Gen. Lee stated in his telegram that no American's life would be safe in Cuba after the President's message recommending intervention is made public.

Mr. McKinley is indulging the hope before next week, and that his mes-Congress. His hope is based upon the government. Congress as a whole ed the bill, regards this hope as chimericat, but even if Spain should agree to retire from Cuba, Congress would not consider our account with her closed. 
