days to pay this 1 per cent. shall be closed and receiver shall be appointed. Dewese to protect fish and certain game in Cherokee. Harris, to incorporate the Scotland Neck Industrial and Training School. Adams, to extend the Raleigh road district three miles in each direction from the city limits.

Pearson, to keep the Catawba river open as a highway for floatage.

Cunningham, to make an itemized statement of an account, properly verified, prima facie evidence of correctness.

#### FOUND GUILTY.

(Special to Reflector.)

WASHINGTON, N. C., Feb. 22.—Holton Perry, colored, was found guilty of rape this evening about half past six o'clock. Perry has been on trial here since last Friday for rape committed in February, 1896, upon Annie Smith, a white girl about twelve or fourteen years of age. He escaped at the time he committed the crime and was found and arrested in Wilmington several months later. He was brought back to Washington last June and lodged in jail, where he has been since awaiting trial.

He was ably represented by Hon. Chas. L. Warren. The State was represented by solicitor Leary, assisted by Messrs. John H. Small and Stephen C. Bragew.

The verdict was not a surprise, for almost everybody believed him guilty. The jury was out only forty minutes.

A motion for a new trial was overruled. It is thought the defendant will appeal.

He was sentenced to be hanged on March 23rd 1897.

#### NORTH CAROLINA.

Dr. Eugene Grissom has been appointed Assistant Physician of the Insane Asylum of Colorado, at Pueblo, and entered upon his duty Saturday, Feb. 13th.—Raleigh Press-Visitor

The following is three sections of the bill as introduced for the government of the town of Greenville: Read them.

Section 6. That the Police Board hereby created shall, at their first meeting after qualifying, or as soon thereafter as may be possible, and every police board hereafter elected under this act, shall proceed to levy all taxes, poll property, license or otherwise, pass all ordinances and fix the penalties thereto all rules and regulations, elect or appoint all officers, and to do and perform the same and all other duties now performed and done by the Board of Councilmen of the town of Greenville.

Sec. 7. That after the passage of this act there shall be no election held in the town of Greenville, or any ward thereof, for the Board of Councilmen, or any person to constitute a member of the Board of Councilmen of said town of Greenville, nor shall the Board of Councilmen as now constituted, undertake to levy any assessment for taxes, or fix the amount of any license tax, privilege tax, or any property or poll tax for the said town of Greenville. And any action herein by the present Board of Councilmen is hereby declared null and void.

Sec. 8. That the Police Board hereby created, and any police board hereafter elected under this act, are hereby authorized and empowered to negotiate loans issue bonds, and to otherwise fix and find the said town and its credit to any obligation, contract or contracts for the purchase, erection and operation of a suitable place for a market house and a town hall, for water works and electric light plant, and to charge such prices for electric lights and water supply as they may deem fair and reasonable, to regulate, manage and control the market house and town hall to the best interests of the town. They shall have power and authority to raise such sums by taxation, license or otherwise as may be necessary to pay off and discharge the interest and principal of any such contracts or obligations made and entered into by said Police Board as hereinbefore recited in this section. Provided that no bond, obligation or contract authorized and entered into by this section and act shall bear more than 6 per cent. per annum, and the same shall not be issued or entered into less than a par. Provided, further, that any bonds issued under this act and section shall be in denominations of \$100 each, negotiable not less than par value and redeemable within not less than twenty, nor more than thirty years.

Randall Whitehead, colored, was up in the Superior Court, charged with carrying concealed weapons. He plead guilty to the charge. Before his honor passed sentence he was placed on the stand in his own behalf, and proved to be a witness from away back and a nimrod indeed. The bears he had captured, the deer he had slayed and the numberless encounters he had had with the wild beast of the forest would lay the record of the celebrated Daniel Boone in the shade. He tried to impress upon his honor the necessity of a pistol in the daring adventures of such a life. His council, Mr. Small, came to his aid and said he was the last of that mighty race that had made old North Carolina what she was, and made it possible for the present generation to rest in security, free from the ravenous wild beasts of the forest, and in eloquent tones tried to impress upon the court that for the sake of the memories of the past and sweet charity's sake to let him go. His honor failed to be impressed—he seemed to have lost his reverence for the mighty apostle of Boone—and said thirty days in the common county jail, where he can reflect on the mutability of things here below and dream of wild cats and coons.—Washington Messenger.

**Church Organ Against Tongue.**  
The pastor of a church at Rockford, Ill., is under obligations to a lusty organ for the successful termination of his Sunday service according to the established program. He had been treating his congregation to some advanced ideas on religious questions, and had just completed his discourse when a woman visitor arose and started to take him to task for his lack of orthodoxy. She spoke in a loud tone of voice, it appears, and was rapidly assuming a somewhat imperious tone, to the evident embarrassment of the preacher, when the organ came to his relief and her discomfiture.
