THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE READY FOR CONGRESS.

He Takes a Bold Declarative Stand—Pope's Meditorial Offer Refused—English Government Refuses to Mediate—Foreign Affairs Committees and Senators Favor Vigorous Action to Force Spain's Withdrawal.

This Looks Like War.
Special to Reflector.
Washington, D. C., April 5.—The President's message has been written and signed, but will not be read before Congress until tomorrow. The message is held until then so that Minister Woodford and Consul General Lee may have time to leave Spanish soil. The message is bold and declarative for war. Congress will promptly join in action with the President.

The Message Ready

Washington, D. C., April 5.—President McKinley's message has been prepared and signed and will be delivered to Congress tomorrow. It asks for more time. Cuba expresses a willingness to aid Congress in whatever action that body may take.

The President Declines the Pope's Offer

Rome, April 5.—President McKinley has cabled the Pope declining the latter's offer to act as mediator between the United States and Spain in settling the trouble between them. The action of the President is based on the sentiment of opposition that prevails in the United States. The Pope sent a cable message to Cardinal Ireland to renew energy on terms that would be acceptable to both countries.

Favor Forcing Spain to Withdraw

Washington, D. C., April 5.—Senators Turpie, Harriss, Chandler and Kenna spoke vigorously today in favor of armed interference in behalf of Cuba. The Foreign Affairs Committee favors Senator Frye's resolution to interfere and force Spain to withdraw and grant ultimate independence to Cuba.

Vessels Dispatched for Lee

Washington, D. C., April 5.—Congress is informed that vessels have been dispatched to Havana to remove Consul General Lee, the other Counsuls and all Americans from Cuba. All these have been ordered to assemble at Havana and be ready to take their departure on arrival of the vessels.

England Refuses

London April 5.—The English government refuses to mediate between Spain and the United States as requested by Spain.

WASHINGTON LETTER.

From our Regular Correspondent.)

Washington, April 4th 98.
Nengeance is at hand. There is to be no more dilly-dallying with lying Spanish diplomats. Uncle Sam is going to take Spain across his knee and give it a thrashing it has so long deserved at our hands, and the cowardly and dastardly massacre of our sailors and the destruction of our battleship is to be avenged.

Every man who believes in honest and open and above board dealing between nations as well as between individuals, can appreciate the feeling of the man who, after listening to a lot of round about rot about how we could make the Spaniards open hostilities without our declaring war against them, got excited and said: "They blew up our war-ship; they murdered our sailors. That is why we want to punish them."

There has been more or less speculation concerning a resolution offered in the House by Representative Flemmer, of Georgia, directing the Secretary of the Navy to inform the House if the document printed by the Senate as the President's message and evidence on the Maine incident, contained all the evidence embraced in the report

of the naval court of inquiry now on file in the Navy Department, and if not, to transmit to the House a copy of the omitted evidence.

The French Ambassador to the United States has asked the State Department officially whether there was any objection to his looking after the interests of Spanish subjects in the United States after the departure of the Spanish minister, and has been informed that there would be none. This action is regarded as being significant of the intention of France to remain neutral in the war, notwithstanding many assertions to the contrary.

Few men possess the all around common sense equipment and temperament needed to prevent the man who fills the position of Secretary to the President, the man who stands between the President and his callers, and either makes him lots of enemies or additional friends, making himself a double barreled ass. Dan Lamont was one of the few. Mr. J. Addison Porter, the gentleman who now fills the position, is not. He has made himself the laughing stock of Washington by his frantic appeal to the editor of the Hartford (Conn) Courant to arouse the conservative people to the support of the President, in order to prevent a majority of the Senators and Representatives carrying out their intention to force war upon the country.

If a bill, which has been favorably reported to the House, becomes a law, ex-Confederate soldiers who may hereafter serve ninety days in the United States army or navy will be entitled to all the benefits provided for ex-United States soldiers in the act of June 27, 1894, generally known as the "dependent pension act."

The ninth annual convention of the North Carolina branch of the International Order of The King's Daughters and Sons will be held in Wilmington on Thursday Saturday, May 26th, 27th 28th.
