wished them redeemed in gold would have to do would be to first demand standard silver dollars for them and then get the gold for the silver dollars. A measure containing a clause so man ilestly absurd is not calculated to in spire publec confidence in other sec
tions, where the absurdities could no he so readily discovered before they were put into practical operation ; but come to think, the Indianapois convention that fathered these ideas, did nót inspire any confidence outside the bendholders and bankers. who foot ed the bill.
