The leading editorial in this weeks issue of the Danville Tobacco Journal, deals mainly with a feature in which our Eastern N. C. tobacco farmers are vitally interested. Below it is reproduced in full that our farmers may take warning from the advice and be governed accordingly. I will say in this connection however that when those englishmen across the seas become dissat isfied with tobacco prepared over here steps should at once be taken to remedy the dissatisfaction as they constitute the chief competition for our tobacco, with American manufacturer's and anything that cripples the export trade damages in a most serious proportion the demand for our product.

The Journal says:

"During the past week several piles of tobacco were found to contain leaves upon which there were quite a deposic of rosin gum. The tobacco was from the new bright tobacco sections of Eastern North Carolina and South Carolina, a pilate-pine section.

"It is presume I that the barns as well as the hanging poles used in the barns are made of pine timber, and in the process of curing the extreme heat forces the rosin from the timber and causes it to drip on the tobacco.

"The matter is becoming a serious one. We learn that the dealers of all the markets of Virginia and North Carolina are receiving complaints from their correspondents concerning it, and immediate steps should be taken by the boards of trade of the several markets to remedy this evil.

"Hundreds of new barns will, no doubt be built in the above sections during the coming season, and in justice to the farmers of those sections as well as to the trade at large, they should be made to know emphatically that a concinua ce of the evil will result disastrously to the tobacco interests of those sections."

A FINGER FOR HER NOSE.

It is due to the skillful surgery of Dr. Joseph P. Tunis, of Philadelphia, that Mrs. John Edwards, of Chester, Pa., has a nose like anybody else. The third finger is missing from Mrs. Edwards' her face, for it was grafted there to form a new nose for her. Mrs-Edwards was admitted to the Methodist Episcopal Hospital late in the fall to be treated for a cancerous growth. This ailment was carefully treated and checked, but it had left an unsightly blemish where the pawards grieved a great deal over the facial disfigurement, and, when Dr. Tunis suggested a remedy, she immediately agreed to undergo the operation, by means of which one of her fingers was to be made to take the place of her nose.

The patient was etherized, and the operation begun. Dr. Tunis cut off the end joint of the third finger of her right hand, and disarticulated the remaining two bones. The hand was held in position over Mrs. Edwards' face, and the boneless flesh was laid over the damaged nose and stitched to the face. Bandages of crinoline, spread with plaster of paris, were wrapped about the patient's body, holding the arm firmly in place. The hand and remaining fingers were padded to prevent maceration of the face, and for three weeks Mrs. Edwards remained in that position. Her hand almost entirely covered her face, and it was necessary to feed her by means of a tube inserted into the left corner of her mouth. Occasionally the bandages were removed, but the hand was never allowed to change its position.

The finger was firmly grafted to the face. It was then treated with a preparation of cocaine and was severed from the hand. Both wounds were dressed and the patient was none the worse for the operation. She was much bet er off, as a matter of fact, for the new nose was quite as good as the average person's. The nasal passages, which had not been affected by the cancerous ailment, had been packed with iodoform gauze and the rostrils were thereby reserved. Mrs. Edwards has left the hospital with a new nose, hardly less exact in form than her orignial one.

A Heifer With Five Legs.

A heifer with five legs attracted a crowd yesterday at the wharf of the York River Line, on Light street. The heifer is 1 year old. The extra leg grows from the right shoulder and reaches nearly to the ground. The extra limb is well proportioned and is perfect. The animal was born in North Carolina, where it was raised. It was shipped from Snow Hill, N. C., on the steamer Atlanta, and was consigned to a Lexington street department store.—Baltimore Sun-




