THE SITUATION EASIER.

THE WAR FEELING SLIGHTLY RELAXES TO-DAY.

PRESIDENT EXPECTING MESSAGE FROM SAGASTA PROPOSING ARMISTICE TO INSURGENTS.—POPE URGING QUEEN OF SPAIN TO GRANT ARMISTICE.

House Adjourns Until Wednesday Without Action—Senate Committee Defers Report Until President Sends a Message—Hanna Guilty of Bribery—Five Hundred Drowned.

The war news is not so exciting today, the action which the President and Congress were expected to take being again postponed. Knowing the anxiety of our readers THE REFLECTOR begins giving them the press dispatches today. They are in condensed form yet they tell you what is going on and give the exact situation. Cablegram From Sagasta

Washington, D. C., April 4—President McKinley announces that he is momentarily expecting a cablegram from Sagasta notifying him of a formal proposition for an armistice to the insurgents in Cuba. The President is preparing a message, and the Senate committee will not report until the President's message is completed and placed before Congress.

The Pope Urging Armistice
By Cable to Reflector.
Madrid, April 4—The Pope is today urging the Queen Regent of Spain to grant an armistice to the Cubans.

Adjourned Without Action

Washington, D. C., April 4—The House Committee on Foreign Affairs adjourned until Wednesday without taking any action on the war situation.

For Immediate Action

Washington, D. C., April 4—Senator Mason offered a resolution directing the Senate Committee on Foreign Affairs to act immediately without waiting for any message or report from the

President. The resolution went over until tomorrow. Many other Senators made speeches strongly favoring immediate action.

No Action Before Wednesday

Carmine, Ill., April 4—Information from Shawnee today says that five hundred people were drowned by the breaking of river levees surrounding the town. The town is almost entirely swept away and the situation is distressing.

In The Balance London, April 1.—The Times says editorially this morning:

"It is evident that peace and war hang in the balance, and that the world has not long to wait for definition. It cannot be supposed that America's terms have yet been published in their completeness, but they may be guessed to include the freedom of Cuba.

"The Spanish government will make a fatal mistake if it fails to understand the terms now offered which are the best it is ever likely to obtain, and if they are not promptly accepted, its to be feared that the next presentation of American demands will be in a harsher shape.

"It behooves Spain to consider whether Cuba is worth fighting for in such an unequal conflict that it is even doubtful if Spain would gain a temporary success, while her ultimate defeat would be certain. A moderate naval force could reduce the island by starvation, and privateering could not be carried on to any extent worth mentioning by Spain, without calling for the intervention of neutral nations.

Technical.
The kiss was unknown, I think, among the aboriginal tribes of America and of central Africa. From the most ancient times, however, it has been familiar to the Asiatic and European races. The Latins divided it into three forms—the osculum, the basium and the suavius, the first being the kiss of friendship and respect, the second of ceremony and the third of love. The Semites always knew the kiss, and Job speaks of it as part of the sacred rites as it is today in the Roman church.
The Mongolian kiss, however, is not the same as that which prevails with us. In it the lips do not touch the surface of the person kissed. The nose is brought into light contact with the cheek, forehead or hand. The breath is drawn slowly through the nostrils, and the act ends with a slight smack of the lips. The Chinese consider our mode of kissing full of coarse suggestiveness, and our writers regard their method with equal disdain.
Darwin and other naturalists have attempted to trace back the kiss to the act of the lower animals who seize their prey with their teeth, etc. An interesting recent study of the subject is by M. Paul d'Enjoy, in "The Bulletin" of the Paris Anthropological society, volume 8, No. 2.—Dr. Daniel G. Brinton in Science.
