The State Superintendent of Public Instruction issues a circular saying: "How shall we improve the attendance upon our public schools? I come to ask you to give it careful consideration. This is a question that should interest all friends of popular education. The first remedy I suggest is have better schools. How are we to have better schools? Secure better teachers. Let our teachers go out among indifferent parents and strive to show them what they can and will do for their children when their children come. Be sure something is done for them. Our parents ought not to be such strangers to our schools and especially to our teachers. The cry was made during the late campaign for local taxation that our children do not attend what schools we now have; why spend any more money when what we now have is not used and appreciated by those who need it most. I am in favor of better schools, better teachers, more earnest, honest effort to make them worthy to be attended by our children, and then if, after we have good schools people will not send their children I shall be in favor of compulsory education."

Silver bullion has recently declined heavily and of course the goldite press is saying "we told you so," and crowing over their fulfilled prophecies. But they fail to comment on the fact that all values, other than fixed interest bearing securities, have also declined with silver. The Washington Post on the other hand very properly remarks that the decline of silver is due to the closing of the mints of the world against it and is wicked enough to say that if gold were demonetized it would not be worth as much as silver, which is a truth worth considering.—Durham Sun.
