is unknown. The loss was about cover-
ed by insurance.

THE MAINE DISASTER.

Synopsis of the Court's Report.

The report of the Board of Enquiry
upon the cause of the wrecking of the
battleship Maine, which was sent to
Congress Monday, can be summed up
in the following eight points:

First—The court finds that at the
time of the explosion, the battleship
Maine was lying in five and one-half
to six fathoms of water.

Second—The discipline aboard the
ship was excellent; everything—am-
munition, guns, stores, etc.—stowed ac-
cording to orders. The temperature of
the magazine at 8 p. m. was normal,
except in the attic ten-inch magazine,
and that did not explode.

Third—The explosion occurred at
9:40 o'clock on the evening of February
15. "There were two explosions, with a
very short interval between them; the
ship lifted on the first explosion."

Fourth—The court can form no de-
finite opinion of the condition of the
wreck from the divers' evidence.

Fifth—From the technical details of
wreckage, the court deduces that "a
mine was exploded under the ship on
the port side."

Sixth—The explosion was due to
"no fault of those on board."

Seventh—The opinion of the court
states that "the explosion of the mine
caused the explosion of two magazines."

Eighth—The court declares that it
"cannot find evidence to fix the respon-
sibility."

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, March 28 98.

War! War!! War!!! That has been the cry on every side in tones higher and higher, since the official report of the Naval Court of Inquiry, confirmed the opinion that had been general from the day the Maine was blown up, by saying that the explosion was on the outside of the vessel, and showing, by evidence presented, the impossibility of private parties being able to get or to put into position explosives powerful enough to do what was done in Havana harbor without the assistance or connivance of Spanish officials. Mr. McKinley knows that war is the only outcome of the situation, notwithstanding that he persists in talking peace while the whole administration is acting war, but he has an overwhelming anxiety to have Spain make the first open hostile move, just as though the blowing up of the Maine was not a hostile act, and as is the flotilla of torpedo boats and torpedo destroyers now making its way towards American waters, alleged to be bound for Porto Rico, was not another hostile act. His reasons for not wishing to begin is a fear that Europe may think that he had forced the war upon Spain.

Mr. McKinley has a policy which he thinks will force Spain to get out of Cuba peaceably, to declare war against the United States, or to begin fighting us without a declaration of war. He told leading Senators and Representatives enough of this policy before sending the Maine report to Congress to secure their promises to aid in keeping Congress from acting on the Maine report until this policy can be put into effect, or at least be tried. This policy is to be intervention in Cuba, in the name of humanity, and under it the loss of the Maine is to be a side issue, treated as the result of incompetence rather than criminal intention on the part of the Spanish government, and no specific reparation therefor is to be asked, although, it is said, that Mr. McKinley indulges the hope that Spain will voluntarily make some offer in that line—a hope not shared by anybody else, so far as known. The first official move in this policy will be a message from Mr. McKinley to Congress, asking for an appropriation to be used for the relief of all Cubans who are in need.

It will not be an easy matter to hold Congress down until Mr. McKinley's intervention policy can be carried out, although there is very little doubt that it will eventually bring on war with Spain just as certainly as would a declaration of war. But there is an opinion in the minds of many men in Congress that it would be more in keeping with American character to openly declare war upon Spain, regardless of European opinion, than to virtually force Spain to take the initiative in the war, by acting under the cloak of humanity. Representative Lewis of the State of Washington, voiced the opinion of this element in Congress when he said: "War is

already upon us. We are fools to disguise it. It is not patriotic to delude ourselves further. A Spanish flotilla is sailing towards our shores. It is the duty of the government to intercept that flotilla and blow it from the seas." And the enthusiastic cheers which greeted his quotation from a speech made by John Randolph, in the House, in 1822, were significant—"As we would not be bullied by the British lion, so we refuse to be frightened by the Spanish jackall."

The Secretary of the Interior has asked Congress for an appropriation of more than \$8,000,000 to meet a deficiency in the pension funds for the current fiscal year. The Republican leaders in Congress probably knew that this deficiency would exist, and that was why they insisted upon making the pension appropriation for the next fiscal year about \$10,000,000 less than they know will be required. It is all apart of the scheme to keep down the total of appropriations at this session of Congress.

