## THE THIRD STEMMERY.

Another Large Plant Begins Work  
on Tobacco Row.

The Hooker & Bernard five story  
prize house, occupied by Roberts &  
Ficklen, has been converted into a  
stemmery, and began operations this  
week. A REFLECTOR reporter was  
shown through the plant by Mr. E. B.  
Ficklen, a member of the firm and their  
manager and buyer on this market.

The building is one of the largest  
here, and every department of it rep-  
resents a place of activity. A large  
annex on the west side of the building  
contains the steam drying and ordering  
rooms and the power house. These  
are thoroughly equipped with modern  
appliances for handling tobacco. The  
first floor of the main building contains  
the business office, receiving, packing  
and shipping rooms. The second floor  
has the picking and stemming rooms,  
and third, fourth and fifth floors are  
used for hanging and air drying. In  
the stemming rooms from 75 to 100  
hands, most of them women, are em-  
ployed. The steam department is under  
the supervision of Mr. W. E. Jarrett  
who has had many years experience in  
working tobacco.

The firm of Roberts & Ficklen are  
among the strongest tobacco buyers on  
the Greenville market. Mr. Ficklen  
is a thorough business man and is held  
in high esteem by the Trade and by  
our people generally. His large plant  
gives strength to the tobacco market  
and adds much to the business of the  
town.

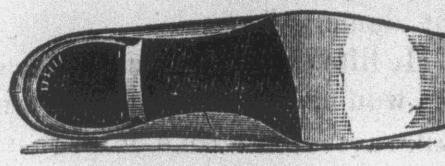
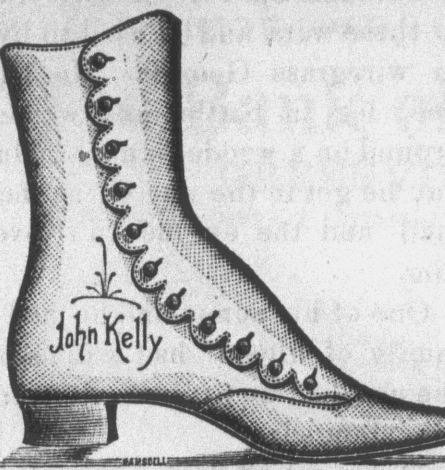

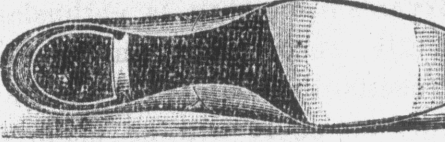
