Mantanzas Demolished. By Cable to Reflector.

On Board Flag Ship, New York, April 23-Commander Sampson's flag ship, New York, the mozitor Puritan and the cruiser Cincinnati, after being fired upon returned eighty six shots into the Spanish forts at Mantanzas silencing and destroying them in eighteen minutes. This engagement occurred at noon on Wednesday and was the first of the war. The movements of our ships and ship gunners was excellent, their accurate and effectual work fully meeting every expectation. The Spaniards failed to hit our boats at all, though they came near it several times. Loss of lite among the Spaniards and spout as much as before. is supposed to be heavy, our loss none. The result of this engagement means that Havana is at our mercy.

Congressman Harry Skinner, of this state, has introduced a hill to raise revenue to carry on the war with Spain. The bill pro vides a war tax of five dollars on every deal or purchase or sale made or executed by stock, produce or other exchange or corporation, company, or person of a speculative character. The bill carries with it the machinery necessary to collect the tax under the internal revenue service of the government.