The Democratic filibuster while the Naval Appropriation bill was being considered by the House, sitting as a committee of the whole, was not made to delay the Naval bill, but as a rebuke to Representative Payne, of New York, who was presiding and who tried to out-Czar the Czar himself, by refusing to allow Representative Hartman, of Montana, to complete a speech he began, because Mr. Hartman, who is a silver Republican, dared to satirize the Republican party, and as such it was fully deserved. Representative Bailey, who led the filibustering, correctly stated the Democratic position when he said, in protesting against the refusal of little Czar Payne to entertain a demand for tellers on a vote upon an appeal from his decision: "If you do not permit us to verify the count, you destroy the last safe safeguard of the minority. A dishonest man in the chair and there have been dishonest men in the chair, could defeat the will of this House. I am free to say that my purpose in inaugurating this filibuster was to consume twice as much time as you denied the gentleman from Montana, and I intend to do it every time you deny a reasonable demand."

Shot His Sister's Lover.

News comes from Hertford county of a sensational attempt of a forty-five-year old man to runaway with a fourteen-year old girl and marry her. George Teel is his name and that of his sweetheart is Pauline Vann. The young people had planned to runaway on a certain night. The girl's brother found it out, so he took a double-barrel shot-gun, hid behind a tree and when Teel came the boy poured a load of them into his hide. One of the reasons, it is said, for the Vann family's objection to Teel is said to be that he is an infidel. Miss Vann has been taken from school and is now at home, where she can be watched. All of this happened during the past week, and the matter has been settled and will not be taken to court.

A Horrible Find.

A negro woman, gathering brush on the arsenal grounds on Haymount yesterday afternoon, found concealed in a ditch, and covered by only a few inches of clay, a newly born white child, with every appearance of having died in good health, wrapped in brown paper. Coroner Gilbert was notified, and this afternoon he is holding an inquest over the remains.—Fayetteville Observer.

Superintendent Mebane has a plan which he thinks will cause school committees to be more careful how and for what they give orders for public school money. He proposes to have the receipts and disbursements of the public school fund published.

The Observance of Easter.

The observance of Easter dates back to about the year 68, at which time there was much contention among the Eastern and Western churches as to what day the festival should be observed. It was finally ordained at the Council of Nice in the year 325 that it must be observed throughout the Christian world on the same day. This decision settled that Easter should be kept upon the Sunday first after the fourteenth day of the first Jewish month, but no general conclusion was arrived at as to the cycle by which the festival was to be regulated, and some churches adopted one rule and some another. This diversity of usage was put an end to, and the Roman rule making Easter the first Sunday after the fourteenth day of the calendar moon was established in England in 669. After nine centuries a discrepancy in the keeping of Easter was caused by the authorities of the English Church declining to adopt the reformation of the Gregorian Calendar in 1582. The difference was settled in 1752 by the adoption of the rule which makes Easter Day always the first Sunday after the full moon which appears on or next after the twenty-first day of March. If the full moon happens upon a Sunday Easter is the Sunday after.—April Ladies' Home Journal.

A colored military company organized at Oxford looking to a all to war with Spain.

The government has closed a contract with the Mount Airy Granite Company for about a thousand tons of stone to be used in the construction of the new emplacement at Fort Caswell.

Two hundred million pesetas sounds pretty big, and really it is a rather comfortable bank account, but it is short of Uncle Sam's \$50,000,000. A Spanish peseta is equal to 193-10 cents and Spain's war loan, therefore, if war loan it is, amounts to \$38,600,000.—Charlotte Observer.

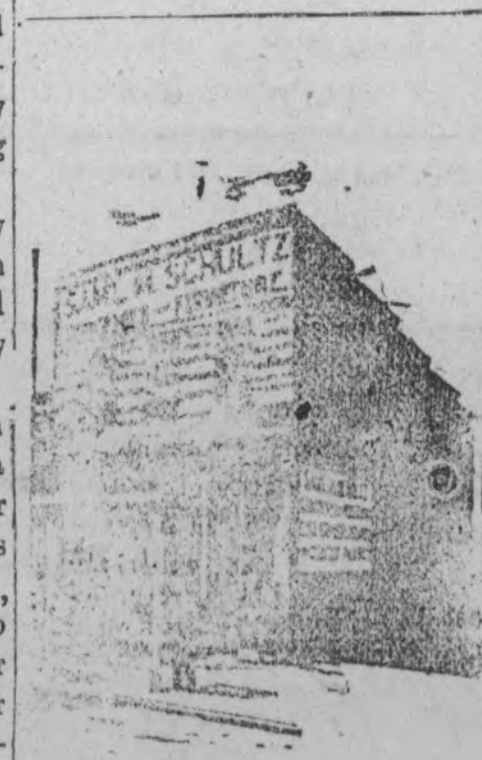
