IMMEDIATE WAR UPON US.

ALL NEGOTIATIONS WITH SPAIN ENDED.

Crisis Will be Reached Monday. Woodford and Lee Called Home. Spanish Flotilla to be Intercepted. State Guard Will Mobilize at Raleigh

The indications now are that war between the United States and Spain is inevitable. All diplomacy between the two countries is at an end and all remaining to be done is for the President and Congress to make a formal declaration of war.

THE REFLECTOR received the following telegram Friday night:

War with Spain is almost inevitable. Minister Woodford is making preparations to leave Madrid. The Spanish government has rejected President McKinley's proposition and the latter is this evening preparing a special message to Congress.

THE REFLECTOR wired to Congressman Skinner for the latest particulars of the situation and the following reply was received from him:

Washington, D. C., April 2.—All negotiations with Spain are at an end. The President sends a special message to Congress Monday. War is now inevitable. There is much excitement here.

Later Col. Skinner wired as follows: Washington, D. C., April 2, 11 a. m.—It is conceded that the crisis will be reached Monday and that immediate war is upon us.

Minister Woodford has been ordered to leave Madrid and similar orders have been sent to Consul General Lee to leave Cuba.

Orders have been sent to the commanders of the squadron at Hampton Roads to prepare for immediate action, and as soon as the declaration of war is made that squadron will be sent to intercept the Spanish torpedo flotilla which will be due at Porto Rico from the Canary Islands about next Wednesday.

Today a tract of land near Raleigh was secured to be used for a camp of instruction for the State Guard. It is expected that all the companies of the State will be called there and put in readiness in case their services are needed.

Spanish Invasion of Texas.

San Antonio, Tex., March 31.—It was learned today that the plot among the Spaniards of Mexico to invade Texas is much larger than was supposed.

Information has been obtained from Joaquin Marti, and through documents found on his person when arrested, that 500 men had enlisted in a filibustering regiment, and that they were expressly bound by oath to meet at a rendezvous near San Antonio on the day following the expected declaration of war.

Dr. Jose Garcia, another Spanish leader of the movement, has been arrested.

Lives of Americans in Danger.

Tampa, Fla., March 31.—The steamship "Mascotte" arrived this afternoon from Havana bringing over a hundred passengers. They say that a general exodus was about to begin among the Americans in Havana and on the island when they left.

The passengers say a very great change has come over the Spanish officials since the report of the "Maine" disaster has been made known, and that it is now dangerous for Americans to remain in Cuba.

They further say that Gen. Lee realizes the seriousness of the situation and has become uneasy for the safety of his people.

Capt. Hanlon, of the "Mascotte," says active preparations for war were noticeable on every hand in Havana harbor when his vessel sailed.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

(From our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, April 1st 98. Haul down the blood-stained yellow flag—

Spain's ever-treachorous flag; We are ready, and we're right; And, by the eternal, we're going to fight!

The events of this week have inspired Congress with the spirit of '76, and this spirit compelled Mr. McKinley to beg Congress for a little more time in order that he might ascertain whether Spain would accept his last proposition...

Resolutions galore for recognition of Cuban independence, for forcible independence, for forcible intervention, and for a straight-cut declaration of war against Spain...

Verily, it is a bold day when the northern speculator gets left. A London special says that efforts of the United States naval attaches to buy guns abroad have failed...

Governor Black, of New York, has signed a bill to prohibit the sale of liquor in department stores.

The House by a vote of 132 to 91 decided that a claim of a loyal citizen of the U. S. against the government lost its validity when willed to a member of the family of a man who fought on the Southern side in the civil war.

Ricciotti Garibaldi, of Italy, takes enough interest in Cuba to offer to send 40,000 Garibaldians to Cuba, if the United States will pay expenses.

In the midst of the prevailing excitement the people of Washington have neither forgotten nor neglected to render deserved honor to their intrepid fellow-towhsman, Capt. C. D. Sigbee late Commander of the battleship Maine, whose name is now a world wide synonym for bravery and coolness.

The resolution providing for the recognition of Cuban independence, forcible intervention by the United States to drive Spanish soldiers out of Cuba, and appropriating \$500,000 for the relief of non-combatants, which was offered in the Senate by Allen of Nebraska, and in the House by Bell, of Colorado, was the result of a joint conference of the Populists in Congress, and represents their position.

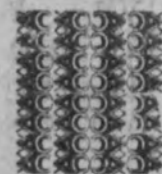
