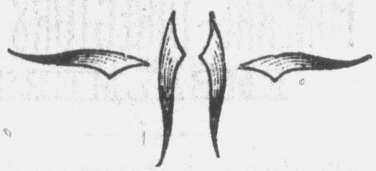

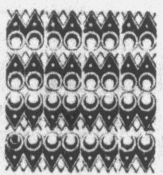

In the sixteenth century the average length of a doctor's life was 36 years five months; in the seventeenth century it was 45 years and eight months; in the eighteenth century 49 years and eight months, and in the nineteenth 58 years and seven months. It thus appears that doctors were 300 years in learning not to take their own medicine.

The curious spectacle is presented in San Francisco of a millionaire confined to jail because he refused to pay \$850 due his wife. Col. P. A. Finnegan, says the Argonaut, was sued for divorce, and at the preliminary hearing the court ordered him to pay his wife \$450 to defray the expenses of her suit, \$300 alimony, and \$100 a month for her support during the pendency of her action. Col. Finnegan did not like the idea of supplying the enemy with the sinews of war, and chose to go to jail rather than pay according to the courts demand. In jail he has furniture from a hotel, meals from a city restaurant, and all the visitors he cares to see.

More or less importance attaches to the fact that the Governor of North Carolina is handing out appointments to people in Newbern, as councilmen for that town, without any reference to whether or not the people of that town desire to be ruled over by these appointees. The Governor is proceeding under act of the last Legislature, which undertook to give him, instead of the people, the government of the towns. Litigation has resulted in Wilmington from this legislation, and now it is up in Newbern. Now, as always, we hope the people will win. Government by them is to be preferred to government by injunction, by Governors or by State Treasurers.—Charlotte Observer.

The Whistling Eel.

A Rocky Mount special says Yesterday there were taken from a small fish trap at the falls of the Tar, two immense "whistling" eels. They differ from the ordinary eel in that the body for four or five inches from the head is large again as the other portion, and on each side of this enlarged "neck" are seven perfectly round holes arranged precisely as in an ordinary flute, size, shape, distance apart and all. The mouth is round and full of villainous looking teeth in a perfect circle. When taken from the trap each eel emitted a discordant sound not unlike that made by the beginner learning to play the flute. Mr. P. S. Hicks has had photographs made of the monsters.

Tennessee's Anti-Cigarette Law.

Tennessee has taken an advance step in the fight against cigarettes by the passage of a law which is aimed to drive them from the State and prevent their being shipped into it. The law is sweeping and explicit. It prohibits the sale, manufacture or disposal in the State; it prohibits their importation from other States, and also prohibits the sale of cigarette papers. The efforts in other States to legislate the cigarette out of the State by preventing its sale and stopping the importation of it have not so far been successful, and it remains to be seen how the manufacturers will treat the Tennessee law. The rights of interstate commerce have thus far stood between the "cigarette fiends" and the prohibitory laws. It appears, however, that the dealers in Tennessee are willing to let the new law have its way, as they disposed of all cigarettes on hand, in order to be ready for it when it went into effect on May 1st.—Baltimore Sun.

Cleveland, May 8.—Chicago had much the better of today's game until the ninth inning, when the Indians made a rally and poured out three runs. Score. Cleveland, 7; Chicago, 6.

Boston, May 8.—Klobendenz was as wild as a hawk today and practically presented the game to the Senators. Attendance 4,509. Score. Washington, 10; Boston, 9.

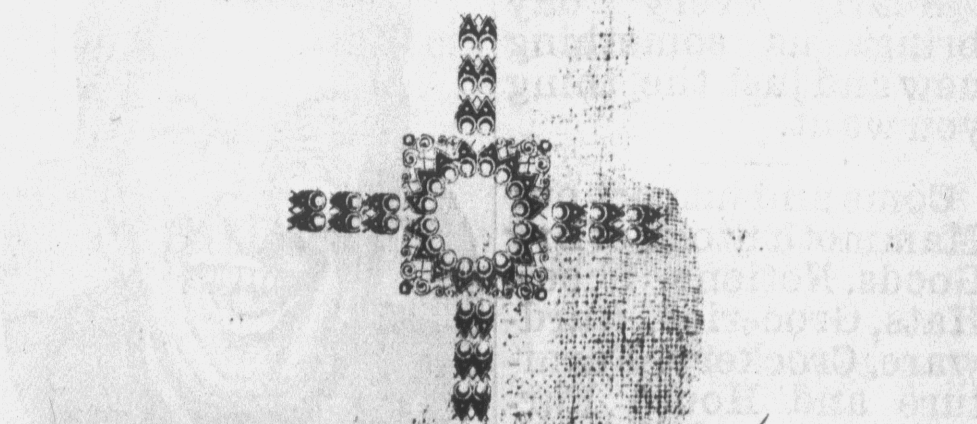

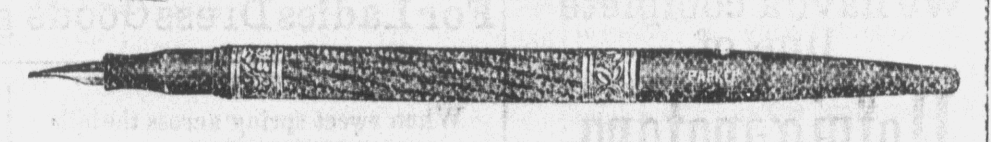

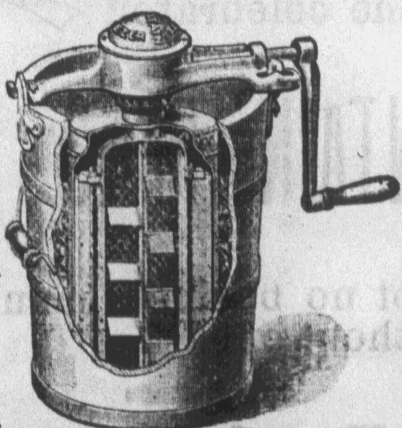
